**Violent Explosion.**  
New York, 15.—Describing this  
situation, Villard says: "This I was  
actually brought face to face in Febru-  
ary, 1884, with the necessity of no  
distant date, of a suspension of pay-  
ments and its consequences consequent  
on the bankruptcy of the company. I  
less relief could be obtained from any  
quarter. I considered it my duty to  
extend to the company personally all  
the assistance in my power. I next  
arranged with the Oregon & Trans-  
continental Company to assist by a  
loan of \$2,000,000 of its assets to be  
used as collateral by your company.  
I commenced to make cash ad-  
vances on account on April 14th, and  
continued them until August 28th, when  
they reached the sum of \$4,400,000.  
I lent the great sum without any  
security whatever, and in view of  
the fact that the assets of the com-  
pany were of no value to me, and in  
my management, I claim it as my privi-  
lege to give due prominence to the  
fact, nor will it be improper in view of  
the attitude assumed toward me by  
certain members of your board of  
directors, to say in my record in this  
respect will suffer nothing by compari-  
son with the terms on which they loaned  
money to the company.

Here followed a long array of figures
