### CASE DISMISSED.

The case of the state of Utah against Frank Monroe charged with burglary

in the second degree was dismissed upon the motion of the district attorney yesterday afternoon. This action was taken on account of the death of the state's star witness, W. D. Velade, who committed suicide Wednesday morning.

All effort to locate the relatives of Velade have thus far proven fruitless. It is known that a sister of the deceased resides in Hood River valley, Oregon, but thus far the police have failed to locate her.

### MOUNT PLEASANT.

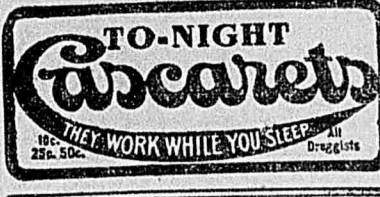
