

Judicial Discretion, Moderation, and Insight wanted in Utah.

It is announced that the government, in the removal of Judge McKean, does not intend to abandon its policy in regard to polygamy—though what that policy is, cannot be determined by any of its results. Ever since the appointment of Judge McKean difficulties have arisen in the administration of justice and in the settlement of the jurisdiction of courts in Utah. The frequent conflicts between the various interests have rendered the administration of justice no easy matter. Judge McKean has made it uncertain and more difficult by his want of discretion and his non-judicial temperament. We know nothing of the judicial qualifications of his successor; but it is to be hoped that he will be able to exercise that discretion, moderation and insight which have long been wanting in Utah.—*Albany Law Journal*.

All About Pine Canyon.

PINE CANYON, Tooele Co.,
March 16th, 1875.

Editor Deseret News:

Progression is the law by which all intelligent beings should be governed, both in politics, agriculture, mechanism, literature and religion. Religion is the chief concern of mortals here below; its sovereign virtue we ought to learn, and its great importance know.

Pine Canyon settlement is located about three miles from Tooele city, a little north-east, and has been settled about twenty years. Farming is the business pursued by its inhabitants, who at present are about 115 in number. The settlement is supplied with irrigation water from two streams, rather small, one from Pine Canyon, and the other a portion of another stream of water, a part of which is conveyed to Tooele city.

Pine Canyon for many years was a ward of Tooele city, and entirely controlled by that branch council, but now it is organized as a branch, with president and counsellors, and other helps in the government of the branch.

At present we have a good Sunday school, well attended and cared for by the superintendent and teachers of the institution. On the 16th of the present month we had a very interesting time, the day being set apart for recitation and recreation. The boys and girls, having committed a great many pieces to memory, recited them well, to the satisfaction and astonishment of all present. The children and as many of the adults as felt disposed were entertained with music by Bro. Micklejohn and Charles Warr, free of charge. All enjoyed themselves very much during the day, reciting and dancing, and in the evening with dancing and singing.

Pine Canyon during last year manifested unmistakable signs of progress. A good comfortable and respectable meeting-house was built, large enough to accommodate all who live at Pine Canyon and many more. Furthermore, the house is within a fraction all paid for, and has cost about \$1,000.

We have a Relief Society in good working order, which has done much good in the place, both to the members and the settlement. We are also blessed with a Young Ladies' Retrenchment Society.

Our week day school is also doing much good.

During the Winter we have had much pleasure and general satisfaction both in meetings, school, and recreations.
