

## DEPUTIES' ADDRESS TO THE RUSSIANS

Language so Violent as to Afford  
Pretext for Arrest if Auth-  
orities so Desire.

NOT PRINTED BY NEWSPAPERS

Reason is Detachment of Police Post-  
ed at Door of Every Print-  
ing Shop.

St. Petersburg, July 23.—The great news of today is the adoption of an address to the people by the deputies to parliament, who assembled at Viborg, the language of which, with its revolutionary demands that the people cease to furnish money and troops to the government and repudiate further loans, affords pretext enough for the government to lodge its authors in the fortress if it feels strong enough. A rumor was spread tonight that this course had been decided upon.

A large crowd gathered at the Finland station tonight, where the deputies were expected to arrive, but only a few appeared, and those were not molested and neither was there a popular demonstration. Among the arrivals were President Mourmestoff and Ivan Petrunkevitch. The former came on a local train, entirely unattended. He was plainly dressed, and responded to the salutation of the Associated Press correspondent by the mere raising of his hat and hurried on to escape an interview. Mr. Petrunkevitch, filled with the revolutionary spirit, claimed for the Constitutional Democrats the text of the appeal.

Copies of the appeal to the people are in the hands of all St. Petersburg newspapers, but it will scarcely be printed tomorrow, for the reason that a detachment of police is posted at the door of every newspaper printing office in the city, with orders not to print any papers to leave the building until authorized by the censor. The authorities hope by equally vigorous measures to prevent the publication of the appeal in other cities, and in the meantime to nullify the fears of the people as to the possible effect of the appeal.

### THE ADDRESS.

"To the people, from their popular representatives:

"Citizens of All Russia—Parliament has been dissolved by ukase of July 21. You elected us as your representatives and instructed us to fight for our country and freedom. In execution of your instruction and our duty we drew up laws in order to insure freedom to the people. We demanded the removal of irresponsible ministers who were inflicting the laws with impunity and depriving freedom. First of all, however, we wanted to bring out a law respecting the distribution of land to working peasants and involving the assignment to this end of crown appanages, monasteries and lands belonging to the clergy, and compulsory expropriation of private estates. The government held such a law to be inadmissible, and upon parliament once more urgently putting forward its resolution regarding compulsory expropriation parliament was dissolved.

"The government promises to convene a new parliament seven months hence. Russia must remain without popular representation for seven whole months, at a time when the people are standing on the brink of ruin and industry and commerce are undermined; when the whole country is seething with unrest and when the military has definitely shown its incapacity to do justice to popular needs. For seven months the government will act arbitrarily and will fight against the popular movement in order to obtain a pliable subservient parliament. Should it succeed, however, in completely suppressing the popular movement the government will revoke no parliament at all.

"Citizens, stand up for your trampled rights for popular representation and for an imperial parliament. Russia must not remain a day without popular representation. You possess the means of acquiring it. The government has without the assent of the popular representative no right to collect taxes from the people, to summon the people to military service. Therefore you are now the government. They dis-

solvent parliament; you are justified in giving neither money nor soldiers. Should the government, however, continue to refuse to convene a new parliament, such loans will be invalid without the consent of the popular representatives. The Russian people will never acknowledge them and will not be called upon to pay them. Accordingly, until a popular representative parliament is summoned do not give a kopek to the throne or a soldier to the army. Be steadfast in your refusal. No power can resist the united, inflexible will of the people.

"Citizens, in this obligatory and unavoidable struggle your representatives will be with you."

Policemen are posted at the lodgings of Mr. Seidelkoff and M. Ilyn, awaiting the return of those revolutionary delegates, who already have involved themselves by sedition acts since the dissolution of parliament.

The theaters and other places of amusement were almost empty tonight, the public fearing conflicts between crowds and the military and police. Several arrests took place in various parts of the city, but they were all of a petty character.

A few days may witness the constitution of a "provisional government," composed of an enlarged council of ministers, with the inclusion of conservative members of the deposed lower house, councilors of the empire and men influential in the life of the empire who can be induced to accept ministries without portfolios and contribute their authority and aid."

The Associated Press also is informed that a ukase will soon be issued, fixing the date of election for parliament for the first week in December, Russian style, and that, as an additional guarantee to the people that popular representation will not be abandoned, another ukase will be issued proroguing the council of the empire until the convocation of the new parliament without, as was prophesied Sunday night, calling new elections for elective members.

Meanwhile the masses of the Russian people, slow of thought and action, have not yet roused themselves to the gigantic upheaval which is sure to follow the dissolution of their parliament. Minor disorders are reported from half a dozen cities. An incident anti-Jewish outbreak at Odessa has been checked by the police. A sympathetic strike has been begun at the Kharkov railroad shops, which may inaugurate a general tie-up of communications, but St. Petersburg, Moscow and most of the other great centers are still calm on the surface, though boiling and seething beneath.

**MASSACRE OF JEWS.**

Russia Said to be on the Eve of a Renewal of Them.

London, July 23.—Israel Zangwill, president of the Jewish territorial organization, has received a telegram from Vienna to the effect that the country is on the eve of new massacres of Jews, which have been fixed for July 25, the anniversary of Russia's conversion to Christianity. Arms, it is added, are being distributed and leaflets are being scattered, inciting massacres in the name of religion. The message implores the assistance of Europe to prevent bloodshed.

**PROMOTIONS IN SOME UTAH POSTOFFICES.**

Washington, D. C., July 23.—The postoffice department yesterday announced the following promotions in Utah postoffices: One \$500 clerk in the Salt Lake City postoffice to \$600; five \$600 clerks to \$700; four \$700 to \$800; also the following promotions in other Utah offices: Ogden, two \$700 to \$800; Park City, one \$500 to \$600; Provo, one \$600 to \$700 and one \$600 to \$700.

**JUDGE J. B. RICKS DEAD.**

Springfield, Ill., July 23.—Judge J. B. Ricks, ex-judge of the Illinois supreme court, died at 5:15 this morning at his home, Taylorville, Ill. He was 78 years of age.

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## PART LEADERS AT SAGAMORE HILL

Every Phase of the Coming Congressional Campaign Was Discussed.

PRESIDENT WAS SATISFIED.

General Disposition Was Expressed to Begin Active Operations at Once.

Oyster Bay, July 23.—A quartet of Republican leaders went to Sagamore Hill today to talk over the coming congressional campaign with President Roosevelt.

The party consisted of Speaker Cannon, Representative Sherman, chairman of the campaign committee; Representative Loudenslager of New Jersey and Congressman McKinley of Illinois, secretary and treasurer of the committee.

Mr. Sherman said the object in coming to see the president was to have a thorough discussion of every phase of the coming campaign. He said there was no particular difficulty or seriousness in the situation, but that it was very desirous before the campaign opened to have matters understood thoroughly. He said the president was not going to in any sense be the leader of the campaign, but was going to cooperate most heartily in every way he could.

The party, on their return from Sagamore Hill, will be the guests of Representative Cocks at Westbury. At the conclusion of the political conference at Sagamore Hill this afternoon two brief statements were made. One by Secy. Loudenslager, treasurer of the party and the other by Chairman Sherman of the Congressional committee. Secy. Loeb said:

"The plans for the congressional campaign were gone over generally and the president expressed himself as being in entire accord with the congressional campaign committee."

Chairman Sherman said:

"The headquarters of the Republican congressional campaign committee will be opened in the St. James building in New York next Wednesday. From that time on the committee will take an active part in the campaign. The chairman of the committee will devote his entire time to the campaign, as will Secy. Loudenslager, Treasurer McKinley and Representative Tawney of Minnesota."

"Other members of the committee will be at the headquarters from time to time. The principal speakers of the campaign will be Secy. of War Taft, Secy. of the Treasury, Shaw, Speaker Cannon, Senator Beveridge and other senators."

"There was a general expression of satisfaction by all the members who attended the conference, and a general disposition expressed to begin an active campaign at once. The campaign text-book, which is now under production, will not be completed for two or three weeks. Speaker Cannon will return to the United States to attend his nominating convention. He will go to Maine in September to make speeches."

**SAN FRANCISCO STRIKE.**

Probabilities Are It May be Settled by Arbitration or Compromise.

San Francisco, July 23.—It is now probable that the strike of the electrical workers against the United Railroads may be settled by arbitration or through compromise. The railway corporation has taken the position that it is willing at any time to discuss any grievances its employees may have against it.

Today President Taft received a letter from the president of the United Railroads containing resolutions passed by the electrical workers in which they asked the railroad to submit the disputed points to an impartial board for arbitration. The letter also contained similar resolutions from the Car Housemen's union.

While no answer has been received by the unions to their resolutions, it was stated at the railway offices that the strikers would be met half way in their efforts to have the trouble arbitrated.

**DENATURIZING ALCOHOL.**

U. S. Internal Revenue Commission in Germany Investigating It.

Berlin, July 23.—The commission composed of Messrs. John W. Yerkes, I. R. Pitt, Jr., and C. A. Graham of the United States internal revenue appointed to investigate the denaturization of alcohol, has arrived here to study the German alcohol fuel and lighting industry. Alcohol for these purposes sells at wholesale today at about 20 cents per gallon and probably more is used here than in any other country for cooking, illumination and manufacturing. The industry is building up and may rival beet sugar in agricultural value. It is a common sight in this country to see a tall chimney belonging to a farm distillery where a crop of potatoes is turned into alcohol, the mash being used for feeding cattle and hogs. The emperor offered several prizes for the best alcohol burning machines, especially automobiles for army transport. His majesty himself once astonished King Edward and a household party at Sandringham by superintending personally a demonstration of an alcohol burning cooking apparatus.

**ICEMEN INDICTED.**

Cincinnati, July 23.—Sixteen indictments on charges of restraint of trade in the matter of advancing the price of ice were returned today by the grand jury. Ten individuals and five firms were indicted all being members of the Ice Dealers' exchange. Those indicted are members of the exchange who attended a meeting on May 30, when a general advance in the price was declared.

**ADDRESS OF SYMPATHY.**

London, July 23.—A British address of sympathy with the Russian people and parliament is being circulated. Already the signatures of many persons have been obtained.

**SOLDIER COMITS SUICIDE.**

Tacoma, Wash., July 23.—Quarter master Dadds of the Twenty-second Infantry, located at San Francisco, committed suicide today at American Lake, where army maneuvers are in progress.
