

WEDDING BELLS BADLY JANGLED

Unhappy Wives Relate to Court
Tales of Woeful Matrimony.

DESERTERS IN LARGE NUMBER

Husbands Who Wander from Their Family Hearth Held Up to Judicial Scorn at Friday Matinee.

Deserted by her husband, George E. Sahlin, a salesman, who mysteriously disappeared a year ago, Mrs. Elizabeth Sahlin of 443 West South Temple street was granted a divorce yesterday by Judge Morse. Like a message from the grave was the letter she received from him in Sweden last January, stating that he intended never to live with her again. She immediately filed an action for divorce and was granted the custody of her daughter, Margaret, 11 years old.

Until a year ago their married life had been happy. When the hard times came, Sahlin was thrown out of employment and he became despondent. Without bidding his wife or daughter good-bye, he disappeared one day and no trace of him could be found. Mrs. Sahlin was held in suspense for several months and finally gave him up for dead. When she heard from him in Sweden, his native land, and learned of his intentions, she sought a divorce. They were married here Aug. 20, 1894.

DEFAULT SET ASIDE

After a hard fight, Mrs. Phoebe R. Farrar succeeded in setting aside the default in her case and in an answer and cross-complaint filed yesterday, asks for a division of her husband's property which is valued at \$15,000. Mrs. Farrar began action for a divorce over a year ago against her husband, W. E. Farrar, a grocer, of 18 West South Temple street. In her complaint she alleged cruelty, charging him with striking her in the face. After several conferences with her husband she withdrew the suit. Then Farrar filed a complaint for divorce, alleging cruelty and other charges, naming four co-respondents. Two months ago her default was entered and the decree was granted to her husband. In the petition she filed asking to set aside the judgment, she stated that her attorneys had been dilatory in taking care of her case. She said that she had the custody of two minor children and that she had nothing on which to support and educate them. She set forth that her husband was worth \$15,000 and she asks for a division of the property. When they were married, Mrs. Farrar had some money and that his wealth was accumulated by her assistance and hard labor.

Farrar's attorneys objected to opening the case again and arguments were heard. The judgment was set aside and the case will be heard a week from Friday. They were married here Nov. 12, 1895, and have two daughters, Lilian, 12 years old, and Ella, 10 years old.

TO MODIFY DECREE

The case of Mrs. Anella Reese Stockdale filed against W. H. Stockdale will be opened again for a modification of the decree. Mrs. Reese, who has married again since she was divorced from Stockdale, asked that her former husband be required to pay \$20 per month for the support of their child, Francis, who is now six years old. When the decree was granted on the grounds of cruelty four years ago, Stockdale was ordered to pay \$20 a month for the support of their son. Now that the expense of keeping the boy has increased, Mrs. Stockdale asks that the decree be modified accordingly.

FOUR UNHAPPY WIVES

Mrs. Belle Kay was granted a divorce from her husband, George Kay, and a new one from her maiden name, Belle Leonard. They were married on Feb. 11, 1904. For the past year he has failed to provide for her and she has supported herself by doing domestic work.

Mrs. Mattie Trip Taylor was granted a divorce from her husband, Francis E. Taylor, who has been an habitual drunkard for several years. When she sought the divorce she failed to support her squandering the wages for liquor. For more than a year he has not worked and has been intoxicated most of the time. They were married Oct. 12, 1894.

On the grounds of desertion, Mrs. Minnie E. Utley of Brigham was granted a divorce from Lafayette Utley, a miner. They were married on Jan. 19, 1907, at Brigham. Since her husband deserted her, Mrs. Utley has supported herself by conducting a rooming house.

Mrs. Lydia Miles secured a divorce from George D. Miles, a painter, for desertion. They have two children, George, 4 years old, and Arthur, 2 years old, who are in her custody. She was granted \$20 a month for their support. They were married Oct. 11, 1904.

ENTERS THREE SUITS

The Utah Mining Machinery & Supply Company brought three suits yesterday in the Third district court to recover \$2,500 for supplies which had been delivered. The first action was filed against the Silver Shield Mining company for \$1,043.60. Harry S. Joseph was made the defendant in the second action to recover \$443.35. In the third action the United Brigham Gold & Copper Mining company was made the defendant. The machinery company sues to recover \$2,500 with interest from May 1, 1908.

BREACH OF CONTRACT

O. C. Dranga entered suit in the Third district court yesterday to recover \$1,523.30 for breach of contract, from George C. Fetterman. It is alleged that Fetterman agreed to loan the California Mercantile company for \$2,000. Dranga advanced \$2,000 on the contract and then Fetterman refused to carry out his agreement. He asks for the recovery of the money advanced and \$1,032.50 for damages and interest.

CASTLE NOT GUILTY

After three minutes deliberation, the jury in the case of the city ex Charles Castle, a horse trader, charged with cruelty to animals by letting out a horse's tongue, returned a verdict of not guilty in Judge Bowman's court yesterday afternoon. The case has been hanging fire for several days. It was alleged that Castle tied a rope to the tongue of a halibut horse and jerked on the rope until a piece of the tongue was torn out. The jury was composed of John Alfred, Charles G. Wrick, George H. Crow and Morris Beck.
