Native Rebellion.

It is stated that the inhabitants of Kohistan have rebelled and murdered the governor. The Ameer sent a large force to restore order.

RUSSIA.

The Bulgarian Insurrection.

ST. PETERSBURG, 5.—It is officially denied that Russian officials are participating in or encouraging the Bulgarian insurrection. General Todoroff has issued fresh orders to the Russian commanders on the East Roumelian frontier to prevent the organizers of insurgent bands and to watch the movements of insurgent committees.

The Imperial Yacht Swamped.

The imperial yacht Levadia left Levadia on the 2nd inst., for Odessa, with the Grand Duke Sergei, and sailed on the 3rd. The yacht was swamped during fog and a heavy gale, but all on board were safely landed. The yacht was afterwards blown on the rocks, and will probably go to pieces.

ITALY.

Rome and the Vatican.

ROME, 5.—Negotiations between the Vatican and Russia have been suspended, as the attitude of Russia affords no hope of a satisfactory result. The Pope will probably issue his protest against the Russian ultimatum, and the violence which the Catholics of Poland endure from the Russian authorities.

FRANCE.

Paris, 5.—Balthazar Jacquin, republican, and three years a senator, was arrested on the 4th inst., and has resigned on demand of the minister of justice.

GERMANY.

Berlin, 5.—It is announced that in the event of new complications, Germany, as far as possible, will support the cause of peace, but will not join in any combined action for enforcing the treaty of Berlin.

TURKEY.

Constantinople, 5.—The Russian ultimatum to Bulgaria, which was about to enter Macedonia.

CENTRAL AMERICA.

San Francisco, 5.—The Star and Herald publishes a long account of an earthquake in Salvador on the evening of Oct. 6. In Juapoco nearly every house was destroyed and many families buried in the ruins. At the latest advices ten bodies were recovered and many persons still missing. Nueva Guadalupe, Sanago de Mar and Chinameca are destroyed, and the loss of life is serious in each place. Other towns which suffered by the earthquake are Guadalupe, Toluca, Cameruel and Arenal. An eruption of the volcano of Santa Ana is apprehended and serious consequences are feared.
