

## GIFTED READER IN SALT LAKE AGAIN.

Warm Welcome Once More to Mrs. Baker on Her Return to the City of the Saints.

### PAYS TRIBUTE TO ZION.

And Gives Masterly and Artistic Rendition of Rostand's Great Story of "Cyrano de Bergerac."

Before an enthusiastic, appreciative audience, Mrs. Bertha Kunz Baker last night gave "Cyrano de Bergerac" in Barrett hall. It was the first of the M. I. A. lecture series, and at once demonstrated the rare talent in store for patrons of the bureau during the season. The gifted interpreter was perhaps never heard to better advantage in this city, and her reading throughout was masterly and skillful and brought forth applause and admiration from all present.

In commencing her reading Mrs. Baker expressed her great pleasure at once more appearing before a Salt Lake audience. She painted a beautiful word picture of her entrance into the valley during the day, noting the grandeur of the scene as the train emerged from the shadows of our majestic mountains. In Salt Lake she said would ever burn the great central fires of learning at which other communities of the interest must always come to fight their torches. She said she felt that she was coming among friends, and the tribute paid during the evening was ample evidence that the lady made no mistake.

Rostand's "Cyrano de Bergerac" is a well known play, and for extended comment. As stated by the speaker the play created considerable of a stir in Paris when it was introduced there 10 years ago. Since then it has been read by thousands, who are not unfamiliar with the many characters of Cyrano, whose romantic heroism placed the real of approval on what is generally regarded as one of the greatest of modern comedies.

There is no questioning Mrs. Baker's ability as a reader. Her delineation of every character and every phase of the subject under consideration, is superb, and her audience follows her with undivided attention through all her lines.

**SCARCITY OF WORKMEN.**  
Real Estate Association Takes Steps to Relieve the Situation.

At its yesterday afternoon meeting the Real Estate association appointed a committee to confer with the Utah Federation of Labor, relative to the scarcity of laborers and workmen in the local markets, and if thought advisable, to advertise in eastern papers for men. The committee are O. F. Peterson, J. G. Anderson and A. Richter. Mr. Peterson reported it was impossible to continue with the erection of certain buildings on account of the shortage. This was in part explained by the calling away of so many men to Sunnyvale to build 75 cottages there; also, by the employment of so many men on the waterworks improvements, paving streets, and laying sidewalks. It was also stated that with the opening of spring, the demand for labor would be even greater, particularly with the Garfield improvements.
