

## PAT CROWE GIVEN GREAT RECEPTION.

Thousands Assembled at Union Station to Greet Omaha's Most Noted Citizen on His Return

## GENTLEMAN WORE SHACKLES.

Police Were There in Large Numbers To See That He Was Safely Landed in Jail.

Omaha, Neb., Oct. 9.—Pat Crowe, shackled to Detective Heintz of the Omaha detective department, and accompanied by Chief Detective Dunne, arrived in Omaha tonight from Butte, Mont., where he was arrested a week ago. A crowd of 2,000 persons had gathered at the union station, and they filled the station and approaches in every direction intent on securing a glimpse at Crowe.

A large cordon of police opened an aisle from the platform of the train to a patrol wagon in the rear of the station, and Crowe, between the two detectives with a patrolman walking ahead and another behind, was marched to the wagon, amid the cheers of some and execrations of others. The extraordinary precaution taken by the police department for landing Crowe safely behind the bars seemed hardly necessary, for his case little heed to them and apparently had no wish to make his escape.

A large crowd followed the patrol wagon to the station, where another crowd had gathered to witness the return of the prisoner, who was hurried into the captain's office, where he was registered. Opposite his name was placed the charge of shooting with intent to kill or wound.

Crowe was not inclined to talk of his case, and refused absolutely to speak of his alleged connection with the kidnapping of Eddie Cuddey. He declared that much had been published of his alleged crimes, confessions and other matters, which was without foundation. Among these he mentioned a confession said to have been signed by him at Butte, implicating young Cuddey in a conspiracy in connection with the kidnapping.

"When this case comes to trial," said Crowe, "the truth will go to the world. I will take care of me; he takes care of everybody and makes no mistakes. I do not feel nearly so anxious about securing my liberty again as I do to reform and get back to an honest life. I once did live in Omaha, and if given a chance I believe I can do as well again."

"Is it true that you once offered to return \$21,000 to Edward A. Cuddey if he would not prosecute you?" was asked.

"I believe Mr. Cuddey has made the statement that I did so. I do not think he would tell a lie for \$21,000," he replied.

Crowe's personal appearance is anything but that of a criminal. He was smoothly shaven, wore a stylish suit of clothes with patent leather shoes, and other articles to match. Except for his white hair, he does not look to be 35 years of age, which he says is his correct age.

## ANGLO-CUBAN TREATY.

Opposition to it is Growing in Cuba.

Havana, Oct. 9.—There was no quorum present at a meeting of the senate committee on foreign relations called for this afternoon to consider the Anglo-Cuban treaty. Senators Chapin and Dolz, both leaders of the Moderates, were absent.

Senator Zayas, the Liberal leader and member of the committee, said to the Associated Press that he was altogether opposed to the treaty, in which it was impossible to find a single advantage to Cuba.

Senator Bustamante, chairman of the committee, who is an Independent, also opposed the treaty. Senator Tamayo, another Independent member of the committee, is in the United States.

The Moderate senators are inclined to postpone the making of a report on the treaty until after the elections.

## YALE STUDENTS.

Detectives Busy Gathering Evidence Against Them.

New Haven, Conn., Oct. 9.—Although no Yale students were arrested by the police this morning for participating in the Freshman strike, the police are busy gathering evidence, and no disposition was shown to let the matter drop, either on the part of the city or the college authorities. The failure to make arrests at once was due to the difficulty of identifying individual members in the cases of freshmen who were arrested in the neighborhood.

## PREST. ROOSEVELT GETS INTERESTED IN FOOTBALL

Wants Authorities on the Game to See If Something Cannot be Done to Lessen the Brutality.

Washington, Oct. 9.—President Roosevelt entertained at luncheon today Dr. D. H. Nichols and W. T. Reid of Harvard, Arthur T. Hillebrand and John B. Fine of Princeton and Walter Camp and Mr. Oswald of Yale. The six guests of the president constitute the athletic advisers of the respective colleges named. The president desired to consider with them particularly the morale of the game of football, with a view to eliminating much of its brutality if possible. There was a general discussion of college athletics, but the chief center around the game of football. It is hoped by the president that with the co-operation of the college authorities and the athletic advisers the rules of the game may be amended so as practically to do away with much of the brutality which makes the game objectionable to many people. It is understood that no definite conclusions were reached. Indeed, none was expected, the idea of the president being simply to start the ball rolling in the direction of a modification of the rules of the game.

President Roosevelt's son, Teddy, Jr., was injured in a game at Harvard last Thursday, and although not serious, it gave him a bad cut over the eye. Whether this accident had anything to do with the meeting called for yesterday is not stated.

## SHOT THE BURGLAR.

Mrs. Ella Hale of Omaha Sent a Bullet Into One.

Omaha, Oct. 9.—During an encounter with a burglar in her bedroom chamber early today, Mrs. Ella Hale shot and wounded the man. Mrs. Hale was awakened by the burglar prowling in her room. She grasped with the man, but he seized her wrists and tore the rings from her fingers. She then drew a revolver from beneath her pillow and opened fire on the man. He escaped, but Mrs. Hale followed him to the street, emptying the contents of the revolver. He dropped the booty at the first shot, which took effect.

## NON-UNION SWITCHMEN.

Were Boycotted by Hotels, Lodgings and Boarding Houses.

Chicago, Oct. 10.—A weary, hungry gang of non-union switchmen spent last night in box cars on a siding of the Grand Trunk freight yards at Elston. They did not take the lodgings from choice but because the residents of Elston, out of sympathy for the strikers, had driven every non-union man from shelter in the suburb.

Some hotel, lodging quarters, boarding-house and private residence in Elston joined in the boycott. The stores were locked and the barber shops closed. Everywhere doors were barred. Even the saloons refused admittance to the unwelcome strangers. And to cap the climax, the two village marshes, with gruff orders to "move on," proceeded to hustle the non-unionists out of town.

Confident with the alternatives of having to walk several miles or spend the night in the open, the men decided to consult Yardmaster Conroy of the Grand Trunk. He found the empty box cars on the siding. Blankets were procured, and the non-union men went to sleep.

The railroad officials said that arrangements would be made to house the men in barracks.

## Fire in Ventura, Cal.

Ventura, Cal., Oct. 9.—A fire which started in Santa Barbara late last night destroyed about \$25,000 worth of property. The home of John McDonald, a negro laborer, caught fire and, before the firemen could reach the scene, it was in ruins.

The mother had gone to a neighbor's leaving the two children asleep in the house. Before they could be saved the roof and walls had fallen in and the children, 2 years and 5 months old, were killed.

The father had gone to fight the forest fires which are raging in the hills north of Ventura. On account of the fire the schools have been closed for the day.

## A TRAGEDY IN A DEATH CHAMBER.

Over His Mother's Dead Body John Budenik Shows His Sister, Brother and Brother-in-Law.

## RESULT OF A FAMILY QUARREL.

It Had Existed for Years—He is Now in Jail—Occurred at Hastings, Nebraska.

Kansas City, Oct. 8.—A special to the Times from Hastings, Neb., says: Over the dead body of his mother, John Budenik shot his sister, his brother and his brother-in-law, at an early hour this morning. Miss Frances Budenik, aged 22, was shot in the right hand; Jacob Budenik, aged 52, was shot above the right eye; Peter Smeal, shot through the left leg, through the abdomen, in the left thigh and through the left shoulder.

The shooting occurred in a death chamber at the home of Mr. and Mrs. Peter Smeal, 1250 west Second street, where Mrs. M. Budenik died at 10:30 o'clock last night, and was the culmination of a family quarrel that had existed for years. Mrs. Budenik was saying at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Peter Smeal, and because of the family trouble her son John was not permitted to see his mother during her illness. When John heard of his mother's death last night he determined to view the remains at any cost. Shortly after midnight he secured entrance into the Smeal home through the kitchen.

Making his way to the death chamber he entered and found the entire family surrounding the corpse, watching the undertaker prepare the remains. Advancing to the corpse John placed his hands on the lifeless body and said: "Thanks, my mother." His sister Frances said something to him in Polish, whereupon he struck her. Then he drew a revolver and shot at his sister over the head of his mother. Before he declined to overpowered he had shot his sister, his brother and his brother-in-law. John Budenik is in jail.

## Finnish to be Allowed.

Helsingfors, Finland, Oct. 8.—At a conference of Finnish officials with the emperor at Peterhof Saturday, an important modification of the imperial manifesto of June 25 was adopted, permitting the employment of Finnish and Swedish in the higher administrative departments in Finland instead of the exclusive use of the Russian language. The emperor desired to consider the request made by the Finnish senate for the holding of an extraordinary session of the landtag this year.
