
## THE MYSTERY OF POLAND'S BASTILE

Once There Prisoner's Next Resting Place Is Likely to be His Grave.

AND THAT WILL BE "UNMARKED"

Inside Facts Concerning a Grim Fortress Wherein an Appalling Number Have Disappeared Forever.

WARSAW, June 18.—Perhaps the most hated and certainly the most dreaded spot in all Warsaw is the citadel, once a fortress but now a political prison, behind the walls of which many grim and terrible tragedies are enacted. Many a Warsaw family is mourning a husband, father, son, or even daughter, who has been dragged away by the gendarmes at dead of night and imprisoned there. Many of them are lost.



DIMITRY MIKOŁAJEWICZ MARTINOFF, GOVERNOR OF THE WARSAW CITADEL.


He Hates the Poles and Is Hated By Them, And Has Been Much Upset By Three Separate Death Sentences Sent To Him By The Revolutionary Party Within the Last Three Months. It Is Believed That He Would Like to Resign His Lustrous Post, But the Fear of Incurring His Colleagues' Ridicule, Combined With That of Bombs, Keeps Him in a State of Indecision.

Their fate is never known; it may be death, transportation to Siberia or exile. Since the three years reign of terror, Jan. 28-30, reports of wholesale butchery at the citadel have horrified Warsaw. According to these reports men and women are hung about daily; the heads of some are cut off and strange, muffled cries coming from the walls of the prison, the Russian officers themselves return pale and trembling from the scenes their duty forces them to witness.

How many men and women have been executed in the citadel since last February, when the peasant movement against the czar's government reached Poland, nobody but the commandant and the governor ever will know. But we do know that through the barracks vacated by regiments lately sent to the front, there are four thousand suspects. The citadel is so overstocked that the daily court martial cannot make room for the newcomers quickly enough.

**THE BASTILLE OF POLAND.**  
The few who return thereto say little, for they dare not tell the truth. But the few who do shout threats and bawled, hideous oaths for themselves. Little wonder that this citadel has been called the bastille of Poland; little wonder that the Pole shudders at its red walls and green ramparts. Not only is it the slaughter house of his race, but its guns ever turned toward the city, are ready to vomit fire at the first



## Americans in the Henley Eight, July 3.

Grand Challenge Cup for Which the Vesper Boat Club's Eight Will Compete Regarded By British Folk as the Emblem of Rowing Supremacy—Intrinsic Value Nil But Associations Everything.

LONDON, June 26.—Interest in the Henley regatta—which opens on July 3—is especially keen this year owing chiefly to the presence of the American "eight" in the race for the Grand Challenge cup. Besides the "Vespers" of Philadelphia, two other foreign clubs will be represented in the struggle for this most coveted of rowing trophies—the club Nautique du Grand de Belgique and the Berliner Ruder club of Germany—but though their inclusion intensifies the international aspect of the competition, it is the prospect of a contest with Americans that most powerfully stirs the Englishman's sporting blood. It is just because John Bull has a far stronger love of Underdog than for any other members of the family of nations that he finds a heap more satisfaction in beating him at any game than he gets out of beating any of the other lads, and on the other hand he hates far worse to be vanquished than is spread over three days.

### EMBLEM OF SUPREMACY.

As Americans regard the American cup as the emblem of yachting supremacy, so do English folk esteem the "Grand," and it is familiarly called, as the emblem of amateur rowing supremacy. In eight-oared shells, introduced in the two cups which were composed for when the Henley regatta was founded in 1839, without any expectation that Henley would attract the attention of the world, the name of the course has been captured by Englishmen.

The name is the foremost interest in the contests which are witnessed at inter-collegiate and other rowing regattas in America. The enthusiasm with which American visitors manifest on behalf of American competitors always astounds their British congeners. The Americans go to town to support their favorite. Laughing, dicing, gambling, in a word, having a good time is their object, and whenever wins or losses they get it.

### THE COURSE.

The course extends over a mile and 250 yards of the beautiful stretch of water that flows from Henley bridge past Phillips Court and Pawley Court to Hambleton Lock. From the bridge to the lock over a mile below, house boats, pleasure boats and yachts line the other.

The river between the locks is narrow, the banks are myriads of boats, so close that their occupants can touch hands as they move about in blocks of twenty or more, and the water is filled with the thousands of boats that a few minutes before had been wandering at will over the river packed tight as sardines on either side. A gun is fired and the throngs which have been filling the role of aquatic police clear out of the river. The racing begins.

It is a spectacle—the most brilliant inland aquatic spectacle in the world—but it is not the course that the gay crowds that swarm to it. It is three parts of the scene that are most attractive.

The first is the rowing itself. This is the name of the first and greatest interest in the contests which are witnessed at inter-collegiate and other rowing regattas in America. The enthusiasm with which American visitors manifest on behalf of American competitors always astounds their British congeners.

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
