## LOCAL BRIEFS.

Death of Charles Butters—John Butters visiting this city has just received word that his brother Charles Butters of Clarkston is dead.

Rule For Dog Days—The rules of the street car service prohibiting dogs on the cars suspended during the fare to the extent for carrying canines for 25 cents each trip.

Socialist Speaker—John W. Brown, a national speaker of the Socialist party, will speak at Socialist headquarters this evening on "The Problem of the Unemployed; Panics, their Cause and Cure."

Awards Postponed—The opening of bids for the 13 room addition to the Riverside school has been postponed until Oct. 14. The board meets this evening to consider the bids for the Jefferson school on Walker field.

Choose Class Officers—The L. D. S. Commercial school students have chosen the following officers for the ensuing year: President, James Paxton; Vice-President, Rhea Rogers; Secretary, James Givson; and Harry Powell, reported for "Gold and Blue."

Miners Resume Work—Reports from Rock Springs state that the force of coal miners depleted by the September idleness is being gradually restored to its normal strength. Practically what it was before the strike, as far as the progress of work is concerned.

Rev. Bowerman Called—The united congregations of the First Baptist and East side Baptist churches have decided on "Immanuel Baptist Church" as the title of the new organization. A call has been extended unanimously to Rev. Louis S. Bowerman, pastor of the East Side church. The two old churches will meet Sunday morning next, as usual in their accustomed places of worship, but uniting in the evening at the Jewish temple.

Olmsted, San Francisco, Cal.; District 6, E. T. Allen, Portland, Or.

Death After Operation—Following an operation, Andrew W. Johnson, of Spanish Fork, died at the Groves L. D. S. hospital shortly after 7 o'clock last evening. A week ago he came to the city for treatment and it was found that an operation would be necessary. He was too weak, however, to stand the ordeal and death resulted as indicated. The deceased was about 50 years of age. The remains will be shipped to his home town for burial.

Deputies Raid Resort—Deputy Sheriffs Corliss and Eddington made another raid on Commercial street last night and as a result a dive at No. 20 is closed and two women who were inmates have another place of shelter, the county jail. A great many complaints have been made about No. 20 and the deputies decided to close up the place. They quietly entered the house, placed Camille Smith and another woman under arrest on the charge to the county jail.

TO DEPORT LIU SUNG.

For Liu Sung, a poor Chinaman, America is not a good country, and Liu has just about given up all hope of continuing long to reside in it. United States Immigration Inspector Longley had a little to do with Liu's view of the case, and he did that little last week when he took Liu into custody at Rock Springs, Wyo. Inspector Longley returned to Salt Lake yesterday. With Liu it is expected that he will soon start for the coast, bent upon the task of seeing Liu safely deported past the western boundary line. Liu Sung was first arrested two years ago charged with coming into the country after the Chinese exclusion act was passed. He was released, but the same appeared from sight to remain under cover until located recently in Rock Springs. He was first taken up at Omaha, where his trial occurred in 1906.

## EDITH EVANS IS "DOING NICELY"

English Nurse Who Was in Spot  
Light Here Has a  
Father Now.

### RICH OLD MAN ADOPTS HER

She Cared Tenderly for His Wife and  
They Took Her Into the Family.  
Fold in Los Angeles.

Reports received from Los Angeles would indicate that Miss Edith Evans, a young English nurse who for a short time made her home in this city, has a more successful way of acquiring wealth than by suing men for breach of promise. She has adopted herself or been adopted into the family of a millionaire of the coast city. Miss Evans gained notoriety here by entering suit against Dr. W. A. McEnery for \$50,000, which she demanded as a panacea for her wounded feelings, alleging that Dr. McEnery had betrayed her under promise of marriage. She received a neat sum by way of compromise, and went to the coast. Very soon thereafter a similar suit was filed in Los Angeles against a young bank clerk named Curtis W. Springer, whom she accused of tampering with her affections. Part of the story as well as an account of the alleged adoption is thus told in a Los Angeles paper of recent date: "Miss Edith Evans, the pretty young woman who sued Curtis W. Springer, the paying teller of the Southern Trust company, for breach of promise, no longer cares for the \$50,000 damages she hoped to receive by order of the court. "She has now been adopted by a millionaire whose wife she has cared for and a paltry \$50,000 is like a drop of water in the ocean compared with the prospective riches as the adopted daughter of an aged man of millions. In a forgiving mood she has signed the papers asking the courts to dismiss the lawsuit against the young man who, she says, promised to make her his wife and then refused to take her to the altar.

FORGIVEN, NOT FORGOTTEN. "Though she has forgiven him, she has not forgotten. "Indeed, there are moments when her heart is filled with hatred for the man whom she accused of trifling with her affections; there are times when she hates the very thought of him. But, alas, when she thinks of herself for her lack of discernment and her foolish, girlish confidence in man.

"I don't see what on earth I found in the little French doctor Miss Evans in an interview yesterday. He is such an uninteresting creature, whose sole topics of conversation were baseball and flattery. His letters were so empty, so barren of thought, that I often desisted from reading them. When I think that I allowed him to caress me, to put his lips to mine and kiss me, and then to desert me, I realize the stupidity of it all, the foolishness of a trusting girl. Still I forgive him."

"Miss Evans said that Springer has molested her ever since she filed the \$50,000 damage suit against him in the superior court. She stated yesterday that Springer approached her several times at the hotel where she is, and that she finally yielded to his entreaties and signed the papers releasing him from any obligations toward her.

GREW TIRED OF HIM. "I was sick of him," she stated. "One evening he invited me and a friend to dine with him at a downtown cafe. We accepted and had a good time but when the waiter came with his bill Springer gave me a sign of distress and I slipped him a \$5 gold piece with which he settled for the supper. Then my friend said it was not right that I should pay and she returned the money to me and settled for the dinner."

"Miss Evans says that ever since she began the suit against Springer he has visited her frequently importing her at times to agree to a dismissal of the action. He told her that he had a chance to regain his position in the bank, which he was forced to leave because of the notoriety the case gave him.

"Finally, she says, she 'returned good for evil and dismissed the case,' though it was because of her changed mind utterly about that."
