But the prohibition and regulation of gambling in all forms and lotteries of every description are un-quastionably valid everyties of logistic questionably valid exercises of legisla-tive power, and if the scheme established by the advertiser was, in effect, a lottery, the fact that the dominant purpose was merely to increase the ad-vertiser's business does not save it from ondemnation." His conclusion is that the contest was a lottery.

PARKER'S LAST DECISION.

Concerned Elections and Intent of Legislature Regarding Them.

Esopus, N. Y., Aug. 5.-It was earned tonight that among Judge Parker's last decisions was one on a con-tested election case of Joel Brink, who tested election case of Joel Brink, who was a candidate for supervisor in 1903 and was beaten on the returns by one majority. He obtained a writ of man-damus, requiring the town board of canvassers of Ulster to recanvass the vote. He said technically irregular things were done. The court decides against him. against him.

Manila, Aug. 5.—The opium com-mission, appointed last August by for-mer Gov. Taft to investigate the laws and conditions with regard to opium in all oriental countries, has rendered its report. The committee recommends that the opium traffic should be strictly a covernment monopoly at one of the a government monopoly at once: that at the end of three years the importa-tion of opium should be absolutely pro-hibited with the exception of medicinal
