

AGITATORS MUST LEAVE DENVER

Citizens' Alliance Will Take the
Matter Up.

TO BE RUN OUT OF TOWN.

They Have Been Conspicuous in Labor
Troubles—Typographical Union
Condemns Plan as Outrage.

Denver, Colo., Aug. 3.—The Citizens' alliance of Denver has issued a call for a mass meeting at the Denver chamber of commerce for tonight with the implied understanding that action will be taken to run out of town certain agitators who have been conspicuous in the recent labor troubles in Denver.

The printers' union, in resolutions adopted at yesterday's meeting, has expressed its intention of its members to oppose the alliance to the utmost.

The resolutions of the printers state that the attitude of the alliance is fraught with peril to the liberty of the people and is an incentive to lawlessness. The typographical union condemns such steps as outrageous and anarchistic in the extreme, concluding as follows:

"Resolved, That we warn members of the Denver Citizens' alliance against taking such action because of the consequence that will occur, and further warn members of any organized labor body assaulted in such a manner to protect himself to the utmost extent."

MINERS WANT TO GET BACK.

Denver, Aug. 3.—The fourteen members of the Idaho Springs miners who were expelled to leave that place by citizens who formed themselves into a committee for that purpose the day after the blowing up with dynamite of the buildings of the Sun and Moon mine today addressed a letter to the sheriff of Clear Creek county in which Idaho Springs is located informing him that they wished to return to their homes and requesting his protection. This is in line with the advice given them by Governor Peabody at the time the miners asked him to order out troops to assist them in returning to Idaho Springs. Gov. Peabody told the miners to first make application for protection to the civil authorities and, failing in this, he would then consider the request of him. Should the sheriff decline to grant the request of the miners, they will then renew their pleas to the governor.

An answer from the governor is expected by tomorrow. News from Idaho Springs today is to the effect that the camp was quiet today. Rumors are in circulation there that several of the members of the Miners' union who were placed under arrest immediately after the Sun and Moon affair have admitted to the district attorney that there was a conspiracy to blow up the building of the Sun and Moon company but there is no confirmation of them. The district attorney declines to discuss the stories.

CASSIUS M. CLAY'S WILL.

A Second One is Produced by His Child Wife Dora.

Lexington, Ky., Aug. 2.—Another will of the late Cassius M. Clay, executed March 28, 1901, a year after the one to be offered for probate tomorrow in Richmond, has been produced by Dora Clay Brook, the former child-wife of the late Cassius M. Clay. The will is in Clay's own handwriting and sealed on the back with his private seal ring in green wax.

The will is dated 1891 and appoints Dora Brook, his former wife, and two others selected by her, as executors, and gives them one-half of the proceeds of certain sales, and the other half to be divided among his children and 300 acres shall remain, including house, trees, etc., forever, the same intact, the finest natural park on earth. It shall be in fee simple, the property of the United States of America, in trust for the inhabitants of this state. It shall be so long under the care of my executors as may be deemed best by the federal government, and shall be under their direction, and supporting the purposes of this legacy."

INSULTED THE PRESIDENT.

irate Bicycle Rider Uses Profane
And Abusive Language to Him.

Oyster Bay, N. Y., Aug. 2.—Profane and abusive language was directed toward President Roosevelt and his family today as they were driving up to Christ church to attend the morning service. The offender was a resident of Oyster Bay, by name. He was heard by the clergyman, who was accompanied by the president's family, and was immediately arrested by the police. The man was taken to the police station and is now being held for further investigation.

TRIED TO BLOW UP BRIDGE.

Desperate Attempt Made Near Livingston, Mont.

Livingston, Mont., Aug. 2.—A desperate attempt was made by unknown parties to blow up the bridge crossing the Yellowstone river east of this city, and wreck the eastbound passenger train. The explosion was heard in the eastern part of the city. No part of Livingston escaped the severe shock. The big bridge was twisted out of alignment.

CHERRY PITS IN THE APPENDIX.

New York, Aug. 3.—Nearly 30 cherry pits have been found in the appendix of a patient who was being operated on in a Brooklyn hospital. The collection of the stones had caused appendicitis, however. Their discovery was due to an operation for cancer of the stomach.

What the doctors are unwilling to guess. Not only the appendix but a large space of the intestine was filled with the pits. After the cancerous growth had been cut away the surgeons took away the pits and the patient quickly recovered.

Earthquake in California.

San Francisco, Aug. 2.—An earthquake lasting nearly 30 seconds was experienced here this morning. The quake was of the longest duration in many years. It was not of a violent character and reports of damage are not looked for. Other California points felt the shock. Stanford university reports that the shock lasted 45 seconds.

CONDITIONS IN CHINA.

Getting Back to Where They Were Before Coup d'Etat of 1908.

Peking, Aug. 2.—China is witnessing a return to the conditions which followed the coup d'etat of 1908. Political discussion among the Chinese, which increased during the Imperial court's recent policy of friendliness toward foreigners, has suddenly stopped. The plan of the dowager empress to terrify the reformers by the execution of Shen Chin, which occurred last Friday, has been successful. RUSSIA MAY WAR WITH JAPAN

While Averse to Hostilities She
Will Not Hesitate

TO PROTECT HER INTERESTS

In Manchuria—Asiatic Squadron
Ordered to Assemble for Maneuvers
In Vicinity of Vladivostok.

Tokio, July 18, via Victoria, B. C., Aug. 2.—The way of Marquis Ito, who has been made president of the privy council, is cleared for his ascendancy in the national council. Count Matsukata and Marquis Yamagata have been made privy councilors. The appointments, which were impressively conferred by the two latter, as well as by the Japanese public. They were the result of the recent conference of elder statesmen at the instance of Marquis Ito. The cabinet was reconstructed yesterday by Viscount Yoshikawa and Baron Hirata and Kikuchi retiring, their portfolios being added to those held by Baron Kiyuna, Baron Sone and Gen. Baron Kodama. This readjustment of the cabinet is regarded as a temporary expedient, pending the construction of a new administration in the event of war.

The real point of the domestic changes is the elevation of Marquis Ito to a position where he will be removed from the disabling odium of party management and be able at any time to take the reins. The so-called "domestic crisis," transparently made to seem like a material squabble, is believed to be a carefully arranged peevishness against imminent war. Telegrams published in Japanese papers within the last few days from north China show the situation to be threatening.

A dispatch received by the Chinese government from the minister in St. Petersburg states that M. Witte, Russian minister of finance, while averse to hostilities, will not hesitate to open war with Japan to protect Russia's position in Manchuria.

The Russian Asiatic squadron has been ordered to assemble for maneuvers in the vicinity of Vladivostok. The Japanese standing squadron is now engaged in summer maneuvers off Hokkaido. Thus, says the Japan Herald, the main naval forces of Japan and Russia are "naturally" attracted to northern waters.

TWO DEAD BODIES.

One Was a Murdered Woman's,
Other that of a Suicide.

Northboro, Mass., Aug. 2.—Frank Foss, while on his way home tonight heard screams in the direction of Grange hall on School street. Hastening in that direction he came upon two dead bodies lying in a yard close to the sidewalk. According to the police, they were the bodies of F. E. Egan and Mrs. Sadie Booth. Both were found dead.

Booth was 24 years old and had been living for the past month with her sister at Northboro. Her throat was cut almost completely across. Death had been almost instantaneous. The man's throat was cut in a similar manner, but not quite so deep. There was another cut higher on the neck and the left arm. The theory of the police is that the man cut the woman's throat and then killed himself.

MISUNDERSTOOD ORDERS.

Two Freight Trains Collided Head-
on, Killing Three Men.

Somerset, Ky., Aug. 2.—Through a misunderstanding of orders two Queen and Crescent freight trains, both double-headed, collided head on last night between Cumberland Falls and Greenwood, killing six men, fatally injuring one and seriously hurting another. The bodies of the two brakemen were found under the debris where 40 cars are wrecked.

One of the engines was wrecked and the other damaged. Engineers Duke and Fitzgerald were severely injured. Duke may die. Engineers Klein and Harwood jumped.

BIG DIAMOND ROBBERY.

Mrs. Samuel Parker of Honolulu
Loses \$80,000 Worth.

Honolulu, Aug. 2.—(By Pacific Cable to the Associated Press).—Mrs. Samuel Parker has been robbed of \$80,000 worth of jewelry, consisting chiefly of diamonds, rubies and other stones. She wore the jewels on Saturday night at a reception held to signalize the opening of a new hotel.

Several hours later the thief or thieves entered her home and stole many of the gems she had displayed. Mrs. Parker, who is the wife of Col. Samuel Parker, one of the wealthiest men in Hawaii, was the wife of J. K. Campbell, who left her one-third of his \$400,000 estate.

She was married to Col. Parker about a year and a half ago and on the same day her eldest daughter was wedded to Prince David.

CHINESE EDITORS.

Seven Are Arrested on the Charge
Of Sedition.

Pekin, Aug. 3.—In connection with the recent arrest at Shanghai of seven Chinese editors on charges of sedition and the probable decision turning the editors over to Chinese jurisdiction, a representative of the reformers has sent the following letter to the Associated Press:

"We earnestly hope that the authorities of the civilized nations will give a timely warning to this government, which seems preparing a battle for the true lovers of China."

"It would be very discouraging to progressive Chinese if the seven reformers under arrest at Shanghai should be surrendered to the Chinese government, which is, of course, offensive and sedition, yet they should not be punished as though they had spoken in a manner against the American or British government, which exists for the welfare of the people."

The letter concludes: "Is there any hope for China except in revolution or rebellion?"

SHERIFF GETS HIS MAN.

Negro Charged With Assaulting and
Killing Mrs. Beavers Caught.

Charlotte, N. C., Aug. 2.—Wilford Roseboro, the negro who is charged with having assaulted Mrs. D. Beavers in Fredell county, then murdering her and throwing her body into a well, is in Charlotte jail. He was brought here tonight by Sheriff Summers of Fredell county for safe keeping.

Roseboro was captured in Polk county yesterday and taken to Asheville jail. When it became known in Statesville that the sheriff was coming there with his prisoner, a mob began to form for the purpose of lynching Roseboro. This was just before the arrival of the train which brought the prisoner to Charlotte.

After the mob had been dispersed, and took his prisoner to Mooresville by private conveyance, and there caught a train for Charlotte. When captured Roseboro had two pistols and a razor on his person.

Mrs. Rose of Rocky Mount, who was assaulted Saturday by a negro, on returning to her home, said her assailant was named Till Black. He is known and his capture is certain, though up to tonight he has eluded his pursuers. 4 head killed.

Cows, Isle of Wight, Aug. 2.—The royal yacht Victoria and Albert arrived here this evening, and King Edward and Queen Alexandra issued an address to the Irish people, in which he expressed great satisfaction and pleasure on account of his reception in Ireland.

No Trace of Baby Lappina.

New York, Aug. 2.—Although spurred in their efforts by officers of a large reward, the police have not been able to find the missing child of the late John J. Lappina, daughter of Giacomo Lappina, an Italian fruit dealer residing in West Forty-sixth street. The child, who is two years old and one-half old, disappeared 12 days ago.

At first it was thought she had been kidnapped, but a thorough search leads to the belief that the little one was kidnapped.

From neighbors, the detectives have learned that a private carriage, in which rode a richly dressed woman, was seen about the place before the baby disappeared. The woman was seen in the vicinity of the Lappina home, and it is believed that she was the kidnapper.

The searchers are now daily convinced the woman was a kidnapper. No motive for stealing the child has been found, however.

A Forbidden City Mystery Explained.

Boston, Mass., Aug. 3.—One of the mysteries connected with the Forbidden city, the light house, which is the strange appearance in the Boston art museum of what is said to be the famous sacred jeweled tree belonging to the imperial family of China.

For more than two centuries this treasure, made of native Chinese precious stones, standing two and a half feet high, and radiating a brilliant mass of colors, had been closely guarded day and night by a few persons knowing of its existence, where it was kept. Its disappearance several years ago, before the Chinese broke caused a furor among Chinese officials.
