APPLICATION OF THE STEREOSCOPE TO THE STUDY OF EUCLID.—A valuable application of the stereoscope to educational purposes has just been made. Every one who has gone through the 11th book of Euclid is aware of the great difficulty, which is superadded to that of the problem itself, of the clear appreciation of the diagrams. Treating of solid figures, it is impossible to convey an accurate idea by diagrams on a flat surface, and this difficulty is really the greatest of the two in the case of the more intricate propositions. G. F. Sams has now brought out a series of slides, which, when viewed in the stereoscope, will be found of the greatest assistance to the student. When viewed in this instrument, the lines, instead of lying flat upon the paper, stretch like wires from point to point in space; planes are seen to intersect each other like sheets of cardboard, inclined at various angles; and solid angles and pyramids have their edges and angular points in such tangible relief that a model could not afford a better illustration of the text. The letters, also, are so contrived as to appear to belong to the joints to which they refer, and to stand out at the proper distances from the spectators.
