New York, Jan. 10.—Following a conference held here between Dr. Emanuel Lasker, chess champion and Frank J. They will play at the New York Chess Club, playing six games in this city, after which Brooklyn, Philadelphia, Washington, Chicago, Memphis and Kansas City, will in turn be visited. ## MEETING OF MAGNATES.

Interesting Session in the Pacific Coast League.

New York, Jan. 9.—The National Association of Baseball Leagues today made some revision in the constitution and elected its officers and board of directors, adding to the latter the name of J. O. O'Brien of Milwaukee, president of the American Baseball league. The Pacific Coast league was granted an enlargement of territorial rights in California. A recommendation was made that all contracts with players shall be uniform, and there shall be no "non-reserve" contracts, save on the consent of the secretary of the National Baseball association. Reports of the Eastern league and the American association, which are in the class of the National association, entered a vigorous and successful protest. The association indorsed a request of Eugene F. Bennett of the Pacific league, that the "drafting" season of that league end uniformly with that of the other leagues, namely, Sept. 15. Mr. Bennett thanked the association for financial aid during the San Francisco disaster.

## GOTCH WILL QUIT.

Frank Gotch is not proud of his title of champion catch-as-catch-can wrestler of the world. He is ashamed of the wrestling business and of the company in which he throws his body. His father and mother are ashamed of it, too, and Gotch is going to get out of it as soon as it ceases to bring him money.

Gotch is worth \$100,000. He is a money maker and a money saver. He has 39 years of land and works upon it each summer. He does not drink or use tobacco. Gotch is almost a perfect man physically, and he takes care of his health.

"It's a poor game, this wrestling," Gotch said. "I don't like it much with Fred Beal. He moved painfully about with a walking stick. My advice to aspirants is to get out of it because there's no money in it, until you are champion. It's a long, hard fight up to that point, and there's room for only one at the top. And after you're pushed away, you're done for good. At the best, you get a little money from five to ten years. It's pretty hard at the end, and it settles down to humdrum life. The old crowd, the glare of the calcium lights, the cries for the champion, the struggle on the mat, and you will rebel. I rebel even now when I stay long on my farm."

But it's a hard game, getting to the top. I've earned every cent I've got. Gotch's father and mother, the former 77 years of age and the latter 55, are both living on their old homestead, near Humboldt.

"They don't take much interest in my wrestling," the champion said. "Some way, mother does not approve of it." There was a look of regret in the big athlete's eyes. Father seldom mentions it to him, he said. "I don't know why they are proud of me or not. They never say so. They know I have made money, but it's the sporting part of it all they don't like. However, when I'm beaten, I'm going back to the farm to live. I wouldn't take a position as trainer in a college, because—well, because it's distasteful to me, and I haven't the patience. I'd hurt someone."

Frank Gotch works on his farm in the summer months. He has two big motor cars in which he takes occasional trips after the day's work is done. He keeps in constant training, especially work, and declares no one can develop as a wrestler as he can.

"The greater part of my two-year-nine years have been spent outside," he said. "And I'm simply a farmer boy. I've learned what it is to strain and tug on the mat. I've never been badly hurt, though a few scars are on my head and body. It takes three days to get rid of the soreness caused by a hard wrestling match."

CORBETT A HAS BEEN.

Denver Fighter Joins the "Down and Out Club" Once More.

Philadelphia, Jan. 9.—Tommy Murphy of New York gave Young Corbett a severe beating in a six-round bout before the National Athletic club tonight. From the first to the sixth round Murphy out-fought the former champion at all stages. In the second round only the sound of the bell saved Corbett from a knockout.

Murphy caused blows on the former Denver fighter and near the close of the round sent Corbett to the floor with a right to the jaw. When Corbett rose, Murphy kept after him, sending lefts and rights to the face and body. When the ring doctor stepped in, Murphy was laughing at the ropes in practically hopeless condition. The one-minute rest brought him back in fairly good condition, but Murphy gave him no opportunity to rest and drove Corbett from one side of the ring to the other, landing on the face and body at almost at will. Corbett got in an occasional blow to the kidneys and back, but they lacked force. In the third round Corbett tried the tactics he worked on McGovern so successfully in their two championship battles. Murphy simply smiled and drove two rights to the jaw with such force that Corbett forgot to talk.

The fourth, fifth and sixth rounds were repetitions of the third. Corbett tried everything in the closing rounds, but Murphy's condition was perfect, but it is probable that Corbett would have tipped the beam close to 10 pounds heavier, slow and wild and outclassed in boxing, hitting and other respects.
