

Chicago Millionaire Manufacturer Says He Never Sent Money To Colorado Springs.

THINKS SHE WAS MURDERED.

Kansas City, Aug. 1 .- The funeral of Miss Laura Matthews, who died from a pistol wound at Colorado Springs, will be held in this city tomorrow. Charles A. Coey, the Chcago manufacturer with whom she had carried on a correspondence; Mrs. Jennie Matthews, mother of the girl, and other relatives arrived here from Chcago tonight.
