LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

Slightly Wrong.—The District Court is adjourned until the 22nd inst., friend Herald, not the "23rd."

Behind Time.—The Utah Southern passenger train was an hour late last evening, on account of having to wait for the freight train.

High Council.—The members of the High Council are requested to meet at the Council House on Friday evening, the 12th inst., at 7 o'clock.

Departures.—Chief Justice Hunter, Judge McBride and Col. Meritt, of the Salt Lake bar, left for the east this morning. Captain Codman and lady also took their departure for New York by the morning express.

Try Again.—The Herald says, "The Utah and Northern Railroad was snow bound, yesterday, and did not arrive in Ogden in time to connect with the Utah Central." When did the "Railroad" arrive there?

Delayed by Snow.—The Utah and Northern passenger train yesterday morning, due here at 8.55, did not arrive till three in the afternoon, on account of the huge piles of snow along the divide between Mendon and Doreville. The "beautiful" is also making itself painfully familiar with the track all along north of Logan, and the narrow gauge has hard pulling.

Removal.—Messrs. C. W. Stayer and Jos. F. Simmons, have removed from their old quarters, into more commodious and comfortable apartments, at the rear of Squire's Barber Shop. Their old office is being refitted for the use of the Western Union Telegraph Company, which will occupy the whole of the building.

Condensing.—Our worthy morning cotter, the Herald, has slightly altered its appearance, most of its telegraph now being set in motion, while the local matter is solidified. The cause assigned for the changes is the necessity for an enlarged space. The alterations rather improve than mar its looks, and, of course it can now be called more solid than ever.

Across the Continent.—Kirkham and Kinnerley's mammoth panorama exhibited in the Twelfth Ward last night, and will show forth in the 17th Ward this evening. The paintings are home productions, from the brushes of our talented local artists, Messrs. Kirkham and Lambourn, and represent the principal cities and scenes lying between New York and San Francisco. Go and see the show.

City Council. — Proceedings at the City Council on Tuesday evening, December 9th, 1879.

Mayor Latta presiding.

The committee on claims, to whom was referred the quarterly report of the supervisor of streets, reported that they had examined the vouchers, and recommended that the same be approved, and recommended that the balance due the supervisor, \$3,695.89, be appropriated. Adopted.

The auditor of public accounts submitted his quarterly report of the financial condition of Salt Lake City Corporation, ending November 30th, 1879, which showed: Balance in treasury at the beginning of quarter (September 1st), \$590.75; receipts during quarter, \$55,448.07; total resources, \$56,038.82; disbursements during quarter, \$51,199.75; balance on hand December 1st, 1879, \$4,839.07. Referred to committee in Finance.

The committee on claims, to whom was referred the bill of County Clerk D. Bookholt, for certified copies of registry lists, reported and recommended that the bill be allowed and the amount, \$60.00, appropriated. Adopted.

The report of the city treasurer for the fiscal year ending November 30th, 1879, was presented. The report set forth that during the fiscal year there had been received into the treasury from all sources the sum of \$100,224.25, and there had been disbursed on warrants issued by the auditor \$157,372.06. The redeemed auditor's warrants for the fiscal year, amounting to \$157,372.06, as above, the treasurer solicited the council to order to be destroyed. Referred to the committee on Finance with instructions to destroy the warrants, if found correct.

The superintendent of water works submitted a report of the expenditures in his department for the two quarters ending respectively August 31st and November 30th, 1879. The total amount of water service pipes laid for consumers during the six months were 75. Total cost of said service, \$1,631.63, or an average of \$21.74 each. Report received and referred to committee on water works.

Adjourned to next Tuesday evening at the usual hour.

Court adjourned until 22nd inst., at 10 o'clock.

Suit for Damages.—Oliver Ostler, whose name was associated some time ago with the Church cattle stealing affair, and who, at the time, was suspected and arrested for complicity therein, and subsequently discharged from custody without examination, as no evidence appeared on which to criminate him, has now instituted proceedings against Officers Alex Burt, W. G. Phillips and J. W. Hyde, for alleged false imprisonment and general maltreatment; the complaint setting forth that he (Ostler) was incarcerated for 18 hours bruised and wounded while in custody of the police officers. The amount sued for is the modest sum of \$10,000. The defendants are given 10 days in which to answer the complaint. As the District Court in Ogden has adjourned over until the 22nd inst., the matter will probably be heard here.
