FIFTY-SIXTH YEAR.

WAS ENTITLED TO BETTER TREATMENT

Liability of Railroads in the Matter of Furnishing First-Class Transportation.

SHOULD GIVE THE VERY BEST.

Jury Finds for Plaintiff in Suit of T. M. Mathis Against the Southern Pacific.

IMPORTANT RAILROAD DECISION.

Passenger Had First-Class Ticket but Was Forced to Ride in a Second-Class Coach.

The duty of railroad companies in regard to furnishing first class passenger accommodations while traveling and saving them from fruit and indignities at the hands of intoxicated passengers was established today by the jury in Judge Ritchie's court which heard the evidence in the case of T. M. Mathis against the Southern Pacific company. A verdict was returned last night in which plaintiff was awarded damages in the sum of \$1,000.

Plaintiff alleged that on April 16 he bought a first class ticket and was a passenger on defendant's train from San Francisco to Ogden. He claims that he was compelled to ride in a second class car, which was without heat and water and was kept in a filthy condition. At Reno it is alleged that a number of men boarded the car and became intoxicated and boisterous and offered insults to plaintiff and other first class passengers. Plaintiff demanded of the conductor that the boisterous passengers be removed or that he be placed in a first class coach, but his demands were not heeded, and he was compelled to continue his journey to Ogden with the second class passengers.

Because of the poorly heated condition of the car and of the fifth and also because of the threats and insults he withstood at the hands of the objectionable passengers, plaintiff claimed that his health was injured in the sum of \$1,000. The jury, however, estimated that amount in two and gave him judgment for \$1,000.

HAD BEEN HIDING HERE.

Frank Vaise Arrested at Butte for Killing His Neighbor.

(Special to the "News.") Butte, Mont., Oct. 13.—After killing his neighbor, John Valovitch, with one blow from his fist, four years ago, Frank Vaise returned to Butte yesterday thinking that his crime had been forgotten by the officers and was last night placed under arrest. Vaise was killed during a saloon row. Vaise declares the man advanced upon him threatening to kill him, when he swung his right to Valovitch's neck with all his strength. Valovitch dropped to the floor like a log and death is thought to have been almost instantaneous. Vaise had been hiding at Bingham, Utah, since his flight from Butte.

MISS ALICE ROOSEVELT SAILS FOR UNITED STATES

At Yokohama Distinguished Americans Were Given a Grand Send-Off by Japanese, Resident Foreigners and Officials.

Yokohama, Oct. 12.—The Pacific Mail steamship Siberia sailed for San Francisco at 2:25 o'clock this afternoon with Miss Alice Roosevelt and her traveling companions, and E. H. Harriman, president of the Southern Pacific company, and his party, on board. The distinguished Americans were given a great send-off by the Japanese, the resident foreigners and the local officials.

Before his departure, Mr. Harriman said: "We have been treated with the utmost courtesy and consideration by all classes of the Japanese people. I believe largely because we are Americans. We had no disagreeable experiences. SWEDISH PARLIAMENT RATIFIES KARLSTAD TREATY

Will be Asked to Approve New Flag For Use Immediately King Notifies Powers of Norway's Independence.

Stockholm, Sweden, Oct. 12.—Both houses of parliament today unanimously adopted the government bill providing for the ratification of the Karlstad treaty. There was no debate in the lower house and the criticism of the senate was confined to a few remarks. Speakers who alleged that too much consideration had been shown for Norway by the Swedish delegates. Both houses will meet this evening, when the government will present a bill repealing the act of union and authorizing the government to recognize Norway as an independent state. A measure has been submitted to the riksdag providing compensation for the families of men who were called out for special service in the army and navy during the recent crisis. At tonight's session parliament will be asked to approve the new Swedish flag, for use immediately after King Oscar notifies the powers of Sweden recognition of Norway's independence. The flag will be a yellow cross on a blue ground, the same as existed prior to 1844. The mark now showing in the upper left hand corner being eliminated.

MURDER OR SUICIDE?

Chicago, Oct. 13.—The body of an unidentified man with a rope tied about the neck was found in the lake at the foot of Twelfth street yesterday. The police believe the man was a laborer.

FEVER SITUATION CHEERING.

New Orleans, Oct. 13.—Except for the fact that a nest of fever has been discovered at New Iberia, the yellow fever situation is cheering. Eighteen cases are now under treatment at New Iberia and they have all been reported within the past two days, indicating that the disease has prevailed there for a long time. Failure to discover it before is explained by the fact that the disease is exceedingly mild. Baton Rouge today threw open its doors to the world.

At the same time Monsignor Cagliano de Azevedo, major domo of his holiness, will be created a cardinal."

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DID GREAT BRITAIN OFFER AID TO FRANCE

French Government Remains Silent Concerning Alleged Revelations In the Morocco Case.

COALITION AGAINST GERMANY.

Was to be One in the Event the Latter Country Assumed a Belligerent Attitude.

THREE DISTINCT OVERTURES MADE

Kaiser Learned of Matter and Issued Practically Indirect Ultimatum—Much to be Cleared Up.

Paris, Oct. 12.—The French government continues silent concerning the alleged revelation of Great Britain's offer of naval and military aid to France if Germany assumed a belligerent attitude over Morocco. In the meantime the newspapers add new phases to the disclosure. The Figaro gives a detailed version even more sensational than the previous alleged disclosures of the Matin. It says that the previous report of Great Britain offering to mobilize her navy and land British troops in Germany is not correct, but that the actual overture is about as follows:—

Before the Moroccan crisis became acute the British government made three distinct overtures to learn if France was disposed to conclude a treaty of defensive alliance. France declined to consider the question. Later, when the Moroccan crisis became acute Paul Cambon, the French ambassador to Great Britain, reopened the question and obtained verbal assurance from Foreign Secretary Lansdowne of Great Britain's effective concurrence in the event of a confrontation. Mr. Cambon was thereupon asked to answer M. Delcasse, "who was then foreign minister," that "if a 'casus foederis' arose, Great Britain would reiterate her assurance in writing. The German ambassador in London, Count von Metternich, learned of this assurance and informed Berlin. Emperor William decided on a counter move and made Italy the medium of its execution. He informed Italy that any treaty whereby Great Britain gave France military support relative to Morocco would constitute a casus belli. The Figaro asserts that this amounted to an indirect ultimatum and that the British government communicated the situation to M. Berthele, the French ambassador to Italy, who informed Paris June 4. Immediately thereafter M. Delcasse resigned (June 6) as a result of a violent scene in cabinet council. During this council M. Delcasse is alleged to have said: "I have a formal assurance of Great Britain's support."

President Loubet is represented as answering "And I have M. Berthele's telegram proving that this means war if we continue our policy. I refuse to endorse what you seem to treat so lightly."

The foregoing version is chiefly in accordance with the official version of Britain sought for and promised a military defensive alliance against Germany.

Later a semi-official note was issued saying that the published reports upon the incident concerning the resignation of M. Delcasse and notably the details regarding the cabinet council preceding his resignation are incorrect. The issuance of this denial showed uneasiness over the situation.

STATEMENT TO GERMANY.

London, Oct. 13.—With reference to the Paris Press's alleged disclosure the British government is authoritatively informed that the British government does not intend to issue a formal statement on the subject, but that the Associated Press is in a position to announce the fact that the British government has communicated to Germany a statement to the effect that Great Britain did not offer to assist France in the event of an attack by Germany, and that France did not ask for such assistance.

Rice and Gilman Taken Fast.

San Francisco, Oct. 13.—Aubrey L. Rice and W. O. Gilman, wanted in Providence, R. I., on the charge of defrauding the United National bank of that city out of \$5,000 on fraudulent railroad stock, were taken fast yesterday by detectives from Providence.

Missing Man Found Dead.

Butte, Mont., Oct. 13.—A Great Falls special to the Mining News states that a corpse was found west of that city near the Great Northern right of way has been identified as that of Douglas Catlock, an employee of the Hovey Brothers' ranch. He is believed to have been crossing a trestle and was struck by a train, throwing him to the ground 80 feet below and breaking his neck.
