St. Petersburg, April 25 .- Capt. Clade, Vice Admiral Skrydloff's chief of staff, says Skrydloff, like Gen. Kuropatkin, counsels patience and coolness.

"Russia's strength is on shore," said the captain today. "We have withdrawn every soldier in the way of the Japanese advance to the Yalu in order to entice them into Manchuria. Afloat our policy is to induce the Japanese to engage the squadron and the forts com-bined, rejecting the seduction to fight on the open sea until reinforcements arrive. Then Gen. Kuropatkin can adon Korea and Vice Admiral

ance Skrydloff will go out to battle. "Vice Admiral Togo's plan of attackng Port Arthur in order to cover the Japanese landing in Korea worked satsfactorily so long as our squadron did not go out from Port Arthur between the intervals of his appearances. Chicago, April 26 .- "The best time to stop a strike is a long time before you begin it; which is true, if it is Irish," said Tenence V. Powderly, former president of the Knights of Labor, at the annual banquet of the Shoe and Leather association of Chicago, in the Au-ditorium hotel.

"The labor leader who has the interest of his mon at heart will tight the strike to the last ditch." continued Mr. Powderly, "for of all the costly, cumbrous, wastful cruel methods of setting a difficulty in labor matters the strike and lockout are the worst, "Let the labor unions incorporate.

The union has nothing to fear from in-corporation, there is nothing the law can reach under incorporation that it can't reach now." Mr. Powderly talked to the toast "Re-

GEN. KUROPATKIN.

Destined to Become Commander-In-Chief in Far East.

St. Petersburg, April 25,-Gen. Kuropatkin, it is believed in the highest military circles here, is destined to become commander-in-chief of all the emperor's forces, both military and naval in the far east.

Admiral Alexieff may remain there for some little time as viceroy but his reign is considered practically ended He will not be humiliated but in order to effect harmonious relations a way will be found to secure his climination While Alexieff and Kuropatkin are or fairly good terms, harmonious relations between Vice Admiral Skrydloff and the viceroy are considered impossible and with the three enjoying independ-ent commands it is realized that friction ultimately will be bound to arise which might endanger successful oper-ations. Skrydloff and Kuropatkin, en the contrary, are warm personal friends. With Alexieff removed from the

theater of war and in view of the pat-ent necessity to have a supreme com-mander of both the army and the navy on the ground as well as to secure per-fect harmony, Vice Admiral Skrdloff, because of the minor role which the fleet will play, has already expressed his willingness to accept the post of commander of the naval forces under Gen. Kuropatkin as commander-in-
