CENTLEMAN WORE SHACKLES.

Police Were There in Large Numbers To See That He Was Safely Landed in Jail.

Omaha, Neb., Oct. 9 .- Pat Crows, shackled to Detective Heitfeldt of the Omaha detective department, and ac companied by Chief Detective Dunne arrived in Omaha tonight from Butte Mont., where he was arrested a weel ago. A crowd of 2,000 persons had gath ered at the union station, and they filled the station and approaches in ev ery direction, intent on Recuring glance at Crowe.

The extraordinary precaution taken by the palloe department for landing Crowe safely behind the bars seemed hardly necessary, for he gave fittle heed to them and apparently had no wish to make bis excape.

A TRAGEDY IN A DEATH CHAMBER.

Over His Mother's Dead Body lohn Budenik Shoors His Sister, Brother and Brother-In-Law.

RESULT OF A FAMILY QUARREL

It Had Existed for Years-fie is Now In Jail-Occurred at Hastings, Nebraska.

Kansás Chy, Oct. 8 .- A special to the Times from Hustings, Neb., says: Over the dead body of his mother John Budenik shot his sister, his brother and his brother-in-law, at at sarly hour this morning. Miss Frances Budenik, aged 22, was shot in the right and; Jacob Budenik, aged 52, was shot above the right eye; Peter Smeatl, shot through the left leg, through the cholomen, in the left thigh and through he left, shoulder.

The shooting occurred in a death

hamber at the home of Mr. and Mrs. oter Smeall, 1350 west Second street here Mrs. M. Budenik died at 10:30 clock last night, and was the culmio'clock last night, and was the culmi-nation of a family quarrel that had existed for years. Mrs. Budenik was saying at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Peter Smeall, and because of the family trouble her son John was not permitted to see his mother during her serious filness. When John heard of his mother's death hast night he de-termined to view the remains at any cost. Shortly after midnight he se-cured entrance into the Smeall home turough the kitchen.

Making his way to the death chamber he entered and found the entire family surrounding the corpse, watch-ing the undertaker prepare the remains. Advincing to the corpse John placed his hands on the lifeless body and said: "Thanks, my mother." His sister Frances said something to him in Polish, whereupon he struck her. Then he drew a revolver and shot at his sister over the dead body of his mother. Before he could be overpow-ered he had shot his sister, his brother and his brother-in-law. John Budenik is in jail.

Finnish to be Allowed.

Helsingfors, Finland, Oct. 8.-At a conference of Finnish officials with the emperor at Peterhof Saturday, an im-portant modification of the imperial manifesto of June 26 was adopted, per-mitting the amplement of Finsish and mitting the employment of Finnish and Swedish in the higher administrative departments in Finland instead of the exclusive use of the Russian language. The emperor declined to entertain the request made by the Finnish senate for the holding of an extraordinary ses-sion of the landtag this year.
