The second in Indian Territory—Mesa of Mesita.

Messy Settlement, Cheyenne Nation Indian Territory, Sept. 28th, 1894.

President Andrew Kimball. Dear Brother—As you desired in your last letter that we notify you of the completion of our Messy house of worship, it is with the greatest pleasure that we now tell you the information that the same is completed and now stands out in bold relief, a credit to the Indian mission, and a monument which covers the hearts of the Latter-day Saints in great pride.

When work was first commenced by us upon this building the anxiety by which it being about its completion had indeed been maintained, but from the fact that we were so well maintained in the completion of our second house of worship in this Indian Territory.

Every one who passes along the highway here admiringly as well as in wonder, upon our little Messy house. Not only that, but it is a great decoration to the Territory, for the first thing that strikes the eye is the inscription standing out in bold relief, "Latter-day Meeting House, Mesa of Mesita, Sept. 28th, 1894."

On Sunday, the 25th inst., we held a building school in our meeting house for the first time. After a short school meeting was held, President Andrew Kimball, in his address, said that the building of this Messy house was a great credit to the Territory, and that the Latter-day Saints should be proud of it.

Elder Hensel G. Winter then bore his testimony to the ability of the Latter-day Saints to build a house of worship for every nation, kindred, tongue, and people of the Kingdom of God.

Elder E. L. Simmons then spoke of the building of this Messy house, and of the fact that it is a great credit to the Territory, and that the Latter-day Saints should be proud of it.

Next Saturday and Sunday being our conference, we expect to fully realize our desire in dedicating our Messy house to the Lord, and thereby add to the Indian Territory mission a step towards the fulfillment of the same of truth.
