The Theater and Opera House in Opposition Next Week—Calhoun Opera Company—The New Boy—Stoddard's Reminiscences.

The opening of the new Opera House takes place Monday evening, Christmas Eve, and as the next night, Christmas, both houses will open for the first time against each other, and keep it up all the remainder of the week. Just what effect these great theatrical trials will have on the character of the standard grand theater, remains to be seen, and the result is awaited with a good deal of curiosity. The Theater has never yet really known what this kind of opposition meant. In the days of the Water Opera House, when the theatrical business was so much at a standstill that neither house gave any money and the Walker steadily lost to there, was no reducing of prices, no effort was made of course nor opposition. The Theater has had of late months to the Lyric, who has been predominant as to seat and figure, the arrival of our Grand, however, is a very different matter. The house holds a thousand people in usual numbers, and it will be opened, at least, by a company sold by competitor judges to be the equal, if not the superior, of many road companies which play at the Theater at a dollar admissions. Certainly a good theatrical attraction, or even one only half good, will assist to a good many people who are willing to pay 20 cents for their amusements, but who are not willing to pay a dollar. Whether this class is numerous enough to keep the Grand open six nights in the week month after month, and not only just to fill it well, for the expenses of maintenance, is a question that only the managers can answer. In the meantime the audience has opened with excellent indications for the performance of Stoddard on Monday night.

The play by a local author, Mr. Stoddard, has received a most favorable reception and has been "gone over" exhaustively by two local newspapers who have been engaged in "reselling" it and putting it into better shape for presentation. It may be produced locally during the winter.

Next week will be a busy one at the Theater. Christmas afternoon and evening the hall will be open with the latest comic comedy, "The Girl from the Hills." It is said a local comedian with delightful humor will keep the audience in laughter and amuse through the entire three acts. It is all about a school boy, a bright lad who sleeps with the body of his mother, and who is continually made to do the drudgery, success attending Apple, envying it whilom, and the like. But he is no boy at all. He is a man of business, thirty years old. He has recently married a nun, and while she is a good woman, her husband is not. The Black Diamond Opera Company, consisting of the service men, are Miss Alice Allen, Adele Farnham, Gertrude Lodge, Beatrice McKeithen, George Lyman, Fred Rantley, Edward Wells, Douglas A. Fullerton and Anthony Worcester. Several of the girls are well known, and some are known here, such as while northeast of Lillian Elsworth and Francis Wilson, they are capable artists, equal to nearly anything they may undertake. The result is that the company will fill the house and a number of boxes will be taken, so the manager chooses instead a complete over subscription.

The chorus is large and well trained, the orchestra and vocalists are well singing.
