Ideal For Grazing—C. B. Stewart has returned from a trip through the Utah forest reserve. He reports grazing conditions are ideal in that locality and says there is room for 10,000 to 15,000 more sheep on the range.

Furniture Store Leased—Hyman Harris has given a 10 year lease to the Nebraska Furniture company, of the premises 237-239, State street. The building is 35 feet front by 230 feet deep, and three stories high.

Trusty In Jail Again—Frank Hutchins, a trusty who had been missing from the county jail since Thursday, was picked up at the Fair last night by Deputy Sheriff Claude Russell, and returned to prison.

In Liberty Ward—The members of Liberty ward will hold their opening meeting in their new chapel tomorrow evening at 8:30 o'clock. A splendid service is anticipated. President Joseph P. Smith being expected to make an address during the evening. A cordial invitation is extended to the public to be present.

Aids Its Students—The Y. M. C. A. will publish a circular for the benefit of employers seeking various classes of help. A metallurgical and chemical association, with Prof. Blum of the University in charge. The outlook is encouraging.

Lecture To Archaeologists—Prof. A. V. Kidder of Harvard will lecture before the Utah Archaeological Institute this evening in Library hall on "The Pottery of the Southwest." He has explored extensively throughout the ancient ruins of southern Utah, and will have interesting relics to exhibit at the close of the lecture.

Falls Under Wagon—James Smith, an attorney, was thrown from a wagon yesterday afternoon, en route to the fair grounds. He was seated in a wagon waiting to start when the horses started to run. In reaching for the reins, Smith lost his balance, fell to the ground and lay over sustaining painful injuries. He was removed to his home.

Townsite Meeting Adjourns—The regular annual meeting of the stockholders of the Sugar Townsite company, was held at the Shanon building, but owing to the absence from the city of a number of the leading stockholders, the meeting was adjourned until Thursday next at 2 o'clock p. m.

Protest From Tooele—The wool growers of Tooele county are strongly protesting against the proposed establishment of a great sheep pen in the Cedar Mountain country in the Tooele desert, which was asked for by Grantsville citizens in an application addressed to Senator Reed Smoot. The growers say that the land in question is not adapted to forest purpose and that its segregation as such would deny grazing of 50,000 sheep.

Idaho Growers With Utah—That Idaho growers are co-operating with the Utah association plans is evidenced from a communication received yesterday from Adeline E. Gilman of Blackfoot. Mr. Gilman stated that he had a carload of wool ready to ship under the association's eastern storage plan. The officials of the Utah association of wool growers were much pleased to learn that the plan is meeting with favor in other states.

Heart Failure The Cause—Last night Dr. G. M. Chandler held a post mortem over the body of Mrs. J. Taylor, the miner who died in the Sanitarium Thursday evening and learned that the man's death was due to heart failure. It was learned yesterday that the dead man had a wife and daughter residing at Silver Cliff, Col., and efforts are being made to locate Mrs. Taylor. It has been decided that an inquest is unnecessary.

Tribute to Clawson—The Los Angeles Times of a recent date has a half-tone picture of a new portrait just executed by the Utah artist, J. C. Clawson. The picture is of Mrs. Thomas Gibbon, wife of the well known Los Angeles attorney and railroad man. The article devotes nearly a column to a review of the famous portraits, and speaks especially of his recent picture of Ex-Governor Wells.

CUPID IN ERROR IN THREE CASES

Trio of Mismatched and Unhappy Couples Parted by Judge Morse.

DESERTION AND NON-SUPPORT

Hither Quiet Recital of Marital Unrest at Regular Friday Matinee Of Divorce Court.

Three divorces were granted by Judge Morse in the district court yesterday afternoon, in each instance the decree going to wives who sought legal separation, two for non-support and one for desertion.

What might have been a lively proceeding had it come to trial on the original complaint was the case of Mabelle C. Gustavson against D. H. Gustavson. However, a modified complaint was filed yesterday by the plaintiff, by consent of defendant, and the hearing was brief and without sensational feature.

A simple assertion of non-support supplanted the sensational charges of cruelty that Mrs. Gustavson made against her husband, and the counter charges made by Mr. Gustavson against his wife no longer figured in the case. The divorce was granted, and it was left to the parties to the suit to arrange the matter of alimony and attorneys' fees.

Upon the allegation, sufficiently proved, that her husband deserted her nine years ago, Emma Smith was granted a divorce from Haydn Smith. The couple married in England 45 years ago. They had no children.

Mabel Everett Dunn was granted a divorce from Mallard Dunn, whom she married in November, 1902. During the marriage, Mrs. Dunn sought relief in the court and obtained it, and was given her maiden name, Everett.
