RELEASED BUT IN JAIL.

Peculiar Condition in Which Alleged Thief Finds Himself Today.

Released upon his own recognizance by order of the court, but still in jail, is the condition in which Leon Soudard finds himself today. Soudard is the young man arrested several weeks ago on the charge of robbing a number of rooms in the Orpheum roominghouse. There are five complaints, charging burglary in the second degree, filed against him. Two cases were set for hearing this morning, out of the witnesses had left town for Nevada, and will not be back for a week or 10 days. This case was continued indefinitely and Judge Diehl ordered the man released on his own recognizance so far as that particular case was concerned. The other case had to be continued until tomorrow because one of the witnesses, Murphy or O'Loughlin, a clerk at the roominghouse, was unable to testify. The other two cases are set for tomorrow morning and as Soudard is unable to furnish bonds in four of the cases he was taken back to the county jail.

Gus Cravens, the colored man arrested a few days ago on the charge of breaking into J. T. Krage's barber shop in the Commercial National bank building and stealing therefrom a shotgun, pleaded not guilty to the charge of burglary in the second degree, and the case was set for Nov. 2. In default of \$500 bail the man was taken to the county jail.

SAYS HIS FATHER TOLD BOY TO BEG

Juvenile Court Investigating Case Of Alleged Depravity of Parent.

LAD A CLEVER DECEIVER

He Leads County Attorney and Probation Officer About the City Before Disclosing Name.

The juvenile court officers are investigating a case of alleged parental delinquency surprising in its depravity, it being nothing more nor less than the teaching of their 10-year-old boy to beg on the streets. As P. T. Farnsworth, Jr., was walking along the street last evening he was accosted by a little fellow who asked for something to "take home for his father's breakfast." Becoming interested in the boy, Mr. Farnsworth asked where he lived, and was told that his parents lived at 69 North State street. Setting out with the lad, Mr. Farnsworth soon found that he had been deceived, and his suspicions being aroused, he telephoned to Probation Officer Guardello Brown of the juvenile court, to accompany him. The boy led the two men all over town in search of the supposed residence of his parents, but was unable to locate it.

The boy was found to be expert for one of his years in the practice of this kind of deception. It was taken to the station that his real identity was discovered. The lad's name is Henry Miller, and it is said the lad's mother, about a year ago, caused something of a sensation by offering her baby for sale. The officers are of the opinion that the boy had been sent out by his parents to beg, and they are now charging them with contributing to the delinquency of the child.

REFUTES HIS OBITUARY. John Ferris Declares He Is Not Dead. As Some May Think.

Writing to the "News" from Lander, Idaho, under date of Oct. 25, John Ferris wishes the fact noted, that he is not dead. Several months ago John Ferris died in this city, under suspicious circumstances, and despite the difference in the spelling of the two names, the correspondence is of the opinion that some people think that he is dead. Following is Mr. Ferris' letter: "I enclose you herewith a clipping from a Salt Lake paper, sent me by A. J. C. H. Dowse, of the Salt Lake Herald. It states that I am dead. I had tramped my last prospect on the mountains. But I am the same lively corpse as of yore, in this great copper and gold region of the Seven Devils copper country. I have many relatives in Utah that may suppose me dead. I am still a live Republican since Abraham Lincoln's first election; an old timer, the same man that put up the silver sand reefs at Leadville, Utah; at Harrisburg in March, 1875; rambling old Idaho; and busy still in geology, mines and mining; at about 70 years old, hearty as a bear on the mountains."
