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AN ELABORATE PARASOL.

A wealth of handwork goes to the fashioning of this fetching parasol, in which white silk, an abundance of white chiffon, and some creamy appliques of Russian gimp are used to bring advantage. The foundation is of white tulle, the wires of the frame being encased in white and then wound all over with a white fine silk, the tips being silver-gilt. There is a broad ruffle of chiffon at the top, and the chiffon is drawn from this in broad folds, held down tightly for a short distance, and then spreading out in puffs that are tucked at intervals to yards the tips. The appliques of gimp seem to hold the chiffon in place, and the entire parasol is edged with a chiffon boudienne that makes for a soft and dainty finish to the whole.
