To Prevent Granting a Consolidation

And Extension to Utab Light & Railway Company.

The demurrer of defendants to the amended complaint filed by Thomas Homer against Salt Lake City, former Mayor Morris and eight members of the former city council, to enjoin them from granting a consolidation and extension of the life of the franchises owned by the Utah Light & Railway company, has been overruled by Judge Morse of the district court, and the defendants have been granted 20 days within which to answer. The decision of Judge Morse follows:

In the District Court of Salt Lake county, Utah. Thomas Homer, etc., plaintiff: Sait Lake City et al. de-

fendants-Decision, In the case of the State of Utah, at the relation of Thomas Homer, against Sait Lake City et al., a demurrer to the amended complaint has been argued and submitted.

It is afleged in the complaint in this case that the Church of Jesus Carist of Latter-day Saints is a voluntary asso-ciation of individuals organized, among other things, for the purpose of en-gaging in commercial pursuits; that the defendants, R. S. Wells, W. J. Tuddenham, A. F. Barnes, J. H. Precee, F. S. Fernstrom, E. H. Davis, F. J. Hew-lett, members of the city council of Sait Lake City, and R. P. Morris, mayor of Lake City, and R. P. Morris, mayor of Salt Lake City, were members of this association, and as such were co-part-ners with all the other members of said association. that said association; that said association

was engaged largely in commercial en-terprises, by and through Joseph F. Smith, as trustee-in-trust for the said association; that the said trustee holds and controls and has the legal title to a part of the stock of the Utah Light & Railway company, which is held for the benefit of the members as co-part-ners of said Church, including the defendants above named: that the city council of Sait Lake City, at the date of August, 1905, the said council grant-ed to the Utah Light & Railway com-pany a valuable franchise; that the said franchise was granted by the vote of eight of the members of said coun-cil; that among the eight voting for said franchise were the seven mem-bers above named, and their votes were necessary for the adoption of the ordi-nance granting said franchise; and that by said action the said defendants granted to an association of which they were members, and in which they had a direct pecuniary and valuable in-terest; and from these facts it is con-tended that the grant of such franchise is vold. I am of the opinion that this conten-

tion is well founded. It is, however, contended on behalf of the defendants that the plaintiff merely as a resident taxpayer has no capacity to maintain and prosecute in the name of the state as relater, this action.
