If the middleweight fighters of the present day can be brought together in a series of fights to decide the ownership of the title I claim to hold, the American people will see some fights the like of which were never witnessed before, writes Tommy Ryan.

The middleweight division today is the only one in the entire pugilistic game that is well and evenly balanced, the only one over which there is constantly hovering some doubt and guess work.

It is the only division of the eight or ten that are supposed to exist in which fights for the title could be arranged which, for betting purposes alone, would set the public fairly by the ears.

Through each of the other classes there is one man who is so far above the others in ring merit that there is no chance for his getting the title. In the case of the others there is a champion who is practically undisputed and whose ability is so marked that he is matched when he is immediately a 1 to 2 shot over his opponent.

CHAMPIONSHIP QUESTIONABLE.

Among the little fellows there seems to be considerable doubt, however. I refer to the fact that there are two or three at that figure few of them care to take a chance. Most of the bantams want to weigh in at from 165 to 182 pounds, which fact alone sends them out of that class. The others are all right.

John Coulton seems to be the best of the boys that can make 182 pounds legitimately and fight at that figure.

There is a good chance to create a new class of fighters between 182 and 190 pounds. Well do I remember when 182 pounds was the true featherweight figure, as indeed it should be today, with a specific class of fighters.

If this were true Abe Attell would have relinquished his title. It probably would fall into the hands of an Englishman then as America does not seem to possess any men of that size.

To own Moran, the little fellow who is now in this country;

Or there is only one Abe Attell. He stands, as I am, in a class by himself among the fighters and is the only one I believe that any other could possibly compete with him.

But there are few lightweights who are not beat him.

JOE GANS STANDS ALONE.

The same classification is possible among the 125-pounders. There is but one Gans, mighty fighter of rarest class and skill, a man so old he should now be classed a veteran, but so well preserved that he is able to easily dispose of any opponent.

But today the Jimmy Gardners, the Bill McLeods, the Jim Thomas' and the rest of them appear to be of little account when it comes to the real test.

Not one of them could be counted on to be any sort of a fight. They are all myths.

The same is true of the present day heavyweight champion with Jim Jeffries in retirement.

Tommy Burns, a good fighter, is a joke. He is a showman, but not wishing to become egotistical I will say that I could beat Burns if put in the test, despite the difference in our weights.

SAYS JACK JOHNSON IS BEST.

Really I must consider this fellow Johnson as a sure enough black pearl. I doubt if there is a heavy today that can stand him off in a fight, but I am not sure.

Kaufman doesn't stand up well, but may turn out to be something with more time on his shoulders. Schreck, though bad training methods, has proved himself a good fighter.

No so among the middleweights. Just look at the array of high grade fighters that could be thrown into a tournament and put up dazzling, even brilliant, displays.

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
