LOCAL BRIEFS.

The surveyor general's office in this city will be closed Saturdays at 1 p. m. during the months of July, August and September.

Isaac Hancock, aged 40 years and residing at 99 south, Main street, was reported as having amnesia.

Rafina Phillips was examined as to her sanity before Judge Armstrong yesterday afternoon by County Physician Whitney and Dr. Rauscher and was ordered committed to the mental hospital at Provo.

Thomas Finlayson, formerly of Scotland but now of Salt Lake, has been admitted to citizenship by Judge Morse. Giuseppe Perando, formerly of Italy but now of Park City, was also admitted to citizenship by Judge Armstrong.

The meeting of the trustees of the new Granite school district for organization has been postponed by the county commissioners until Monday, July 10, at 2 o'clock. The trustees were to have met yesterday in the city hall at 8 a. m.

Wednesday, July 12, is Cambodian day at Salt Lake, and for this event the Welsh will be out in force. There will be a special musical program rendered, a feature of which will be the singing of the hymns by the Welsh choir. The day will be a day of rest and rejoicing.

The Utah Association of Credit Men has filed suit in the district court against the Tropic Co-operative Mercantile & Manufacturing Institution to recover \$2,122.30 alleged to be due Z. C. M. I. for merchandise sold to defendant. The claim was assigned to plaintiff in this action.

Henry J. Bywater has returned from Evanston, where he has been on business. He reports a mixed up state of affairs on the new government building, with constant reports between the local government inspector and the contractor, so that the work is constantly delayed.

According to the Los Angeles Times, citizens of that city are preparing a silver cup for presentation to the Commercial club of Salt Lake, as a token of appreciation of the hospitable treatment extended to the southern California excursion on the occasion of the recent visitation over the Salt Lake Route.

To get the old horses out of the hacks and the mules and the broken down horses out of the delivery wagons, is the latest effort of humane officer H. R. Mann. The interests of the city, however, demand this as well as the interests of the poor horses. Both residents and visitors have caused to be charmed with the collection of animals at present on the streets. The complaints are received by him daily of the class of animals used on wagons for hire. It is his desire to raise the standard as soon as practicable, and he is soliciting the support of the general public in effecting the change.

Now that Salt Lake is out in haste and a growth for the next convention of the N. E. A., it appears that the town is to come into play for another big convention. This time the association sought after is the National Conference of Charities and Corrections, which brings together about 15,000 delegates at this convention. The conference will convene at the Hotel Utah, and will be represented there by three delegates—Sidney R. Barker, Oscar L. Cox and Judge M. K. Kellogg of Provo. Judge H. L. Lindsey of the District Juvenile court will be in attendance, and it is stated will work for Salt Lake on account of the fact that Delver has recently had a convention, and the convention held here will probably be held in the east, or middle west. This matter is now under consideration, and it is possible that local authorities, including the city, will extend an invitation for next year's convention.

KINDERGARTENS DECIDED UPON.

Two New Ones to be Operated in Connection With Public Schools.

AVAILABLE PLACES MENTIONED

Board Will Expend \$28,000 in Improvements—Too Many Supervisors, Says Mr. Martin.

While the question of their location is still open it has been decided by the board of education to open two new kindergartens in connection with the public schools of Salt Lake next season. The decision was reached at a meeting of the board last night, upon adoption of a report of the committee on buildings. The Bryant and Hamilton schools were mentioned as available for departments of this kind, and it is conceded that these schools will be chosen. Excellent rooms for the purpose can be obtained in both schools to accommodate about 70 children.

In addition to considering the matter of the kindergartens, the board handled a large amount of routine business, connected with the employment of teachers and repair of buildings. The report of the buildings and grounds committee, favoring the expenditure of \$28,000, was adopted. The funds to go for the general improvement of the schools and grounds. Nineteen thousand dollars additional was appropriated for the improvement of the Bryant and Hamilton schools, to be used in improvements.

TOO MANY SUPERVISORS.

That the teachers of the grammar schools are being supervised to death, and ought not to be further imposed upon by supervisors, was the declaration of Mr. Martin in a discussion on the employment of a supervisor of the grammar schools. The report of the committee recommending the employment of such an instructor was postponed, although a change recommending the employment of Miss Mary Mayne as director of physical culture at the high school was adopted. Miss Mayne will continue in addition her duties as teacher of physical culture at the high school.

Following the departure of the city superintendent of schools for New Jersey, Miss Anna Logan and Miss Mary Mayne, who are supervisors of the city schools, will be in charge of the city schools. The visit of Superintendent Christensen to the N. E. A. convention was postponed. Miss Mayne will be employed as a teacher at \$10 per month.

An appropriation of \$3,453.30 to meet the current quarter's expenses was made.

An offer was accepted from the firm of Brown, Terry & Woodruff to furnish covers for text books free.

TO TAKE SCHOOL CENSUS.

The members were authorized to notify the trustees of their respective districts to take the school enumeration, which begins July 15.

An appropriation of money for principal and for interest was agreed upon, towards paying the state for the school property used by the West Side High school. The money will come from the sale price of the Thirteenth ward school property.

The city council was petitioned to construct a roadway between Canyon road and State street in front of the Lafayette school.

ALL OR NONE.

The San Pedro road wanted a strip of the Utah school grounds on which to run their through trains. The board couldn't see what the rest of the board would be to them for school purposes, with overhead trains skirting the playgrounds, so a price of \$12,000 was set on the whole, no part of it being for sale by itself.

FOURTH IN SUGAR CITY.

Idaho's New Town Celebrates in Royal Fashion.

Special Correspondence. Sugar City, Idaho, July 5.—The glorious Fourth was celebrated here yesterday in royal fashion, in fact, nothing in the history of the town ever exceeded the event in interest. Salutes, fireworks, music, and a grand display of the business houses, and at least 5,000 people assembled from the surrounding country, made up a day never to be forgotten. The main interest centered in the grand display delivered by Hon. John Henry Smith, which was a beautiful, patriotic and inspiring effort. The Japanese residents who are working in great numbers in the surrounding district, took charge of the fireworks at night, and the display was something to cause the oldest inhabitant to rub his eyes in wonderment. During the day the town was decorated with flags, and in the morning between

Rexburg and Sugar City, resulting in a score of 4 to 2 in favor of Rexburg; the other in the afternoon between Idaho Falls and Sugar, the Idaho Falls boys walking away with the game on a score of 8 to 1. No accidents were reported and not a single case of drunkenness was to be found as Sugar City is strongly a temperance town.

MUST GIVE THE NEWS.

Court Takes Reasonable View of the Newspaper's Limitations.

In sustaining a judgment for the Richmond News-Leader, which was sued for libel on account of an innocent mistake in a piece of telegraphic news, Judge Keith of the Virginia court of appeals says: "Where newspapers lightly and recklessly publish what is offensive and injurious to a citizen, courts and juries should hold them to a strict accountability, but it is by a reasonable enforcement of the law and not by its harsh and strained construction that the best interests of society are observed. It is the business of a newspaper to give news. The public demands it, and it is a condition of its existence. The newspapers could not fulfill their mission if they were required to verify to the last microscopic detail every paragraph they publish. As it is, they take more trouble to get things right than some of their critics have the least notion of. Fourth Estate."

Colonel Geoghegan told the officers that the National Guard was not a banquet, but a business meeting, and the food was merely to take all possible bad taste out of the mouths of those present. He urged abandonment of all personal feelings, and united action along the line for the best interest of the guard. The army board had agreed to have the new guard headquarters all ready by fall, as well as the new regulation uniforms.

Governor Cutler was also present, and encouraged the officers to do their level best for the guard. The meeting finally adjourned with the best feeling prevailing.
