TWO LARGE EVENTS.

On the following Saturday, July 21, the Salt Lake Y. M. C. A. holds its annual field day and swimming contest. Entries in both these events are from people who love what they are doing, and who make their living at work other than the sports in which they enter. THE RACE MEET.

The list of items in the contest of the soccer people for next Saturday is as follows. It begins at 2:30 o'clock:

100 yards dash.

50 yards young ladies' race.

75 yards boys' race (under 16 years).

50 yards girls' race (under 16 years).

75 yards dribbling race, 10 posts in distance.

150 yards obstacle race.

50 yards egg and spoon race, under 14 years.

50 yards three-legged race, under 14 years.

Place or long kick for state record, open to the state.

25 yards sack race.

440 yards race.

Five side footbal contest, 10 minutes each way, (no off-side rule allowed).

Standing jump.

Hop, step and jump.

Game of rounders.
