The demand for gloves is as firm as ever, with pienty of the article to fill all demands. Black is the leading color, with brown and tans generally following, and white and light blues as the evening shades. The mild weather has had a depressing in-fluences on the retail trade generally, as purchasers hold off from buying until a stress o severe weather sets in; then nuchasers hold off from buying until a stress o severe weather sets in; then trade is lively. Dealers say, however, that under the conditions, business is very fair, though without any special features. There is a general miscell-laneous trade that gives the stores a lively appearance, and much skill and taste is shown in the dressing of show-windows. Some of these would be a credit to a big eastern city. The clothing trade reports business as only fair, with no general sales, as per agreement, until after January 1. There is quite a call for boys' and children's suits; hats are selling well, underwear is fair; but the fine weather is oper-ating against the trade. In shoes, the dealers report condi-tions affected by the weather, as was noted in the clothing line. People are making old shoes do as long as it is dry and not too cold. Frices remain high and thm, with a likelihood of re-maining so.

**BUSINESS NOTES** There has been a still further shading off of most of the local commercial stocks, due to the fact that holders were forced to raise cash and they did not hesitate to sacrifice even the favorites to get their hands on coin of the realm once more. In every case, however, it is noticeable that there is a force of buyers which stands ready a force of buyers which stands ready to "gobble up" the bargains so that there have been quite a few sales at the lower figures noted. MILLS ONLY FILLING ORDERS.

## No Accumulation of Stocks Permitted -Retail Trade Shows More Activity.

New York, Nov. 29 .- R. G. Dun & Company's Weekly Review of Trade tomorrow will say:

Confidence is seturning but conservatism is still much in evidence, especially in manufacturing. Mills and factories are only operated to fill orders, no accumulation of stocks being permitted pending more settled conditions. Some tille plants have al-ready resumed, howaver, and in many cases there are ample contracts on hand, but work is curtailed because curdomers request delay in delivery, as funds are not available for settle-ment. These concerns expect to have machinery in full operation when the money market becomes normal; sev-eral are preparing to resume after Jan. 1. Retail trade is more active, sules of holiday goods supplementing dealings in staple made merchandise and some western cities report that wholesale houses are receiving orders of usual size from country merchants for spring delivery. Output of finished steel products has declined still further and more plg iron furnaces are idle, but the senti-ment is not demoralized at leading ocaters, and some idle plants will re-sume next week. Prices remain com-paratively steady, although in many cases figures are wholly nominal ow-ing to the absence of new business. There is now no trouble to get goods, with long deterred shipments being received in large quantities. There is also plenty of gingham to be had now from the castern markets. Owing to the strin-gency and curtailment of busicess operations all over the country, east-ern mills and wholesalers have been receiving numerous cancelations of orders. But most of these cancela-tions are being refused, and forward-ing of goods ordered is being insisted upon. It is chime that the law will uphold them, in the matter of the interpretation of contracts, ha so do-ing.
