## WATERWORKS AND LIGHTING PLANT

City Administration Has Both Systems Under Contemplation With Assurance of Success.

### HOLDUP SMITH CONVICTED.

Woodmen in Parde Fishermen Dismissed—No Trace of Jail-breakers.

If the present city administration succeeds in securing for Ogden city its own waterworks system and lighting plant, it will give the inhabitants the greatest boon enjoyed for many years. The first steps looking to that end have been taken by City Engineer Parker at the instance of Mayor Brewer and the city council, when he filed with the state engineer, application for the waters of South Fork canyon, a tributary to Ogden river. The waters from that stream are pure and of sufficient quantity for all purposes. In order to store water sufficient it is the intention of the city officials to construct a stone and cement dam across the canyon at a convenient point where at a small cost the water could be stored in a natural reservoir.

The city officials feel that the present water and lighting rates are too high, and assure the public that unless the rates are substantially reduced the two projects will be carried out. There is no doubt but the applications of Mr. Parker will be granted by the state engineer, as it is the intention to so arrange the utilizing of the water that it will empty back into the main channel of Ogden river at a point above where the several irrigation companies take their water out of the river. For domestic purposes the city wants 25,000 acre feet of water, said water to be conducted to the city through a 35-inch pipe line 76,000 feet in length. For electric light and power purposes the city has applied for 50 second feet of water from the same stream, the said water to be conducted through a 30-inch pipe line 40,000 feet to a point near the mouth of Ogden canyon, where it is the intention to construct a power

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house. The mayor is enthusiastic over the proposition and is backed by the council.  
City Atty. Devine has given it as his opinion that the city can legally bond for upwards of \$400,000 for lighting and power purposes. The outcome of these various movements on the part of Mayor Brewer and his associates will be anxiously watched by the citizens of Ogden.

### CONVICTED OF GRAND LARCENY.

George E. Smith was convicted by a jury in the district court last evening of grand larceny and the date of sentence was set for Monday morning at 9:30 o'clock. Smith is the young man who was serving as night clerk at the Ogden hotel two months ago and received for deposit in the safe \$90 belonging to one of the guests named Miller. He put up a fake holdup story and got away with the money. Smith went on the witness stand and admitted that the holdup story was a "fake" to get away with the money, but claimed that he did not get the money, one of his accomplices got away with it. Weber county No. 14 Woodmen of the World gave a parade last evening along the principal business streets of the city and held an open session at the hall. There were about 200 Woodmen in line, led by the band and degree team with a troupe of horribles bringing up the rear.

At the hall a large number of neighbors and friends assembled and listened to a pleasing musical and literary program. Speeches on the principles of the order and the good it is doing were made by P. P. Christensen of Salt Lake, Judge J. A. Howell and Joseph Cheez. A social hour was spent after the program.

**CASES DISMISSED.**  
The actions brought by County Fish and Game Warden John Grow against J. H. Mickelson and Thomas Allen, charged with illegal fishing in Ogden valley last month, were tried before Municipal Judge Murphy yesterday afternoon. The prosecution was unable to produce sufficient testimony to convince the judge of their guilt, so he dismissed the cases.

The action brought against Joseph Peterson charged with buying trout from Mickelson and Allen was also dismissed, the evidence showing that the fish were left with Peterson to be

kept on ice in his refrigerator.  
**NO TRACE OF JAILBREAKERS.**  
Deputy Sheriff J. J. Murphy returned yesterday afternoon from a trip out west of the city, along the line of the Southern Pacific, in search of the escaped convicts from the county jail. He could not find any trace of the men anywhere along the line. Sheriff Wilson went to Salt Lake City yesterday hoping to get some trace of the prisoners, but was also unsuccessful.  
**CANT KEEP OUT OF JAIL.**

A complaint charging William Johnson with grand larceny has been filed in the municipal court. Johnson just completed a 60-days sentence in the city jail, and it is alleged went to the home of Charles Christman and stole a valuable harness which he sold at a second hand store, and then went to Salt Lake where he was arrested and brought back to Ogden by Sergeant Tout.

### KAMMEYER DIVORCE GRANTED.

The divorce suit of Irene Kammeier against John Kammeier was heard in the district court by Judge Howell. The testimony went to show that defendant has ill treated his wife on various occasions. A decree of divorce, custody of their three children, \$15 per month permanent alimony, and the homestead on Thirtieth street, were awarded the wife.

### EWING-EATON NUPTIALS.

A marriage license was granted to Deltzer H. Eaton, 28, and Miss Georgia A. Ewing, 25, both of Ogden.

### BRIEFS AND PERSONALS.

A complaint was sworn to yesterday afternoon by Dist. Atty. Halverson, charging Thomas A. Reid with battery. Mr. Halverson and Reid had a controversy a couple of weeks ago, and Reid struck Halverson. The case will come up in the municipal court in a few days.

A small blaze at the Smith Business college yesterday afternoon called out the fire department.

Verla L., the little daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Skoen, died yesterday at Plain City. Funeral services will be held Sunday afternoon at 4 o'clock.

### WILL CALL MANY EXPERTS.

Handwriting Authorities Will Attempt To Establish Important Point.

Kansas City, Mo., March 20.—Taking of testimony in the case of Mrs. Sarah Morasch, on trial in the circuit court at Kansas City, Kan., charged with the murder of 4-year-old Ruth Miller, who died from the effects of eating poisoned candy intended for her 14-year-old step-sister, Eva Miller, began today. The testimony of handwriting experts will, it is expected, play an important part in the case. The prosecution asserts that Mrs. Morasch addressed the fatal box of candy and will produce a number to authorities on handwriting to prove its assertion.

## UNCLE SAM AFTER FOREST RANGERS

Three Hundred Are Needed to Patrol the Mountainous Districts.

### COMPETENT MEN IN DEMAND.

Applicants Must Be Able to Do the Work Required—Practice Knowledge Above Book Learning.

Washington, March 20.—The United States civil service commission has just announced that examination will be held for the position of ranger at the supervisors' headquarters at every national forest on April 23 and 24. It is estimated that 300 more rangers will be required during the present fiscal year than were on duty last year, and eligibles to fill these vacancies will be furnished the forest service by the coming examination. The examinations will be held in seventeen states and territories at the following places:

- Alaska—Ketchikan.
- Arkansas—Fort Smith.
- Arizona—Benson, Douglas, Flagstaff, Roosevelt, Safford, Show Low, Springerville.
- California—Alturas, Bishop, Elk Creek, Hemet, Hot Springs (Tulare county), Los Angeles, Nevada City, North Fork, Quincy, Salinas, San Luis Obispo, Santa Barbara, Sisson, Sonoma, Weaverville, Yreka.
- Colorado—Giltman, Delta, Denver, Durango, Estes Park, Glenwood Springs, Gunnison, La Veta, Leadville, Meeker, Monte Vista, Saguache, Steamboat Springs, Westcliffe.
- Idaho—Boise, Halley, Idaho Falls, Kootenai, Mackay, Meadows, Oakley, Pocatello, St. Anthony, Salem City, Valparaíso.
- Minnesota—Cass Lake.
- Montana—Ashland, Bozeman, Dillon, Great Falls, Helena, Highwood, Kalispell, Libby, Livingston, Missoula, Sheridan, Thompson Falls, Townsend.

**ADDITIONAL INFORMATION.**  
Applicants can secure information on the examination from the United States civil service commission, Washington, D. C., or from the forest supervisor at any of the places mentioned in the 17 states. Those who wish to take the examination should ask for application form 1935, a copy of the "See Boys" and a copy of "Information regarding employment on the national forests." The papers in the examination will all be forwarded to the civil service commission and the results announced in due time.

Experience, a thorough knowledge of forest conditions, and a sound body, rather than book education, are the qualities sought in examining applicants who desire to become forest rangers. The man must have the ability, however, to make simple maps and write intelligent reports upon forest business connected with the position. A ranger must be able to take care of himself and his horses in regions remote from settlement and supplies. Necessary qualifications of applicants include the knowledge of trail building, construction of cabins, and the ability to ride, pack, and deal tactfully with all classes of people. They must also know Spanish in order to conduct surveying, estimating and scaling timber, logging, mining and the livestock business.

### MUST KNOW COUNTRY.

The applicant should be thoroughly familiar with the region of the country in which he seeks employment. In Arizona and New Mexico, the ranger must know enough Spanish to conduct forest business with the Mexican users of the nation's forests. Personal equipment and horses for use in connection with duty of a ranger are furnished by the rangers themselves, and not by the forest service.  
Working under the direction of the forest supervisors, the ranger patrols the forests to prevent fire and trespass, estimates, surveys and marks timber, supervises and performs other duties which a man thoroughly familiar with forested regions and possessing a fair education is able to fulfill.  
Only those men who are at least 21 years of age, and not more than 40, of good character, temperate, and in good physical condition are eligible to take the examination. The salary paid to beginners is \$75 per month. Compensation runs as high as \$1,400 per year for rangers who have had some experience and demonstrate their capability. Still better places are open to these men, for it is the policy of the forest service to fill vacancies in higher positions by the promotion of rangers who have proved their capacity.

### LID ON TIGHT IN WINNIPEG.

The lid on tight in Winnipeg and 400 cases of alleged violations of the Lord's-day act will be commenced by a special prosecutor to-morrow.  
Every case will be fought and appealed, while the police have instructions to continue the summoning. Even men on the street who had newspapers in their pockets were held by the police and threatened with arrest if they did not tell from whom they purchased them.  
Retaliation in the way of prosecution of paid church choir, church janitors and ministers who perform weddings and funerals are under way.  
Among the odd occurrences yesterday afternoon a squad of police swooped down upon the new synagogue on Dugan street and there attempted to stop a wedding on the ground that a number of those present were earning money on the Lord's-day. It was gogone, and the bride pair, David Abramovitch and Rebecca Foran, were two very popular young people in Jewish circles, who wished to be after, Rabbi Levin, assisted by Rabbi Goldstein, had performed the ceremony, but the police based themselves in taking names of the rabbis, choir singers and number of guests, including the newly-married pair all of whom will be summoned for making money on the Sabbath, although there is now a volume of cases, which will take one magistrate a year to dispose of.  
The police have received instructions to continue the campaign next Sunday, but those summoned have decided upon mass meeting, when steps will be taken to defend the cases.  
Offenders upon conviction are liable to fines ranging from \$100 to \$250, according to the nature of the offense—Dispatch in New York Sun.

### CITY COUNCIL SESSION.

Bicycle Ordinance Amended and Again Held Over—Appropriations.

Provo, March 20.—The city council met last night in adjourned session and transacted considerable routine business.  
Interest of \$1,665 on the \$74,000 outstanding water works bonds, was

ordered paid and \$191.10 was appropriated to pay the electric company's bill.

The bicycle ordinance, which had passed its first and second readings and which had been laid upon the table for two weeks, came up before the council for consideration. It drew out many acrimonious expressions from opponents and was held over, after it had been amended beyond recognition.
