OUTPOURING OF SAINTS MARKS SUNDAY SERVICES

Huge Throng Attending Conference Packs the Big Tabernacle to its Limit, Necessitating Overflow Meetings in the Assembly Hall and Outdoor Gatherings on the Temple Square-Speakers Congratulate Saints on Work Accomplished and Splendid Showing Made.

me Sunday sessions of conference were by far the most largely attended of the several gatherings. Not that very many more persons present at the tabernacle, for on each occasion previously the building had been crowded almost to its utmost ca-The increase of attendance was at the assembly hall and on the grounds outside, where it is estimated at least 10,000 or 12,000 persons congregated in the afternoon. Such an outouring of people was astounding to hose who are accustomed to see the tabernacle square densely crowded at conference time, and to strangers sojourning in the city the sight must

journing in the city the sight must have been a revelation, indeed. The speakers of the day ranged from members of the general authorities down to presidents of stakes, presidents down to presidents of stakes, presidents of missions and lay members. The subjects discussed were quite as varied as was the list of speakers, doctrine, conditions of the Church, stakes and conditions of the Church, stakes and missions being dwelt upon in an in-teresting manner. The hour of 4 p. m. today will witness the close of one of the greatest conferences in the history of the Church.

He asked the people present 'o make as much room as possible that all who might be accommodated with scats exchange at intervals with those standing, that they might be rested. He also desired any visitors not pro-vided with accommodations to report at the bureau of information where a committee would provide a place

ELDER GEORGE ALBERT SMITH. Elder George Albert Smith of the quorum of apostles rejoiced in being among the people who were gathered together in this conference. In traveltogether in this conference. In travel-ing about among the saints the speak-er said he was pleased to note the in-creased attendance at the sacrament meetings. "It is highly necessary," he declared, "that the people take advan-tage of the opportunity to partake of the sacrament of the Lord's supper. It was instituted by the Savior Him-self; it was mentioned by three of the exangelists and was among the last

self; it was mentioned by three of the evangelists, and was among the last great acts of the Lord Jesus, who com-manded His disciples to partake of the emblems of His broken body and spilled blood in remembrance of Him. "But I wish to call the attention of the people to the danger of partaking of these emblems unworthily. We must know that our hearts are pure and our hands are clean. As a people the peo-ple are becoming more particular that the vessels containing these emblems be the vessels containing these emblems be clean. The speaker quoted from the Book of

Mormon where the people were warned against being baptized and partaking of the sacrament unworthily.

"The sacrament unworthily, "The sacramento is not the literal body and blood of the Redeemer, ac-cording to the faith of the Latter-day Saints," the speaker said, quoting from the works of the Church to show that the bread and water are indicated as being partaken of in remembrance of the Lord Jesus. The speaker exhorted the saints to partake of the sacred emblems worthily; and to be in reality brothers and sisters in the kingdom of God, for the Savior said to the people of old, "If you are not one ye are not mine.

ELDER GEORGE F. RICHARDS.

Elder George F. Richards of the council of the apostles said he was heartily in accord with the words of the brethren who had preceded him in this conference. The speaker quoted from the gospel of Luke, fourteenth chapter and twenty-eighth verse, where the Savior asks who would build a tower without first sitting down and counting the cost.

der the leadorship of Elder Charles J. Thomas, "Redeemer of Israel, our only delight." Prayer was offered by Elder Stewart Eccles, foilowed by "singing. "Come, come, ye saints." The first speaker was Elder German E. Elisworth, president of the Northera States mission, who reported briefly his labors. He said he feit greatly honored in having the privilege of la-boring with so many good men and women as are the active workers in that mission and who, he believed, feel that their parents and brothers and sisters and the saints of Zion are pray-ing for them as if they were angels without sin. The elders there are strug-gling manfully, cheerfully and earn-estly in the work, and they are re-jolcing in the manner in which their way is opened to reach the best classes of the people. They are cailing upon the heads of government and the influ-ential people, and making warm friends

the heads of government and the influ-ential people, and making warm friends among the honorable field of the earth. For the past three years the elders have turned more to the distribution of the Book of Mormon, and by doing so find that it has more than doubled the distribution of tracts and other books. When they distributed 1,000 Books of Mormon in the mission field three years before, they had something like 12,000 smaller books reported as be-ing distributed, and when, two years like 12,000 smaller books reported as be-ing distributed, and when, two years ago, in 1906, they increased the number of Books of Mormon distributed to 5,000, they found their other books ran up to 20,000. Last year the elders increas-ed their distribution of Books of Mor-mon to something like 12,500, and found it increased their 10 cent book distribu-tions to 50,000 making a total of 78,000.

The health of the elders is very good. There have been but two cases of sick-ness, and then they were not cou-fined to their beds, though taking the contagion of smallpox. Elder Nephi Prat, president of the Northwestern States mission, next spoke, reporting the condition of that mission as the best he has known since he has presided over it. In a notable instance the eyes of the blind have been opened, and consumption cured through the prayer of faith. The elders and saints of that mission are being mag-nified before the world by their goody example and influence, and the speaker exhorted all the saints to faithfullness, cheerfulness, and preaching the gospel to their neighbors and the world, both by example and precept. Elder Andrew Jonson spoke interest-ingly of the gathering, of the destiny of the people of God in the land of America, and the striking events that have already marked the history of the saints since the organization of the Church to the present time.

Bramwell, president of Union stake, Oregon, said the work of the Lord is prospering in his de-partment of the Lord's vineyard, and he felt very much encouraged in the work. He bore a strong testimony of the truth of the restored gospel through the prophet Joseph Smith, and exhorted the saints to be true and faithful to the end

the prophet Joseph Smith, and exhorted the saints to be true and faithful to the end. Elder William H. Smart, president of the Uintah stake of Zion, said that his portion of the work and of the state is rapidly growing, and the people are increasing in their earnest work and in the effectiveness of their labors in the organizations of the Church. He spoke strongly of the importance of all the Latter-day saints being tem-perate in their lives, and said that the people of his stake would join hands in the very gratifying movement now on foot for prohibition. Apostle Heber J. Grant spoke forcibly of the importance of keeping the Word of Wisdom, and living in keeping with the prohibition laws of the gospel, for our temporal salvation. He welcomed the movement now on looking to ef-fective measures to prevent drunken-ness and intemperance, and to avoid its long train of evils. Said the power of God was with His people in these mountains, and appealed to them to be faithful to the living laws of the gospel. Elder Whitney then briefly recounted Eader Whitney then briefly recounted the circumstances leading up to the restoration of the gospel early in the inheteenth century. Mormonism con-tends that from the early centuries aft-er the advent of the Savior until the appearance of John the Baptist to Jo-seph Smith and Oliver Cowdery, there were no authorized servants of Idea. seph Smith and Oliver Cowdery, there were no authorized servants of God on the earth; no one having divine right to preach the gospel and administer in its ordinance. John the Baptist conferred upon Joseph and Oliver the lesser or Aaronic priesthood. "Under this authority the Church was organized April 6, 1830. In April, 1836, while the Church was at Kirtland, Ohio, the Lord appeared to Joseph and to Oliver Cowdery, and other heavenly beings appeared unto them, giving them.

beings appeared unto them, giving them instructions which are recorded in the Doctrine and Covenants, section 110." The speaker read the section referred

The speaker read the section referred to, and then continued: "Would it not seem to the student of Mormonism, that there is something more in this great problem than a mere revolt against the unscriptural and hideous doctrines of some of the sects of Christendom? Does it not appear that Joseph was inspired of God in organizing this Church?" The speaker then read from that part of the Doctrine and Covenants which contains the communication sent forth by the prophet, as his career was about to be brought to a close and his life given up in martyrdom "Two great thoughts are born in upon the mind when reading this passage:

"Two great thoughts are born in upon the mind when reading this passage: one is that the past belongs to Mor-monism, and the other is that the fu-ture belongs to it also" "Mormonism is not a mere nine-teenth century religion, not merely a religion of time, but of eternity. It has come down from the regions on high for the salvation of man. It is gathering together all dispensations of the past to weld them into the dis-pensations of the present and of the future. The gospel codifies laws in-stituted in the eternal world before the earth was, for the salvation and perearth was, for the salvation and per-fection of man. To Adam and Eve was given a knowledge of the Redeemer to come, and they reindered obedience to the gospel's requirements, not leaving their posterity to wait 2,000 years, nor 4,000 years, to hear the mes-sage of the redemption that would be years, nor 4,000 years, to hear the mes-sage of the redemption that would be wrought in the meridian of time by the Son of God. "Suppose we consider the dispensa-tion of the gospel that came to Enoch. We tremble some of us in the law of tithing. What shall we do when the greater law comes, the law of consecration, when all shall be givon up for the work of the Lord? The dispensation of Enoch is but a fore-shadowing of that time. In the dispensation of Abraham the Lord said 'In thee and thy seed shall all mations be blest.' This was fulfilled; but it shall also be fulfilled in the gathering of all people. Moses-holds the keys of the gathering; and he gave those keys to the prophet of the last dispensation.
