The Shoshone water has cut its course deep down through the lava, and then the base of the fall is away down below that, while the thunder of the descend-ing water shakes the entire country for

a long distance around. Col. Holmes was astonished to meet Col. Holmes was astonished to meet an eastern tourist in the Yellowstone who acknowledged never having even heard of the Shoshone Falls, and was ashamed for the ignorance of his fel-low countryman. He saw a great paint-ing of the falls at the Pan-American fair by Moran, and for which Si0.000 was asked. It was shortly afterwards bought by President Ingalls of the Big Four Railroad company. Col. Holmes was so taken with the painting that he proposes to send a fine artist out to the Falls from Chicago and have a large painting made of the natural wonder. He holds that every American traveler should make a pligrimage to the great Shoshore Falls. The colonel also went up into British Columbia, where he was surprised to find an irrigation outfit

NARROW FIRE ESCAPE. Oil Soaked Rags Ignite in City and

County Building. The city and county building had an

other narrow escape last evening from being seriously damaged by fire. This is the second time in the last six months that a fire has been discovered in the building, and both conflagrations were started in the same manner, namely, the ignition of oil-soaked rags, which had been used for cleaning the

wood work in the building. About 7 o'clock the night shift which works on the tax rolls in the county auditor's office scented something very similar to burning oil or paint. The nightwatchman at the building had also detected the odor and they all joined in a search for the cause of the same. It was soon discovered that a lot of oil-soaked rags in the janitor's room on the

soaked rags in the janitor's room on the ground floor had spontaneously ignited and were smoking at a furious rate and were almost ready to burst into flames. The room where the fire was, is in the elevator shaft just north of the corridor which leads from the engine room. In-stead of being open it is bridged over and enclosed with lumber on each floor and used for storing the implements and supplies of the janitors. With a fire started in that shaft with the pow-erful updraft which it would have, it would soon reach the tower and would cause very serious damage to the build-ing.
