octrine of revelation includes the conception of both revelation by the per-sonal appearance and guidance of divine beings and revelations by heavenly inspiration; and, further, that while any Latter-day Saint living in the line, and acting within the scope, of his duty, is entitled to inspiration, revelation by personal or other miraculous manifestation is not held to be unbroken and incessant, but to be youch-Safed upon occasions, as God may will. This kind of revelation, being the ex-tent of its claim of direct and constant revelation, the "Mormon" Church has not denied. President Smith, not denied. President Smith, in Washington, quoted the pas-sage from the Doctrine and Coven-ants, stating. "That whatsoever you shall speak when moved upon by the Holy Ghost . . . shall be the word of the Lord." which he applied not only to himself, but, with equal force, to ev-ery Elder in the Church; that revela-tions for the government and guidance of the Church come only through the head of the Church; that revelation game by the Spirit of the Lord as well as by a visible appearance of the Al-mighty, or of an angei; that a revela-

mighty, or of an angel; that a revela-tion might come by an audible voice or by an inspiration, known and heard or by an inspiration, known and heard only by the person concerned, or by writing, as in the case of the Book of "Mormon;" and that it is a fundamen-tal doctrine of "Mormonism" that reve-lations are given to the head of the Church. Surely, here is no abandon-ment of the "Mormon" doctrine of rev-elation. Having these facts in view, there is found absolutely no surrender of "Mormon" tenet or violence to "Mor-mon" ideals, in President Smith's asser. mon" ideals, in President Smith's asser-

mon" ideals, in President Smith's asser-tion that he has received no formal rev-elation during his presidency. That, substantially, the entire Church membership believes Joseph F. Smith to be susceptible to the inspiration, of the Spirit of the Lord, and is a fit and the proper channel through whom the Almighty will reveal Himself upon oc-casion cannot be gainsaid. Not having announced a formal revelation to the Church during his incumbency, no one Church during his incumbency, no one should have been surprised at his frank statements in Washington. If he is to be criticized, it should be in this case, as usual with him, not for evasion and by particular, but exthet for evasion and hypocricy, but, rather, for unflinching frankness and uncompromising honesty of statement.

Your further point-respecting the confusion with which the words reve-lation and inspiration were used by President Smith at Washington-requir-es. I fancy, but little attention. I did not assert, as you infer, that President Smith was confused as to the meaning of these words, merely that he confused

of these words, morely that he confused their use-my meaning would have been more accurately expressed had I said that he interchanged their use. My communication to the Heraid, quoted by you, clearly states that Pres-ident Smith and his questioners had different conceptions of the words; this fact, no doubt, chiefly ied to the confu-sion in the use thereof, to whigh I al-luded. Your editorial writer affects to believe that these words are so clear of definition, and so easily distinguish-able one from the other that for a church member to err in their use is flat heresy; and yet, I venture the as-sertion that there is no general agree-ment, in this community or elsewhere, sertion that there is no general agree-ment, in this community or elsewhere, as to the exact meaning of these words, and that it will be impossible, either for the editor of the Tribune, or any mem-ber of the staff of that paper, to Indi-cate precisely where revelation ends and inspiration begins, or how far one is co-extensive with the other.
