LOCAL BRIEFS.

Boys' Club Concert—The Boys' club of the Hill neighborhood church will give a concert tomorrow evening in the church.

John W. Douglass Dead—John W. Douglass of Rock Springs, died six years a resident of this city, died Sunday night, of pneumonia.

Body Sent Home—The body of the late John W. Douglass was sent today to Westfield, Mass., for interment. No services were held here.

Poultry Association Meets—A meeting of the Utah State Poultry Association will be held this evening at 8 o'clock at the Commercial club. The public is invited to attend.

To Address Pupils—Addresses will be made by President H. P. Henderson of the school board and City Supt. Christensen in Poplar Grove school, Friday afternoon, the regular work of the day being discontinued at noon.

Cripple Will Lose Her Leg—Miss Emily Butt, who has walked on crutches for more than 40 years, stumbled and fell at her home, 316 King street, last evening, breaking her leg. She was taken to the Groves L. D. S. hospital where the limb will be amputated.

Mrs. Strassman Dead—Mrs. Sarah Strassman, for 14 years an employe with Walker Bros., died in Denver a few days ago, at the age of 81. Her husband, Edward, died at the age of 81. The deceased leaves no children and her husband died several years ago. She resided in Denver in the fall of 1937.

Sunday Closing—The Butcher's and Grocers' association decided last evening to close up on Sunday, and appointed a committee to confer with the chief of police to enforce Sunday closing. An invitation was received from the Manufacturers' association to attend the property fair next Wednesday.

Secured For Meetinghouse—Carl A. Carlson, bishop of the Poplar Grove ward, completed the purchase of the old Utah school building yesterday when he paid \$3,000 to the board of education. The building will be used as a meetinghouse and the juvenile court will find another location for the detention house.

The Building Record—The building permits for the month of March amounted to \$339,000 which is an increase of \$13,000 over March of last year. For the first quarter of this year the permits call for a total expenditure of \$1,167,300. This is an increase of \$189,783 over the same period for last year.

Farnsworth Qualifies—W. H. Farnsworth, appointed a member of the board of state land commissioners qualified yesterday by filing his bond of \$10,000 and the juvenile court will find another location for the detention house.

Rev. Buxton Now a Teacher—Rev. Albert Buxton is no longer connected with the pastorate of the Central Christian church, his resignation recently tendered taking effect yesterday. Three weeks ago Dr. Buxton was given a vacation that was rightfully coming to him from last summer, and he took advantage of the vacation to take the place temporarily of the teacher of Latin in the Eureka high school, where he will probably be engaged until the end of the school year.

LYON IS AFTER COUNTY FATHERS
Says Money Paid for Advertising Tax Lists Must be Paid Back.

A CONFERENCE IS HELD.

Some Say Matter Was Discussed, While Others Declare Good Roads Were Under Consideration.

Unless the county commissioners return to the county treasury \$4,455.54, the amount illegally paid to the Interstate Mountain Republic for advertising delinquent tax lists in 1938, County Atty. J. P. Lyon declares that he will bring suit against them. This amount, which Mr. Lyon thinks ought to be returned to the treasury, is the difference between the total amount paid to the Republican under its contract for 1937, when bids were asked, and for 1938, when the paper named Mr. Lyon read the demands and the return of this money was made several days ago. As a result the county commissioners were in a "star chamber" session yesterday afternoon with United States Dist. Atty. J. P. Lyon, president of the Republican and Collector of Internal Revenue E. H. Callahan, its vice president, in regard to the affair. After they had labored together for some time, Mr. Lyon, who was called to appear before the commissioners, he left before the meeting closed.

Although the commissioners refused to say what the result of the meeting was, it is believed that Mr. Lyon read them the statute and left without indulging in further discussion. He refused to be quoted last night but said that he would do his duty.

The commissioners last night said that the proposition made by Mr. Lyon to return the money was discussed.

James E. Clinton, chairman, said that after Mr. Lyon left the meeting this matter was discussed and it was decided to refuse any such demands.

John C. Mackay said that the bill was paid, and that was all there was to it. The matter is closed, he said, as far as the commissioners are concerned.

Walter C. Butler, declares that the commissioners do not intend to pay back any money which they have paid out for the advertising of tax lists.

Mr. Butler and Mr. Callahan denied after the meeting that they had discussed the demands of the county attorney or the question of returning any money to the treasury for advertising the tax lists. They said that they had been discussing a little matter concerning the return of the money.

Until last year the commissioners have advertised for tenders as required by law. The Republican secured the contract in 1937 for a little more than \$4,000. The commissioners failed to advertise last year and the Republican pointed the lists at their own price. The bill amounted to more than \$5,000 and the claim was passed without any question.

The matter first came to the attention of John Grovesbeck, county treasurer, who objected to paying such an amount for publishing of tax lists. He wrote two letters to the county commissioners about it and then informed the county attorney when the commissioners refused to consider his communications.

When Mr. Lyon took a hand in the matter he told them that their action under the statute was illegal. The board asked for time, but a few days ago, Mr. Lyon insisted that the money be returned or he would file suit against them.

Mr. Lyon said that he will defer further action until he receives a formal reply from the commissioners as to the result of their meeting yesterday. He declares, however, that the action is illegal and that he intends to do his duty.
