

PRESIDENT TAFT WILL VISIT OGDEN

Will Curtail Stay in Salt Lake in Accordance With Request of The Utah Committee.

PERSONNEL OF THE PARTY

Officially Stated President is Not a Scorcher, Never Exceeding Twenty Miles an Hour.

Beverly, Mass., Aug. 19.—President Taft is giving some thought to the many speeches to be made on his long western and southern trip, and also to his annual message to Congress. The president has thought out the general plan of his message; he has several cabinet officers at work on the details of certain phases of it, but he will not take up the work of assembling the document until a week or so before Congress is to gather. The message is likely to be a long one.

The personnel of the president's traveling party has been completed. John Hays Hammond, Capt. Archibald W. Butt, military aide; Wenzell V. Mischler, assistant secretary; Dr. J. T. Richardson, physician; Dr. J. C. James Sloan, Jr., and L. C. Wheeler of the secret service, and Maj. Arthur Brooks, the president's confidential messenger, who just now is fighting with the Red army of invasion about Boston, will accompany the president. Six newspapermen will make the entire trip. The party will travel in two private cars.

It was practically decided to include Ogden, Utah, in the list of stopping places. This change will necessitate a curtailment of the stay in Salt Lake City, and was arranged in accordance with a request from the Utah committee. The president will arrive in Salt Lake City late in the afternoon of Friday, Sept. 24. On the way to Salt Lake City it had been arranged that there should be a stop of one hour or more at Provo, Utah. The president is due in Butte, Mont., Monday morning, September 27, and the stay in Ogden will probably be on the Sunday preceding.

The mail man brought to the executive office this morning a stuffed gray suede elephant about twelve inches high, addressed to President Taft. The little fellow had "G. O. P." stamped on one side and one ear. On the front of the elephant was traced a picture of the president, and underneath were the words "Sunny Bill." The elephant came from Detroit.

President Taft is not an automobile scorcher, according to an official statement made today.

Stories that have gone abroad about the great speed at which President Taft's chauffeur takes him along the smooth oiled roadways about Beverly brought letters of protest from timid admirers of Mr. Taft. They urged that Robinson, who drives the president's car, be directed to exercise more caution.

The president does like to go fast when out in a machine, but to reassure those who have taken the interest to write, it was announced that Robinson has specific instructions not to exceed 20 miles an hour, and that the speedometer, which remains fixed at the maximum speed until reset, never nowadays shows a fraction above the 20 mile mark.

The president's car is passed by every other on the road.

COMMON SENSE ON CONSERVING RESOURCES

Portland, Or., Aug. 19.—The Association of American Colleges and Experiment Stations today heard the report of a committee recommending organization of a section on extension work. Consideration of the amendment to the constitution on this subject was postponed until after action had been taken on the committee report. But one address was delivered before the general session this morning, that of Prof. L. G. Carpenter of Fort Collins, Colo., professor of soil conservation. He declared existing conditions are not so deplorable as painted, and he does not think the waste of natural resources is so great as to justify the great prominence given the matter. Before the section on college work and administration, the subject of providing agricultural training in secondary schools came up again, and was the subject of two papers.

MAURETANIA NOW HOLDS ALL RECORDS

New York, Aug. 19.—The Cunard liner Mauretania anchored tonight after a run over the short course which now gives her all records for eastward and westward trips. She did the 2,783 knots in 4 days, 14 hours and 38 minutes, as against the best performance of the Lusitania over the same course of 4 days, 15 hours flat. Her record over the long course, which is 110 miles longer is 4 days, 15 hours.

"CURTAIL GENERAL DELIVERY." Toledo, Ohio, Aug. 19.—"Abolish or curtail general delivery," was the demand of several speakers at the convention of the National Association of Postmasters, first class, here tonight. Advocates of the proposition declared the correspondence of the youth of the country would be improved if all mail were delivered at homes.

MONUMENT TO GERMAN SOLDIERS UNVEILED

Metz, Germany, Aug. 19.—Ten officers and 60 veterans of the First Dragoon guards which made the famous cavalry charge of Mars-la-Tour, Aug. 16, 1870, cutting off Marshal Bazaine, commanding the French forces and preventing the retreat of the French from Metz to Verdun, crossed the frontier today to unveil a monument to the regiment on the battlefield where 16,000 Germans were killed or wounded. According to the agreement with the Paris authorities, only two of the German officers wore uniforms. This is said to have been the first time since the Franco-German war German officers have crossed the French frontier in uniform. The monument, which consists of a huge boulder from the province of Hainaut, contains the simple inscription "The Dragons charged here."

CANDIANS HOIST GREEK FLAG AGAIN

Armed Inhabitants Did it in Presence of Militia Who Were Powerless to Prevent Proceeding.

CONSULS MAKE A DEMAND.

Representatives of Powers Warn the Porte Against Jeopardizing the Peace of Europe.

Canea, Island of Crete, Aug. 19.—The armed inhabitants of Candia, the largest city of Crete, today rehoisted the Greek flag in the presence of a squad of militia who were powerless to prevent the proceedings. A conflict was averted through the intervention of the metropolitan, who begged the officers to confine the soldiers to their barracks. The consuls of the powers have demanded that the government of Crete give a written guarantee that the Greek flag will not be hoisted after the departure of the international squadron. The government replied it will do so when order has been restored at Candia.

GREECE'S REPLY.
London, Aug. 19.—Greece's reply to the last Turkish note regarding Crete has been communicated to the powers. Its terms are conciliatory and diplomats consider that it should be satisfactory to the powers to which it was delivered today. The note regrets that after Greece's previous assurances the Turkish government still complains of the attitude of Greece in Candia and Crete. It says the Greek government deplors the anarchy and agitation which have ruined and decimated the population of Macedonia, irrespective of race and religion and points out that as soon as the new Turkish regime gave grounds for the hope that the situation

Divorced Wife Will Bring Suit to Secure it for Her Daughter.

Denver, Aug. 20.—A special dispatch to the Rocky Mountain News from Pueblo, Colo., says:
Mrs. Blanche Heslip has employed attorneys who will begin a fight to secure for her daughter the estate of Thomas Heslip, father of the girl, who killed himself at Goldfield, Nev., several days ago.

Heslip was a relative of Lord and Lady Dufferin. He came to the United States in the eighties, and in New Mexico was married to Miss Blanche L. Gallagher.

In 1902 Mrs. Heslip obtained a divorce. She says Heslip never contributed to her support, also she was granted \$100 a month.
Heslip did not leave a will and as his wife, who was shot by Patrick Casey, died first, attorneys for Mrs. Heslip say that her daughter can recover the entire estate. Relatives of the second Mrs. Heslip have attempted to take possession of the estate, which is said to be worth \$1,000,000.
