Notwithstanding the fears of treas-try officials that on account of the re-peal of the war taxes and the heavy appropriations by Congress they might soon be confronted with a deficit, no such thing is in sight now. Although the expenditures so far this year have exceeded the receipts by nearly \$10,000,-000, the outlook now is favorable that by the end of the fiscal year all this will have been regained. The receipts from customs duties during the six weeks of the current fiscal year have exceeded those of the corresponding six weeks of that year by more than \$3,000,-000. Last year they were \$33,000,000, this year \$39,000,000. This increase is alto-gether unexpected. The officials of the treasury cannot account for it, nor can they do more than guess how long it will continue. All calculations have been upset. The figures showing a big deheit for the year have been laid aside. Those charged with the duty of reck-toning how the balance sheet will stand have given up in despair.
