Outstanding legal tenders \$364,-About National Bank Notes. The Comptreller of Currency, in his forthcoming report, gives the banking system in this country previous to the establishment of notes now authorized to be issued is 354 millions, and the amount of legal tender notes 356 millions, so that the proportion of legal tender in which national bank notes are deemable is nearly identical, country would agree to such pro-visions of law, prompt redemption of national bank notes would be insured, but the redemption of this vast amount of circulation notes, if redeemed but once a year, would result in a great loss to the people. A system of redemption of this kind would also at once increase the rate of exchange from onetenth of one per cent., now existing at most periods of the year between different cities of the Union, from different cities of the Union, from one-half to one per cent., thus restoring to a considerable degree the condition of exchange at the time of the inauguration of the national banking system, and insuring a loss to the people annually of millions of dollars. Such a system would, however, understell the notes of the national banks, at certain seasons of the year when they were not needed, to the vaults of the country banks, to be reid out. certain seasons of the year when they were not needed, to the yount of the country banks, to be paid out when the demand for currency increased. Such a system would give what is exceedingly desirable at present—elasticity to the currency. In order to insure the prompt redemption of national bank notes, the amounts issued must be so much increased that the notes will be say at one half of one per cent. discount, and this would probably not be accomplished until an addition was made to the present circulation of a hundred million dollars. The same result would follow from a reduction of the volume of legal tender notes simultaneously with the increase of issues of hapk notes. But Congress has so frequently refused to diminish the amount of legal tender notes, that the comptroller is of the opinion that any general system of free banking, accompanied with redemption, must be postponed until the resumption of specie payments. The comptroller, in order to avoid any misapprehensions of his views upon the subject, desires to state that he is not an advocate of any permanent system of currency. 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
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
