AMERICAN.

OHIO.

Columbus, 4.—In Ohio 130 wards and precincts show a net republican gain over 1884 of 1,734, and a net democratic gain over 1880 of 293; 37 precincts in Hamilton county show a net republican gain over 1884 of 972.

Toledo, 4.—Twenty-nine precincts in Lucas county give a net republican gain over October of 469. Those to be heard from gave the republicans a majority in October of 91. If this holds good this county will give the republicans a majority of 900.

PENNSYLVANIA.

Philadelphia, 4.—At one of the polls to-day a man was challenged upon the ground that he had made a bet upon the result of to-day's election, and the election officers sustained the challenge. The challenge was based upon the act of 1839, which declares that any one making a bet on the result of an election is disfranchised from voting at such election. There was no denial by the man that he had made a bet.

Pittsburg, Pa., 4.—The election passed off without any disturbance. A very large vote was polled in Allegheny county, and considerable scratching, which is unusual in presidential years. At 10.30 the returns were very indefinite, but indications point to the election of the entire republican ticket. Blaine's plurality is about 14,000. Butler polled about 5,000 votes.

RHODE ISLAND.

Providence, 4.—The vote of the State is complete; Blaine 19,029, Cleveland 12,438, Butler 435, St. John 941. Blaine's majority is 5,225, against 7,155 for Garfield in 1880.

SOUTH CAROLINA.

Charleston, 4.—Scattering indications from a number of counties throughout the State indicate that the democrats have elected their entire ticket by a large majority, with six out of seven Congressmen. The election, as far as heard from, was peaceful.

TENNESSEE.

Memphis, 4.—The election in this city and country passed off quietly. Full returns will not be received until to-morrow. Sufficient is known, however, that the republicans have elected their legislative ticket by a majority avering 900.

TEXAS.

Galveston, 4.—Returns from the country are coming in very slow. A heavy vote was polled throughout the State, and pleasant weather is reported. The returns thus far predict the election of the entire democratic Congressional delegation.

VIRGINIA.

Alexandria, Va., 4.—The election passed off quietly. The democratic majority is 463, a gain of 81.

Richmond, Va., 4.—Scattering returns from various portions of the State show small democratic gains. An official vote of two-thirds of this city gives a democratic gain of over 400.

Fredericksburg, Va., 4.—The election here passed off quietly and a full vote was polled. There is a republican gain here of forty per cent. on the Massey Wise vote of 1882. No returns from the county precincts have yet been received here.

Petersburg, 4.—The city is wild with excitement to-night, but there was no disturbance during the election. Large crowds are in the streets. The vote in this city is as follows: Blaine 777, Cleveland 1,609, Brady, republican for Congress, 1,851; Evans, republican, Brady's opponent, 998; Rives, democrat, 1,521.

Portland, 4.—One hundred and thirty towns give Blaine 39,589; Cleveland, 27,467; Butler, 1,563; St. John, 1,221. Blaine's plurality, 12,121, against Garfield's majority of 6,943. At this hour, although it is raining, the streets in front of the Press and Argus offices, and for some blocks down are packed with a multitude striving for news.

Richmond, Va., 4.—The full vote of this city for Cleveland 7,600, for Blaine 5,820. Cleveland's majority 1,780, a republican gain of 650. Blaine's gain in the Jackson ward, known as "Africa," is over 700.

The returns from 80 precincts of this State show a democratic gain of 111. This indicates a very close vote, and if the ratio of democratic gains is not increased in the remaining precincts, the State may go republican.

WEST VIRGINIA.

Wheeling, W. Va., 1.—Five precincts in this city give Brannon for Congress 137 majority, a democratic loss of 195 over the October election.

Bart, republican, for Congress, gets a majority in Parkersburg of 318, a gain over Maxwell of 117.

Eight precincts in the city give Bart, republican, for Congress, 140 majority, a republican gain of 264 over the October vote. Parkersburg district complete, Barbee for Congress, 1,078; Gibson, 760; Blaine, 979; Cleveland, 777, a Republican gain of 1.

WISCONSIN.

Milwaukee, 4.—At 1 o'clock this morning 201 of 1,200 towns and precincts of the State had reported. They show a democratic gain of 6,900 ov

1880. If a like rate of increase is had in the remaining precincts it will give the State to Cleveland. The Presidential vote is claimed by both the republican and democratic State committees.

VERMONT.

White River, Vt., 4.—Returns from 140 towns give Blaine 21,241, Cleveland 12,694, Butler 578, St. John 1,165; Blaine's plurality 15,545; Garfield's plurality, 19,051. If the remaining 120 towns give a proportionate vote to the above Blaine's majority will be upwards of 25,000. The vote for St. John is drawn mostly from the republican party, while Butler's comes from the democrats.

Cincinnati, 4.—The quietness of the election was broken in the afternoon about 4 o'clock in the Eighth Ward, by the refusal of the bystanders at the polls, many of whom were armed with clubs, to permit colored men to vote. The voters thus disfranchised went to the United States marshal for advice and this gave rise to numerous rumors that the negroes were going to organize, and with a force of deputy marshals march in a body to cast their votes. This brought a crowd to the polls, and the excitement was increased by patrol wagons hastening to the scene. The negroes did not organize and attempt to vote in a body, and the crowd gradually melted away. Soon after this, at the other precinct of the same ward, a well known citizen, John D. Caldwell, accompanied a colored man to the polls to vote. The vote was challenged and the judges were about to examine the man under oath, when the bystanders forcibly ejected the colored man from the place. The mob pursued him, caught and beat him until a half dozen or more policemen succeeded in extricating the negro from their hands. Soon after this a challenged white voter was knocked down by some lawless bystanders. The situation at both the precincts of this ward from that time till the polls closed was threatening, and crowds lined the streets in the vicinity, expecting a disturbance. In the Eighteenth Ward in the afternoon Peter Kelly stabbed seriously, if not fatally, Policeman Honeyman, on duty at the polls, the provocation was that Honeyman had struck Kelly's brother earlier in the day.

Trenton, N. J., 4.—Police Justice Stahl, democrat, was arrested here this evening, while on his way to the court, on complaint of James W. Bennett, who charges that Stahl bribed one W. Ely. He was held in \$5,000 bail. A complaint was also sworn out against Frank W. Labor, a prominent democrat, for bribery.

Chicago, 4.—At one precinct in the Second ward, after the polls closed, James Smith, colored, a U. S. marshal, got into an altercation with Wm. Curran, a special constable. Smith was taken away by two other U. S. marshals, John Fitcher, colored, and "Black Jack" Yattaw, a notorious character. They were followed by Curran and a number of others. After going a short distance, Yattaw and Smith turned and fired into the crowd, killing Curran and slightly wounding Moses Zeimeinsk. The three marshals were arrested.

Trenton, N. J., 4.—There is sudden trouble here. Prosecutor Bearsley has ordered the arrest of a number of republicans and others on the charge of bribery. Among the number are said to be two very prominent persons. Warrants have been issued for the arrest of persons alleged to have sold their votes. Up to 1 o'clock a very large republican vote had been polled the democrats apparently holding back.

St. Johns, N. B., 4.—In the two recent gales of Saturday and the previous Thursday, terrible havoc was wrought in shipping on the Newfoundland and Labrador coasts. The British brig *Dugong* was lost with all hands at Western Head. The schooners *Topsy* and *Julia* were totally wrecked, the crew hardly escaping with their lives. Eleven other vessels were lost. No particulars of the disasters have yet been received. At Tar Bay an unknown vessel was lost with all hands. The wreck is in pieces, most of it being driven ashore.

Trenton, N. J., 5.—Somerset county gives Cleveland 2,000 majority. The State Senate is republican by one majority.

Richmond, Va., 5.—Fuller returns are more encouraging to the democrats and they claim the Cleveland ticket elected by not less than 3,000 majority. Republicans still stand to their claim of from 3,000 to 5,000 majority for Blaine.

Atlanta, Ga., 5.—The republican State committee, claim that the democratic majority of 1880 has been reduced. Democratic majority from 35,000 to 50,000.

New York, 5.—In 1,349 election districts outside the cities of New York and Brooklyn give Blaine 313,700. Cleveland 268,394, Butler 8,361, St. John 16,090. Net democratic gain 1,725.

Wall Street, 10 a.m.—Stocks opened excited, lower; declined $\frac{1}{2}$ to $\frac{3}{4}$. Union Pacific fell off $\frac{3}{4}$, Lackawanna 2 $\frac{1}{2}$. The decline in the remainder of the list is comparatively slight.

Pittsburg, 5.—Blaine's plurality in Allegheny county is 16,000. The full republican county and legislative ticket is elected. Jas. W. Hopkins, democrat, defeated by Jas. C. Negley 22d congressional district. Thomas M. Boyne, republican, 23d district is re-elected.

Augusta, Me., 5.—Conflicting reports and rumors have been coming to Augus-

ta all night, but the latest dispatches received by Blaine this morning give him a majority of 5,000 to 8,000 in New York and confirm his election.

Petersburg, Va., 5.—Returns received from several precincts in the Fourth Congressional District up to this morning, show Blaine and Logan 4,464, Cleveland and Hendricks, 2,377.

Jacksonville, Fla., 5.—News received this morning simply confirms last night's news that the democrats elected their entire ticket. Precise figures cannot be given till to-morrow, owing to lack of telegraphic communication with remote points. Kisbee, republican, defeated in the second district by 1,000.

Baltimore, 5.—Cleveland's plurality, 6,716. Of six Congressmen the democrats elect five, a gain of one. McComas, republican in the Sixth District, re-elected.

Albany, 5.—At 11 a.m. the *Evening Journal* claims New York State in doubt, and that the official vote will be needed to decide. The congressional delegation will be 17 republicans to 17 democrats.

New York, 5.—One thousand three hundred and seventy-nine election districts outside the cities of New York and Brooklyn give Blaine 318,614, Cleveland 272,329, Butler 8,484, St. John 16,296; net democratic gain 10,807.

Later.—1,555 election districts outside of New York City and Brooklyn give Blaine 351,310, Cleveland 299,264, Butler 9,378, St. John 17,730.

OHIO.

The republican majority in the State will probably exceed 30,000, and may reach 40,000. 27 counties show a net republican gain over October of 6,755, not including Hamilton.

COLORADO.

One hundred and ninety-seven precincts outside of Denver give Blaine 6,180, Cleveland 4,966. Congressmen, republican, 5,936; Congressmen, democrat, 5,147. Governor, republican, 5,706; governor, democrat, 5,624. Indications point to republican majorities on the rest of the State and legislative ticket.

Milwaukee, Wis., 5.—Wisconsin returns continue to show large democratic gains, making the estimate very close. It is claimed by both parties by a very small majority.

ILLINOIS.

Six hundred and sixty-four precincts including 124 in Cook County and Chicago, for Governor, Oglesby, 147,478; Harrison, 127,150.

INDIANA.

Six hundred and ten voting places show a republican gain of 11,173, democratic gain 6,600, net republican gain of 4,753. About 38 per cent. of the vote heard from.

ILLINOIS.

Chicago, 5.—The returns from Illinois come in very slowly from the State at large. The republican managers claim the State safely republican for the national ticket.

It is expected an approximate estimate will be reached early this afternoon.

Brooklyn, N. Y., 5.—The result of the election in Brooklyn and country towns causes great enthusiasm among the democrats and the independent republicans who co-operated with them in bringing about the victory. Figures on electoral ticket show that Cleveland has a majority in King's County, over Blaine of 15,152, Butler's vote is 2,091, St. John 1,369. The democrats have elected three out of four members of Congress. Nine out of twelve assemblymen and also elected three sheriffs, city judge, comptroller and auditor, besides a majority of supervisors.

Wilmington, N. C., 5.—The State has gone so overwhelmingly democratic that all interest in the returns has ceased to exist. The democrats carry the first, third, fourth, fifth, sixth, seventh, eighth and ninth Congressional districts. The republicans carry the second district. A democratic gain of one. It is almost certain the democrats have two-thirds majority in the legislature.

Hartford, 5.—The vote of Connecticut for President, with only the small town of Washington to hear from, is 136,532, of which Blaine has 65,738, Cleveland 66,952, St. John 225, Butler 1,367. Cleveland's plurality 1,214.

The vote for Governor is 137,346. Harrison, republican, 66,436; Waller, democrat, 67,689; Palmer, prohibitionist, 1,844; Burtis, Butler, 1,377. Waller's plurality 1,235; Waller's minority 984. The legislature is largely republican, and will elect Senator Platt. The Senate 17 republicans to 7 democrats, a republican gain of 4. The House of Representatives 160 republicans to 89 democrats, a republican gain of 10. Republican majority on joint ballot 81; last year 67.

Total vote for Congressman in the State was: Republican 67,983; democratic 66,805; prohibition 1,801; Butler 1,391. Republican plurality 178. Total vote for Congressmen, 49 larger than for President.

The republicans gain one Congressman in the State.

FLORIDA.

Jacksonville, 5.—Unofficial returns from all but three counties in the second Congressional district indicate the election of Dougherty, democrat, over Bisbee, republican, by 700 plurality. The State is democratic by 4,000 majority.

GEORGIA.

Augusta, 5.—Geo. T. Barnes for Congress elected from Tenth District

practically without opposition. Georgia sends a solid democratic delegation to Congress.

INDIANA.

Indianapolis, 5.—Putnam county, democratic majority 358, a republican gain of 83; Cass county, democratic majority 484, a republican gain of 331; Laporte county, democratic majority 900, a democratic gain of 66; Martin county, democratic majority 285, a democratic gain of 46; Grant county, republican majority 750, a republican gain of 147; Whitley county, democratic majority 360, a democratic gain of 82. There is every indication that the vote is very close. At noon the democratic committee claim the State by 5,000. The republican committee is equally confident, but do not give figures.

ILLINOIS.

Chicago, 5.—Cook county, with 18 precincts outside of the city missing, gives Cleveland 59,888, Blaine 66,762. Blaine's majority 6,894. In the remaining districts the estimated majority, is 7,500 republican loss of 3,014 compared with 1880, for governor, with 33 counties and precincts missing. Cook county gives Harrison, democrat, for governor, a majority of 1,888.

Net republican majority on State ticket as far as heard from, 22,135; 5 counties to hear from out of 102.

Nineteen counties in Illinois, outside of Cook, with 13 precincts to hear from, show Blaine's majorities aggregate 11,219; compared with Garfield's in 1880 it shows a republican loss of 2,497. Cleveland's majorities aggregate 5,239; compared with Hancock's, it shows a gain of 906; net democratic gain 3,403. There are 102 counties in the State, and this ratio continued would reduce the republican majority by about 17,000 compared with Garfield's (40,716) in 1880.

Chicago, 5.—Returns to the *Times* from the State up to midnight indicate that the delegation in Congress will stand: republicans 12, democrats 8. The present delegation stands republicans 11, democrats 8, independent 1. Returns on members of the State Legislature are meagre from many districts. The *Times* claims there will be a democratic majority on joint ballot. The *News* claims it will be republican by a small majority.

KANSAS.

Atchison, 5.—Atchison county complete, except one precinct, gives Martin, republican, for governor, 148 majority over Glyck, who carried it by 1,300 in 1882. Col. Martin estimates the plurality in the State at 30,000 to 40,000. The *Champion* claims the State for Blaine by over 50,000 plurality. The vote for St. John is insignificant. The complexion of the legislature will insure the return of a republican senator.

Topeka, 5.—At 8 p.m. the Republican State committee estimate Blaine's majority at 50,000, and Martin, republican, for governor, at 40,000. Every republican Congressman is elected, and the Legislature is nearly unanimously republican. There was much scratching on local tickets, delaying the returns.

LOUISIANA.

New Orleans, 5.—The friends of Boatner and Morey concede General King's election to Congress in the fifth district by 3,000. Governor Kellogg's friends admit his defeat for Congress in the third district by E. J. Gay, protectionist democrat and a wealthy sugar planter.

MICHIGAN.

Detroit, Mich., 5.—There is no doubt now that the republicans have elected their State and electoral tickets. The *Free Press* (dem.) still claims the victory, but by very small pluralities. The upper peninsula reports large and increased majorities for the republican ticket, which will overcome the democratic gain in the lower peninsula. The *Post*, republican, claims the election of the republican ticket by from 10,000 to 15,000 plurality. The exact result is all the Congressional districts is not yet known, but is decided that the fifth, sixth, seventh, eighth and tenth elect the fusion candidates; the third, fourth, ninth and eleventh republican; the second and fifth are still claimed by both parties.

NEW YORK.

New York, 5.—The latest returns from New York State, outside of New York and Kings counties, show 1,432 election districts already reported from that section of an average republican plurality which has been as nearly as possible to 35 in each. If the 564 districts yet to be heard from return the same average plurality they will yield 19,740 plurality for Blaine. This, added to the 49,930 plurality shown by those already reported, will make the republican plurality, exclusive of New York and Kings county, 67,678. The democratic plurality in New York county is, according to the latest compilation, 42,786 and that of Kings 15,152. It appears, therefore, that the democratic plurality of 57,938 will be overcome, with upwards of 11,000 to spare, by the plurality with which Blaine comes to Harlem river. The counties which are lacking chiefly, are Albany, Allegheny, Cataugus, Cayuga, Chautauqua, Clinton, Delaware, Dutchess, Essex, Fulton, Hamilton, Herkimer, Jefferson, Madison, Montgomery, Ontario, St. Lawrence, Schenectady, Schoharie, Steuben, Sullivan, Tompkins, Ulster and Westchester.

Buffalo, 5.—The different newspaper offices are surrounded by large crowds eagerly scanning the bulletins

as they come in. There is great uncertainty as to the result in the State at the democratic headquarters. Blaine's majority outside of New York and Kings county is placed at 44,000, while the claim is made that New York City will give Cleveland the State by 10,000. These latter figures are based on private telegrams. There is a feeling of great uncertainty among the democratic leaders and but little enthusiasm is manifested at the republican headquarters.

Ithaca, 5.—Congressman Arnott, protection democrat, is elected.

Kingston, 5.—The republicans elected Lindsley to Congress by 1,500.

John M. Farquar, republican, is elected to Congress, and Col. John B. Weber, republican, is elected in the Thirty-third Congressional District.

New York, 2.—One thousand five hundred and eleven districts outside of the cities of New York and Brooklyn give Blaine 344,074 and Cleveland 291,801, Butler 9,264, St. John 13,436, a net democratic gain of 11,272. If this ratio holds out the republicans will carry the State by 10,000.

New York, 5.—One thousand seven hundred districts outside of New York City and Brooklyn gave Blaine 389,404, Cleveland 332,100, Butler 10,560, St. John 20,029. Net democratic gain Garfield 4,243 plurality. A late connection gives Cleveland a plurality in New York City of 43,233.

One thousand six hundred and thirty five election districts in New York State outside of the cities of New York and Brooklyn give Blaine 366,847, Cleveland 311,379, Butler 9,547, St. 18,908.

Buffalo, 5.—The excitement is still unabated. Both parties claim the State. Different newspapers are crowded with those anxious to hear the latest reports. Both parties are parading and cheering candidates. The streets are crowded with excited people. There have been few disturbances of a serious nature. Blaine's plurality in the city is 1,043.

Albany, N. P., 5.—The *Argus* will say to-morrow: "Cleveland is elected and he will be inaugurated. The State is not at all in doubt, but elects Cleveland and Hendricks, who will take the seats to which the people have appointed them."

New York, 5.—The *Sun* has received returns from every county in the State and revised returns complete from 54 out of 60 counties. They give Cleveland 1,643 plurality.

The *Sun* in a later issue confirms this.

The city and county ticket of the County democracy headed by ex-Mayor, Mm. R. Grace for Mayor, is elected, excepting the coroner, by majorities ranging from 7,000 to 15,000. Deputy coroner, M. J. B. Messner (Tammany Hall) is elected coroner by 19,000 majority.

NEW JERSEY.

Trenton, 5.—Nothing definite is known of New Jersey. That State, as well as Virginia, is claimed by the two parties. The elements of uncertainty are many. Later returns to-day may satisfactorily settle the question, but at this writing it looks as though the official figures would be necessary to determine the result of the election.

NEBRASKA.

Omaha, 5.—The State has gone republican by 20,000 majority. Nearly all the democratic nominees have received a majority in Douglas county, Brown, for Congress, receiving over Weaver, the present incumbent, 3,000 votes.

PENNSYLVANIA.

Philadelphia, 5.—A plurality of 70,000 is indicated for Blaine here. Complete returns from all the State legislative districts except Wayne county, show that the Senate will have 31 republicans and 19 democrats, the House 140 republicans and 59 democrats with two doubtful districts in Wayne county. This will give the republicans 91 majority on the joint ballot, even should the democrats carry the Wayne county candidates. In the present Legislature the democrats have a majority of 15 on joint ballot as follows: Senate—Republicans 30, democrats 20. House—Republicans 88, democrats 119.

TENNESSEE.

Nashville, 5.—The following republican congressmen are elected in this State: Pettibone in the First district, Hetck in the Second and Taylor in the Tenth. The rest of the congressional delegation is democratic. The democratic majority in the legislature is considerably reduced. Bate, democrat, for Governor, is probably elected by a reduced majority.

TEXAS.

Galveston, 5.—Later returns from all portions of the State do not materially change the result as given in last night's dispatches. Reports from Marshall and other points in the Black Belt, show many negroes voted national democratic ticket. Ireland, for Governor, runs behind the balance of the democratic State ticket at all precincts in Northern Texas. Returns from the southern counties of the Seventh congressional district show that Crain, democrat, has carried many precincts by large majorities which went for Ochildree, republican, two years ago. Galveston county gives Crain 2,500 majority, electing him by 4,000 plurality.

VIRGINIA.

Petersburg, 5.—The democrats are claiming the State by 2,000 majority. Senator Mahone claims it for the republicans by 3,000. There are large crowds on the streets awaiting the returns.
