raging several hours in the business the loss is half a million.

The fire in Natick is under control; nearly the whole buisness portion of the village is destroyed, three stores only being saved. The loss is estimated at \$500,000. Chas. A. Sherman, engineer of the Fire Department, was killed by a falling wall. Two children are reported missing. The buildings and stocks are pretty well insured; the town loses heavily.

NEW YORK, 13.—This morning a fire occurred in a brick building at 25 E 60th Street, and the flames spread rapidly. It being known that a number of persons were in the house on the second and third stories, alarms were sent out, and in a short time a large number of firemen were on the spot. Every device was resorted to to reach the occupants, but the firemen were driven of at every point by the flames. Jacob Stiner, the well known tea merchant, jumped from one of the back windows of the second story, and was found in the yard dead, burned and mangled; a servant girl named Mary McGuire was also found in the yard with both her legs broken. The firemen in searching the building found the bodies of Mrs. Steiner and her daughter smothered in their rooms. The fire is said to have been caused by an imperfect heater. It is rumored that there are several other bodies in the ruins.

At eleven this forenoon about five thousand persons had assembled in Tompkins Square. The police received orders to drive them out, and while doing it Sergeant Berghold was assaulted by one Myer. Myer, who with others was promptly arrested, stated in the station house that he was ordered by the 10th Ward Association assault any policeman who molested him. The crowd are reported gathering at different points. The crowd that gathered in and around the square had the banners of the workingmen's organization. As soon as Myer assaulted the officer the policemen began a vigorous clubbing, clearing the square. The most intense excitement prevailed, and storekeepers made haste to put up their shutters and close their doors. One man clubbed is said to be dying. Mounted policemen have taken possession of the square.

FOREIGN.

MADRID, 13.—Cartagena has su rrendered, and is now occupied by the government troops under General Dominiquez. Upon the capitulation of the city, the Intransigent Junta and liberated convicts went on board the frigate Numancia, which was attacked by the government squadron, and at the time the last dispatch was forwarded a naval engagement was in progress.

PAPER CURRENCY.—The Nation printed this little story, with a moral, for Congressmen to read during the holidays: "Once upon a time (after the passage of the legal-tender act), as I was walking in a friend's garden, I came upon a summer-house where two little children were playing at keeping shop. Their merchandise was of little intrinsic value, but their currency was still more worthless, for it consisted of pieces of old newspapers.
