UNIVERSITY TEACHING CORPS.

Five Changes in the Personnel of the University—Chief Day in the Department of Training—Other Matters.

The board of State University regents which it rose from its quarterly meeting late yesterday afternoon, had employed the teaching corps and fixed the salaries for 1898. Few changes are made in the personnel of the faculty. In fact all of the old teachers except one, Miss Anna Brothwood, were retained. Miss Brothwood was absent, having been married, and has been succeeded by Dr. John C. Moore, president of the Society of Utah Artists, who will for the next year at least, direct the department of drawing at the University.

Miss Barbara Deep of Chicago was employed to fill the position of training department teacher, most vacant by far of all the others.

Miss Anna Keyes, Miss Deep is a graduate of the University of Michigan, and is now in the Kirtland department. Mrs. Dennis, Mrs. Hall, Miss Emily, and Mrs. Anna are the other new professors.
