AN ELABORATE PARASOL.

A wealth of handwork goes to the fashioning of this fetching parasol, in which white silk, an abundance of white chiffon, and some creamy appliqués of Russian guipure are used to telling advantage. The foundation is of white taffeta, the wires of the frame being enamelled in white and then wound all over with a white lace silk, the tips being silver-gilt. There is a large rosette of chiffon at the top, and the chiffon is drawn from this in broad folds, held down tightly for a short distance, and then spreading out in puffs that are tucked at intervals towards the tips. The appliqués of guipure seem to hold the chiffon in place, and the entire parasol is edged with a chiffon boudoirine that makes for a soft and dainty finish to the whole.
