WESTERN.

SALINAS CITY, S. C.—It commenced raining here at 7 o'clock. Salinas river is rising fast. The banks on the Monterey side are washed away for the distance of a hundred feet. The telegraph poles and lines are being interrupted for the past five days. Strenuous exertions on the part of the company's officials are being made to repair the break. The river is nearly half a mile in length.

AUSTIN, S.—Alexander Robbins, arrested here for the attempted murder of a man named Ingram, was yesterday discharged, and was arrested to-day for an attempt to murder his wife and again discharged.

DEEP CREEK, U. S.—The Furber District is reported improving, almost every location prospecting showing a fine quality of smelting ores. The Eureka mine, at the depth of forty feet, struck a body of ore nine feet thick. The weather has been very pleasant, and there has been no snow this winter to prevent the work.

PORTLAND, OREGON, S.—A mass meeting of the friends of woman suffrage in this State and in Washington Territory will be held on the 14th and 15th inst. A permanent State society and auxiliary county societies are to be organized.

Articles of incorporation have been filed by the narrow gauge railroad company, for the purpose of building between Tillamook and some connecting point with the Oregon Central, north of Wapato Lake.

BENJ. HASBROOK, of Yonaholm county, while attempting to arrest two men for robbing his granary, was shot and instantly killed. His hired man was standing by, but his life was saved by some papers in his breast pocket.

SAN FRANCISCO, S.—A messenger arrived at Yreka from the front to-day. Gillen had assumed command of the troops there, and had established a line of couriers between headquarters and Yreka. On Sunday Colonel Stone sent out for supplies, and the troops were ordered to the front.

The troops will remain on the defensive till the results of the labors of the Peace Commissioners are made known, and during that time they will consume all the surplus provisions in that section of country.

NEW YORK, S.—The specie shipments this week amounted to \$1,442,000.

PANAMA, S.—A letter has been received giving the particulars of the sinking of the ship *Turkey*, on the 6th of January. During the night the ship and six men jumped overboard and reached one of the boats which contained four of the crew, who were keeping in fear of the ship. The captain refused to leave the ship, and with fourteen of the crew remained in the sinking vessel, and sunk with it.

The next morning the survivors were picked up by the British steamer *Enterprise*, and landed at Gibraltar.

WATERVILLE, MAINE, S.—Ten ladies of prominence here, agreed, during the whole day, the motion for a stay of proceedings before Judge Davis.

Professor Tyndall and Cyrus W. Field sailed to-day.

A Washington special says there is a growing impression that there will be an extension of Congress.

Secretary Richardson says the indications are that an additional call for one hundred millions will be made immediately after the one to be made on the 1st of March, making two hundred millions in all.

WASHINGTON, S.—The Senate committee on elections have completed their report on so much of the evidence as relates to the proceedings in connection with the electoral vote of Louisiana. The report is brief, merely stating the facts in the case, and without recommendation will be presented to-day.

Representative Myers asked an appropriation of half a million dollars for League Island.

The House committee commenced to-day, concluded the river harbor bill, and then proceeded to consider a resolution to amend an appropriation of \$25,000 for the improvement of East River, including New York, New York, and \$50,000 for Portland harbor.

Both houses having agreed to the report of the conference committee of the disagreeing votes upon the United States bill to amend the law, and will go into effect on the 1st of April.

NEW YORK, S.—In Brooklyn this p.m., Michael Fox was arrested on the charge of kicking to death his son, 8 years old, because the boy refused to go for liquor without money.

The report that Judge Boardman denied the motion for a stay of proceedings and for a new trial in the Stokes case is erroneous. The judge is at Ithaca, and will decide the motion till next week.

EUROPEAN.
LONDON, S. A. A. meeting of West Country Highlanders (Glasgow), last night, the Marquis of Lorne delivered an address. Speaking of the number of Scotchmen who left their country during the emigration movement with regret, especially when directed towards the United States. Scotland was able to support its immense population, laborers were scarce and if people emigrated he hoped they would go to the British Colonies.

A cotton mill near Oldham was badly damaged by fire to-day. One hundred persons were thrown out of employment.

BERN, S.—The Swiss Council of State has stopped the salaries for three months, of all priests who read from their pulpits the unauthoritative paper establishing a separate Bismarck for Geneva. The Conference of Basel has determined to create a grand Swiss bishopric of descendants from Rome.

ROME, S.—De Courcelles, the new French ambassador to the Vatican, presented his credentials to the Pope to-day.

The United States steamer *Shenandoah* arrived at San Francisco yesterday. Rear Admiral Alden and several of his officers are in Naples. They will be received to-morrow by the King.

PARIS, S.—The committee of thirty in the assembly, to-day, considered and adopted the amendment proposed by Housouville, providing that the council of ministers shall decide whether the president may or may not suspend the assembly during discussions on interpellations. The proposal of Dufaure was rejected. The committee then considered the remaining articles, and elected the Duke de Broglie as its reporter. It is believed that the action of the committee will lead to a rupture between Thiers and the Assembly.

PARIS, S.—Five hundred Carlists, under Labarra, made an attack yesterday on Villadrado, but were repulsed by the garrison. The authorities announce that the insurrection at Saragossa is completely suppressed.

The King has signed a decree for the organization of the artillery service. The decree provides that no change have resigned.

PARIS, S.—Resolutions have been introduced into the Chamber of Deputies regarding the election of the President of the Republic.

Twenty-two trains are now daily running over the Virginia and Truckee railroad.

During the past two or three months, says the San Francisco Chronicle, February 1, the Board of Health have been secretly aware of the prevalence of disease among hogs in this city. That no unnecessary alarm should be caused by a premature announcement of the fact, the members of the board quietly took measures to prevent a spread of the disease and the sale of any unhealthy pork or lard in the markets.

The three prominent diseases were: Quinsy, affection of the lungs and chest, and a disease similar to the hog cholera of the East. Many hogs died in this city and vicinity during the past few days, and the disease was spreading rapidly.
