**AUTO HEART.**

Health Commissioner Finds New Disease for List of Human Ills.

Health Commissioner James Bosley of New York has sounded a note of warning to automobilists. He has discovered the "auto heart," a disease that is liable to death. At considerable length the commissioner, who has had more than 100 cases of the "auto heart," "Automobile heart" with hearts that have the slightest tendency to weakness should be cautious," said Dr. Bosley. "The excitement of rapid traveling in the open car causes an overstrain on the heart, and if this organ is weak the condition of the automobilist is a more dangerous one. Sometimes slightly out of the ordinary, like a narrow escape from a collision or the running down of a man, might give the finishing touch and death might follow." Dr. Bosley ends rather lamely by stating that he had not yet come across in his private practice a case of heart trouble which could be ascribed to the automobile habit, nor had he heard of a well-authenticated case, but he believed that such a thing as the "auto heart" was possible, just as it is possible for persons with weak hearts to bring on trouble by exciting themselves in other ways.

**ELLIOT IS REVERSED.**

## LOU DILLON CASE REFUSES TO DOWN

Decision on Famous Sanders Affidavit Reversed in Supreme Court.

SMATHERS STILL HAS CUP.

But Effort of Memphis Trotting Association to Recover It From Mayor Delmar's Owner Still Goes On.

New York, Nov. 12.—Decision was reversed yesterday by Justice Downing in the supreme court on an application made by John J. Adams, counsel for E. E. Smathers, for permission to inspect an affidavit said to have been made in St. Louis by Edward Sanders, in which Sanders is said to have admitted that he deceived C. E. Gilling's trotting mare, Lou Dillon, when she was defeated by Smathers' Major Delmar in the race for the Memphis gold cup in October, 1904.

The case was an offshoot of the proceedings in which the Memphis Trotting association is seeking to recover the gold cup from Smathers on the ground of the alleged doctoring of Lou Dillon.

**NEGROES IN NEW YORK.**

Their Condition Bad and Likely to Become Worse.

New York, Nov. 12.—At the twelfth annual meeting and banquet of the Colleague club last night, William Jay Schieffelin, chairman of the committee for the general improvement of industrial conditions of the negroes in New York, declared the condition of the negro in this city was bad and likely to become worse. He said in part:

"In the north the tendency is to treat the negro with political equality, but with social severity. The recent troubles in the south may be repeated here some time. An example of the way the negro is treated was afforded on the upper west side a little while ago. In that and similar cases, where whites and negroes quarrel, the police generally hit the negro."

"The most disgraceful campaign ever waged in the south has just closed in Georgia. At least 20 of those killed by the mobs were victims of Hoke Smith's campaign."

**THAW'S NEW COUNSEL.**

Delphin M. Delmas Will Have Charge of the Case.

New York, Nov. 12.—Delphin M. Delmas, a leading member of the bar on the Pacific slope, who has been engaged to defend Harry K. Thaw, indicted for the murder of Stanford White, the architect, made arrangements with the defense, at 12 o'clock yesterday.

Four hours later he was in consultation with his client in the Tombs and had agreed with him on the line of defense. This, it is stated, will be justification of the deed.

Regardless of what may be the outcome of the trial, Mr. Delmas, according to the World, today, will abandon his residence in California and continue the practice of his profession in New York.

The California lawyer will dominate the trial throughout, it is understood. With the full consent of Clifford W. Hartbridge, the attorney of record and personal counsel of Thaw.

As to the retaining fee, the estimate of eastern lawyers, who have been given Thaw's ability is that the understanding yesterday could not have been far short of \$100,000.

It is expected the trial will begin Dec. 2.

Mr. Delmas is a striking personality. He has been called the Napoleon of the bar in the west, not only because of his resourcefulness and his courage, but because of his facial and bodily resemblance to the first consul. He is 55 years old.

**LOS ANGELES WILL ANNEX TERRITORY.**

Los Angeles, Nov. 12.—By the close vote of 6 in its favor, the plan to annex a large territory lying between this city and San Pedro was approved yesterday in a special election by the city of the city and county districts.

To pass, the measure had to be favored by a plurality of both city and county, counted separately. In the city the plan carried 7 to 1, but in the annexed territory there was but 6 votes plurality.

park, the racing plant of the Los Angeles jockey club, and by the election the park is brought under the jurisdiction of the city ordinances which prohibit pool selling. Representatives of the racing interests are said to have made a great endeavor to defeat an annexation today. What their next move will be is not known.

When the returns of today's election are properly certified and passed upon by the state authorities, a strip of one half mile wide and about 16 miles long will become a part of Los Angeles city, making San Pedro and Los Angeles adjoining cities. This is the first step in a plan to annex San Pedro harbor to the city of Los Angeles.

**TO INVESTIGATE CONSOLIDATION**

Chicago, Nov. 12.—An investigation into the proposed consolidation of the Edison and Chicago Subways companies was ordered last night by the city council. The committee on gas, oil and electric light was instructed to ascertain and report what effect the projected merger would have on the city's power to reduce electric current rates and to take over the subway business at the expiration of the franchise in 1923.

**BREWING PLANT BURNED.**

New York, Nov. 12.—The plant of the Columbia Brewing company, recently purchased by Lembeck & Hertz, and located on the Newark bay at the foot of Winfield and Bartholdi avenues, Jersey City, comprising seven buildings, was burned early today. The loss will be about \$150,000.

Hugo Schuler, the engineer, was seriously burned in an attempt to save property.

**JAPANESE FOR HAWAII.**

Honolulu, Nov. 12.—(9:50 p. m.)—Capt. Misano, commanding the Japanese steamer Chikusa, says that the immigration companies of Japan are prepared to send 20,000 laborers to the Hawaiian islands by next June, which the regular transportation companies were unable to handle. Six thousand young men are now in Yokohama ready to embark for the islands. The Chikusa brought over 900 immigrants to this port from the Ryukyu islands.

**PRESIDENT CASTRO.**

Illness Approaching a Climax With Little Hope of Recovery.

Willemstad, Island of Curacao, Nov. 12.—The latest advice received here from Caracas confirms previous reports to the effect that President Castro's illness is approaching a climax and that physicians believe it is impossible for him to recover.

The Venezuela rebel leader, Montilla, is again in arms, has twice defeated government troops, and has threatened to pillage the town of Baruta. Serious disturbances, it is still asserted, are feared in case of Castro's death.

**VALUABLE WHALE CATCH.**

San Francisco, Nov. 12.—The whaling steamer Bowhead, which left here Sunday, 11, arrived here yesterday from the Arctic with a catch valued at over \$100,000.

The Bowhead secured 11 whales and brought home 30,000 pounds of bone and 379 barrels of oil.

**THE PRESIDENT'S PARTY.**

A Wireless Says They Are 600 Miles Off Colon.

Washington, Nov. 12.—According to a wireless message which reached the White House over night, the baited boat Louisiana, with the president and party on board, was 600 miles off Colon last night. The weather was reported to be fine. A message came from the naval station at Guantanamo to Key West, and thence to the Washington wireless station.

**SENATOR CULLOM**

Has Severe Attack of Nausea While at the Navy Department.

Washington, Nov. 12.—Senator Cullom suffered a slight attack of indigestion and nausea while at the navy department today, requiring the attention of a physician. He is resting easily and it is believed soon will be completely recovered.

**THIEF'S COMET SEEN.**

Cambridge, Mass., Nov. 12.—A telegram has been received at the Harvard college observatory from Prof. W. S. Burnell, the 14-year-old photographer, stating that Thiele's comet was observed Nov. 12 in right ascension, 9 hours, 21 minutes, 52 seconds, and declination plus 14 degrees, 2 minutes and 42 seconds.

**DISTINGUISHED ARRIVALS.**

New York, Nov. 12.—On board the steamer Kaiser Wilhelm II, which arrived today from Bremen, Southampton and Cherbourg were Dr. W. H. Solf, German governor of Samoa; Geraldine Farrar, Enrico Caruso, and Anton Van Rooy, the opera singers, and Fred Tatal, the jockey.

**WILL DEPORT JAP BRIDE.**

San Francisco, Nov. 12.—The commissioner of immigration has ordered that Huda Sunada, the 14-year-old photographic bride of Ichitaro Sunada, a barber in Sacramento, be deported to Japan. She arrived on the steamer Korae. She stated that she had been married by the photographic custom of her country and had never met her husband.

**OLD RUSS HOUSE.**

Has Been Leased and Big Building to Be Put Up.

San Francisco, Nov. 12.—The announcement is made that the site of the old Russ House on Broadway, between Rush and Pine has been leased to a local syndicate for a term of 20 years. The intention is, it is said, to erect a modern building thereon to cost \$1,250,000. The lessors are to have the option of purchasing the property for \$200,000 within five years from commencement of lease.

**CRIME IN ALLEGHENY.**

Pittsburg, Pa., Nov. 12.—Almost simultaneously with the numerous burglaries and cases of highway robbery in this city, come reports from throughout Allegheny and adjoining counties of like crimes accompanied by violence. In dispatches to the Associated Press last night no less than eight such cases were reported within a radius of miles of Pittsburg, some of them attended with fatal results.

In line with steps taken by the Pittsburg city authorities the officials of neighboring boroughs began last night to take precautions against any "epidemic of crime" in their bailiwicks.

At Sewickley last night an ordinance was passed by the local council increasing the police force, and calling upon the police to apprehend all suspicious characters. The borough council of Sharpsburg, also a neighboring borough, empowered the police commissioners to employ as many additional men as deemed necessary.
