Paris, March 27 .-- The authorities here are seriously concerned about the mysterious disappearance of two official dispatch bags, containing orders to the French squadron in the Indian ocean. The bags, which were forwarded to the captains of the French warships Infercaptains of the French warships Infer-na and Kersiantand, which are said to have contained orders relative to the movements of the Russian second Pa-cific squadron, disappeared between Port Said and Jibutil, French Somali-land. The investigations made have not resulted in finding any trace of the not resulted in finding any trace of the missing bugs, and some fears are en-tertained that they may have reached those interested in learning the plans of the Russian second Pacific squadron.

# THE AMERICAN DANGER.

#### Privy Counselor Golgberger Says It Does Not Exist for Europe.

It Does Not Exist for Europe. Berlin, March 27.-Privy Counselor Goigberger, author of "The Land of Un-limited Possibilities," is about to publish simultaneously in Berlain and Brussels a pamphiet entitled, "The American Dan-ger," which is a continuation and supple-ment of his book. He compares the economic forces of the United States and German," from various standpoints and al-though recognizing the resources, technical equipment and capabilities of the United States, he concludes that the American danger does not exist for Europe and es-pecially for Germany. Herr Goigberger contends that the commercial relations of the United States and Germany ought to be readjusted by a reciprocity treaty.

# TRIP TO COAST WEDNESDAY.

#### Governor and Commission Guing to Oregon-St. Louis Exhibits Turned Over This Afternoon.

The commissioners from Utah appointed to manage the state exhibit at the coming Portland fair, and those who had in charge the recent St. Louis exposition met separately in the state executive offices, and agreed upon 2:30 o'clock this afternoon as the hour for turning over the exhibits of the St. Louis fair for transportation to Port-

The proposed trip to the coast, which the commissioners have announced, was postponed until Wednesday morning, at the suggestion of Governor Cutler, who found it inconvenient to leave

Tuesday evening, as planned, The assembly of the Utah commis-sion for the Louisiana Purchase Exposition was meant to be its final one, and unless some unforeseen obstacle intervenes, its adjournment tonight will be sine die, with all of its business com-pleted, and the world's fair deficit a natter of history.

matter of history. When the committee met, Treasurer Willis Johnson had on hand as assets the \$7,500 appropriated by the Legis-lature for the use of the commission, over the protest of several house mem-bers and the \$2 122 methor here det bers, and the \$2,13 cash on hand when the Legislature met, which the house sought to recover summarily into the treasury by the passage of one of Harry Joseph's resolutions, which lost its enacting clause in the senate. This money was increased to a total of \$9,672.20 by \$41.20 turned in by Director General Whitaker from the sale of concentrates. The principal item of outstanding in-debtedness was the notes held by local banks, endorsed by prominent citizens, for a total of \$8,669, without interest. The item of an overdraft at the Com-

The item of an overdraft at the Com-mercial National bank for \$600, the sal-ary of Prof. Cummings as director of the educational exhibit, and freight and storage bills ran the total up to \$260 above the funds on hand. It was proposed to meet this shortage by strik-ing out the item of interest from the notes held by the local banks, and taking the balance of \$21.90 still above the funds available, from other claims. LOVSEY LEFT OUT.

The claim of E. S. Lovsey for a small balance due him for wax was not al-lowed, as a receipt was presented by Director General Whitaker showing that he had received the money. This claim figured to some extent in the house investigation.

Sheep free from disease may be moved by first obtaining a permit from a state sheep inspector. Order No. 4: It is hereby ordered, that all diseased sheep must be dipped at least once before crossing any quarantine line, and dipped a second time within 14 days after first dipping at any point designated by a state in-spector, who shall supervise the dip-ping.

Chidester's left thigh. He clung tightly to his assailant and the two rolled out into the open air. Chidester pulled his revolver and shot Devich through the shoulder. The lat-ter then broke loose and escaped in the darkness. During the fight in the dark-ness shooting was going on all the time and as Skojvik ran from the house he was shot several times and fatally wounded. wounded.

No wounded. After Chidester had been wounded he was taken to the Highland Boy house, and Marshal Williams was telephoned for. He and Morshal Clay at once took up the hunt for the Austrians mixed up in the affair. They found Devich, who shot Chidester, yesterday and placed him under arrest.
