New Legislation.

MEN'S. LONDON, 9.-The Government's bill to be introduced in the Commons by Harcourt relative to explo sives provides that the maximum penalty for causing an explosion by which life er property is imperiled shall be life long servitude. The attempt to cause an explosion, or the making or keeping of explosives with intent to cause an explosion is made; punishable by imprisonment for a term of 20 years and unlawful making or keeping of explosives under suspicious circumstances, is punishable by 14 years imprisoument.
