Bank Clearings.—The bank clearings of today showed an increase of \$15, \$49 over the corresponding date of last year, the respective amounts being \$714,059.07 and \$673,188.99.

Increased Capital.—The Wasatch Stock company filed an amendment to its articles of incorporation increasing the number of shares of stock by which its capital stock is increased from \$100,000 to \$200,000, divided into shares of the par value of \$100 each.

Paying Salaries.—Clerk Judd of the city board of education is issuing warrants today for the payment of the salaries of the members and officers of the board of education and the janitors of the city schools. The members are being paid their quarterly salaries while the officers and janitors are being paid for the month of June. The total amount of the payrolls is \$3,553.55.

Banker Loses Horse.—Joseph Nelson, cashier of the Utah National bank is today mourning the loss of a good saddle horse. Last evening the animal was left standing in front of the Templeton building while the rider went into a barbershop for a shave. When he came out all there was to indicate that a horse had ever been tethered in the hills was a piece of one of the reins of the bridle. The presumption is that the animal became frightened and broke away and ran off into the hills or out of the city on some country road. Mr. Nelson is now either walking or using the street car. In the meantime the police and sheriff's force are looking for the missing equine in the belief that he may have been stolen.
