LOCAL BRIEFS.

The officers' mess at Fort Douglas will open regularly in two weeks.

Assistant General Freight Agent S. V. Derrah of the Denver & Rio Grande left this morning for San Francisco on a business trip.

Word has been received in this city of the death of Daniel H. Wheeler, Jr., of Omaha, a singer of some note, known to a number of Salt Lake people.

Edward McFadden, an old time Park City miner, died yesterday afternoon, at the Holy Cross hospital. He was for 38 years a resident of this territory and state, and leaves an aged mother in Ireland.

Owing to the obscurity occasioned by the storm there was a narrow escape from collision at 8 o'clock last evening, between an Agricultural Park car and a Rio Grande car. The motorist stopped his car within a few feet of the train. No casualties.

Local representatives of large tea importing houses report a probable rise in about two weeks, as the heavy stocks held in the warehouses are now about exhausted. The importation of so many natives in the Japanese war has materially reduced the number of hands usually employed in tea picking.

The meeting of the Commercial club that was to have been held yesterday afternoon, between Salt Lake shippers and Mr. Marsh relative to doing business at Goldfield, was postponed until this afternoon in order that Ogden jobbers and wholesalers might be on hand also and take part in the conference.

Local architects agree that the United States is now fully abreast of Europe in the development of its schools of architecture, and architectural attractiveness of its public and larger private edifices. At the same time it is generally acknowledged that for educational buildings the Tudor Gothic can hardly be improved upon.

Mr. Quigley says that general business all through the east is 25 per cent better than it was a year ago, and even better for a prosperous spring in this part of the country.

Mrs. Bransford is the mother of J. S. Bransford, Mrs. Edwin F. Holmes and Mrs. J. Tarvin Harris of this city. She has been spending the winter in California at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Holmes.

An eloquent and debating contest, under the auspices of the W. C. T. U., will be given tomorrow evening in the First Congregational church. A number of the brightest pupils in the public schools have been entered, and a handsome medal will be given to the winner. The children have been carefully trained under the direction of Miss L. Montgomery, and an interesting time is promised.

Parties interested in the new Las Vegas bank say that Senator Clark intends making of Las Vegas a model town, and there is every reason to believe it will grow rapidly, as the climate is attractive, and fruits can be grown there the same as in California. The cashier and other officers of the bank, who come from California, are now on the ground, and banking operations have already begun.

At last evening's meeting of the Butchers & Grocers' association it was brought out that the millers and wholesale dealers in grain and flour are underselling the smaller and retail dealers. This at once raised a hoodoo, and the retailers will cease handling on May 1, all prize bearing goods. The war on trading in grain, too, will be tried on, and it was decided to invite the Murray merchants to join the Salt Lake association.

The patent fender on the street cars scored another merit mark last evening. When Mrs. Mary Beard of 3 south Second and West street was struck by a car at South Temple and Third West streets, on account of the blinding snowstorm, Mrs. Beard fell from the car, but was caught by the fender and thus escaped going under the wheels. She was dragged a few feet, and her dress was somewhat torn, but otherwise she was unharmed. Mrs. Beard fainted away, but recovered on being carried into the nearest drug store.

MAJOR YOUNG
MAKES REPLY

Takes Tribune to Task for Slandereous Attack on President Smith.

REVELATION CLEARLY DEFINED.

Testimony at Washington Misrepresented and Misconstrued—Facts In the Case.

Replying to editorial misstatements, Hon. Richard W. Young has addressed the following to the Tribune:

To the Salt Lake Tribune—In your editorial of Sunday you reasserted, by inference, that President Smith, respecting revelation, told one thing at Washington and another thing here. You stated that "the Mormon Church has asserted . . . a claim of direct and constant revelation from Almighty God . . . and this is the kind of revelation which is now officially denied by the Mormon Church," and that my statement in the Herald, that there was confusion of the use of the words "revelation" and "inspiration" by President Smith, is an explanation that explains President Smith's use of his prophetic words. In addition to these misstatements, you ask me, first, why there was explanation in the Tabernacle if there was no misstatement in Washington; and, second, why the explanation only was printed in full.

President Smith's testimony was published by the government in Washington and republished here. This testimony was misrepresented and misconstrued after publication. The Tabernacle so called "explanations" were to correct misrepresentation and misconception, and cannot honestly be construed as admissions or explanations of misstatements by President Smith at Washington.

As to the alleged contradictions between testimony and sermon, permit me to point out that President Smith, in answer to Senator Dubois, as appears on page 483 of the record, states that, since becoming president of the Church, he had received no revelation from God which had been subjected to a conference of the Church, and that in his sermon at the Tabernacle, he stated that God had not given him a revelation upon any new doctrine to be observed or handed down as a guide to the Church; that in Washington he asserted, as appears on page 39 of the record, that God had shown to him by revelation that "Mormonism" is divine truth, a fact which he considered and the Tabernacle; that he stated, in Washington, that he had had impressions of the Spirit on his mind very frequently (p. 481), and that a knowledge of principles had been revealed to him, shown to him, on which he was ignorant before (p. 49), and that, in his discourse, he asserted that he fervently believed that God had manifested to him, in his present capacity, many glorious things, many principles, and oftentimes more wisdom than is inherent in him.

As to your assertion that the "Mormon" Church claims direct and constant revelation from God, and your further assertion that this is the kind of revelation which is now officially denied by the "Mormon" Church, I could remind you that the "Mormon" doctrine of revelation includes the revelation of both revelation by the personal appearance and guidance of divine beings and revelations by heavenly inspiration; and, further, that while any revelation received by an individual, and acting within the scope of his duty, is entitled to inspiration, revelation by personal or other miraculous manifestation is not held to be unbroken and direct, but to be conveyed upon occasions, as God may will. This kind of revelation, being the extent of its claim of direct and constant revelation, the "Mormon" Church has not denied, and is not denying, the revelation of the Spirit of the Lord as well as by a visible appearance of the Almighty, or of angelic hosts, a revelation might come by an audible voice or by an inspiration, known and heard only by the person concerned, or by writing, as in the case of the Book of Mormon, or by the revelation of the doctrine of revelation, which is a fundamental doctrine of the Church, and which is given to the head of the Church. Surely, here is no abandonment of the "Mormon" doctrine of revelation, and there is no denial of the fact that there is found absolutely no surrender of "Mormon" tenet or violence to "Mormon" ideals, in President Smith's assertion that he has received no formal revelation since his presidency.

That, substantially, the entire Church membership believes Joseph F. Smith to be susceptible to the inspiration of the Spirit of the Lord, and is a fit and proper channel through whom the Almighty will reveal Himself upon occasion cannot be gainsaid. Not having announced a formal revelation to the church, and his inactivity, no one should have been surprised at his statements in Washington. If he is to be criticized, it should be in this case, as usual with him, not for evasion and elusiveness, but rather, for unflinching frankness and uncompromising honesty of statement.

Your further point—respecting the confusion with which the words revelation and inspiration were used, either by President Smith at Washington—requires, I fancy, but little attention. I did not assert, as you infer, that President Smith was confused as to the meaning of the words, but that he confused their use—my meaning would have been more accurately expressed had I said that he interchanged their use.

My communication to the Herald, quoted by you, and the questions which President Smith and his questioners had different conceptions of the words; this fact, no doubt, chiefly led to the confusion in the use thereof, to which I alluded. Your editorial writer affects to believe that these words are so clear of definition, and so easily distinguishable one from the other that for a man of his intelligence to err in their use is a rare thing, and yet, I venture the assertion that there is no general agreement in this community or elsewhere, as to the exact meaning of these words, and that it will be impossible, either for the editor of the Tribune, or any member of the staff of that paper, to indicate precisely where revelation ends and inspiration begins, or how far one is co-extensive with the other. In San Francisco's Encyclopedia of Religious Knowledge, I find the following definition of revelation: "The word revelation stands for the act of God in making truths known to man, and then, in a secondary sense, for the truth itself which is thus made known; and inspiration is defined as follows: 'It is a name for the influence which the leaders and teachers of the true re-

ligion, who were at once the chief human agents of the revelation and the chief authorities of the Bible, men like Moses, Isaiah, John and Paul. Yours truly, RICHARD W. YOUNG, March 27, 1905.
