And, especially, none are desired as settlers but such as are devoted to the upbuilding of Zion. Others, no matter how numerous, would only weaken, in-stead of adding strength.

There are facilities here for three or more settlements, and probably at no very distant date, another Stake will be organized in this part of the land of Joseph. And so Zion spreads in the land.

All communications for this place should be directed to Colonia Oaxaca, Sonora, Mexico. If the word "Colonia" is omitted, a letter will go to the city of Oaxaca, a thousand miles farther south.
