Business was quite brisk on the exchange today though a material shrinkage is recorded in the price of several stocks. This is more than offset, however, by the spurt in Martha Washington and the stiffening up of Grand Central and Sacramento.

Ajax sold between \$1.25 and \$1.27, while Grand Central opened at \$7.05 and moved up to \$7.10 with the sale of 1,400 chares. Sacramento dropped several thousand shares at between 431/4 and 44. Martha Washington sold up to 11%, while Yankee Con. closed with the sale of 1,000 shares at 14%. Century of Park Valley was also much stronger today selling up to \$1.17. Star Con, fur-nished one of the chief attractions in the pit foday, when it opened at 63% and after seiling down to 57% it reacted to 61% at the close of the call. Lower Mammoth sold as low as \$3.96 today, while Mammoth let go 500 shares at \$2.23. May Day declined to 50%. #### SHIPMENT FROM DEXTER. In the Case of Wm. M. Donald Against the American Smelting Co.

#### Runs Lower Than Was Expected. Inspects Oil Lands - The Smelter Trust Case-Four Aces Meeting.

Secretary A. L. Jacobs returned to town last evening from a visit to the Ben Butler of Bingham. The drift from the end of the tunnel has been run 65 feet on the vein in an easterly direction. For the last 40 feet the management has followed a streak of ore on the hanging wall which runs from 18 to 24 inches in width. With the exception of a few patches it is all of milling grade. The management is now extending an upraise near the end of the tunnel. At a height of 40 feet from 10 to 18 inches of clean ore is now in sight with about 3 feet of milling ore. The vein at this point is about five feet wide and appears to be widening out. The ore is making in the quartz. Returns from an average assay from this upraise were received by Mr. Jacobs this afternoon which show 3.6 per cent copper, 34.6 per cent lead, 20.2 ounces silver and 80 cents in gold per ton. Another sample assays 1.2 per cent copper, 41.7 per cent lead, 14.7 ounces silver and 80 cents in gold. Two shifts of four men each are employed at present.

BITUMINOUS COAL ROADS.

#### Were in Special Demand at Opening of Market and Scored Gains.

#### Dealings Large and Well Distributed -Inroads Made on Prices of Special Stocks.

New York, March 13 .- The southwestern bituminous coal carrying roads were in special demand at the opening and the gains reached a point in a number of cases. The dealings were large and well distributed. Substantial inroads were made on prices of special stocks before the selling ceased. Sugar declined 14. .

A rapid rise of four points each in St. Louis Southwestern common and preferred caused a renewed demand for other southwesterns, particularly the Kansas & Texas issues, which rose 11/4 and 2% for the common and the preferred. The market generally hardened before noon with special strength in low priced stocks.

Profit taking caused some wide declines in the last hour, in spite of continued strength in a few spots, Norfolk Western, the Denver & Rio Grande stocks and New York, Chicago and St. Louis first preferred rose 1 to 14.
