Carbo Valley's Tax Assessment.

The returns made by the assessors in the county show that the assessed valuation of property in this county, exclusive of railroad, telegraph, telephone and public utilities, is \$4,800,000. The county tax for this year will be five mills. The salary of the assessor is fixed at \$1,000, and that of the collector at \$500.

THE SARGENT TROUBLE.

A PROBABILITY OF FURTHER REAGONS HOSTILITIES AT AN EARLY DATE.

Mail advices from Apple, Idaho, under date of May 23 give the following information: There is no statement in the war zone here. Notwithstanding the presence of three ships of war, there is every prospect of serious and bloody fighting at an early date. Since the last letter two conflicts have occurred between small parties of the rival troops, which have resulted in four being killed. Both parties have occupied strong positions. That of the government is intrenched on a hill which was held by the Tennessean party during the fight of 1898, while the rebels are about three-quarters of a mile distant on another hill. Both positions are almost impregnable without the aid of cannon, which they might be shelled. It is greatly feared that the government party will be beaten. It is a state of thorough alarm.

The Jans rebel contingent, summoned to a protest in the outside, rendered fifty guns to the government. They, however, refuse to fulfill other promises made by them, and announce their intention of joining the Army party of rebels.

The question of war or no war with Asia was in the air, and was being agitated by the outside. There was evidently a strong feeling among those in authority that terms could be arranged without resorting to extermination. Also the assumed an extremely defiant attitude, and in turning

out the government adherents from their district have been particularly severe, so much so, indeed, that in many cases even the women have been deprived of their clothing.

Thursday afternoon a wounded man was brought down from Laramie, having been shot through the thigh, the bullet passing out through the armpit. From the wound it is learned that the wounded man belonged to Laramie, and, with some companions, was making a reconnaissance when struck down. It does not appear that there was a general engagement between the two armies, but only a skirmish. Later on in the evening messengers came down for instructions relative to making an attack to take on the rebels. These instructions of the government troops were to refrain from extrajudicial acts after Monday, when it would be easy to wait until the Army party intended to accept.

The German ship Rurik arrived on May 12th. There are now two German war ships here, and many rumors are about to be spread that the British ship Curlew is also in the harbor. The Orizaba, who Admiral Howland-Smith on board, is expected to arrive about June 15th.

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
